COUNCILMEN VOICE PROTEST AGAINST SIDEWALK CROSSING

Informal Discussion Gives City Attorney Opportunity to Press Argument for Codification of Ordinances; City Buys Goal

Without taking definite action, members of Twin Falls city council in regular session last evening took the expression of disapproval of a number of driveways across sidewalks, particularly at special service stations, that they have been installing in a series of persons using the walls.

Councilmen were reminded by Captain E. M. Sweeney, city engineer, that the council has power to restrict the situation and may, if it chooses, not only prohibit construction of driveways across sidewalks, but also require that they be stored where driveways have been built across them.

The city attorney took advantage of the occasion to present a bill to amend the ordinance which he said in his present condition are "open ended" and are not adapted to the new form of municipal government.

The ordinance now in effect provides that any person who erects a driveway across a sidewalk shall be liable for the same, and that the city may remove the same if the owner fails to do so within a certain period.
