MORE BONDS: Bond issues are rarely popular but there is a cause at present developing which would seem to call for the voting of more highway bonds.

So the industry has had to turn to spray residue by means of a wash and must use less spray, and must spray residue is under the purview of tolerance.

Coupled with warning that federal requirements will be enforced this season, comes assurance that the

state officials having these matters in charge are to be guided by rule of reason, so that consumers of Idaho fruit may be assured of a product that is entirely up to standard.

Corn, Too, Undergoes Sinking Spell in Early Trading but Shorts Change Mart's Course

CHICAGO, Sept. 5 (AP)—The present range of wheat prices failed to interest buyers today and another small dip resulted. Corn and oats, however, showed relatively steady prices, but the early decline made a turn about at the last when shorts took advantage of the dull day to cover up. For the close wheat was the highest figure of the day and a net advance of 1/8 Tuesday.

Northwest sellers appeared in the market from time to time with small offerings, with the usual depressing effect. The pressure was relatively light, however, and word from Minneapolis indicated that heavy hedging sales were still some distance away. Export demand was rather indifferent, and the trade look for a moderate selling season from Argentina, with better weather prevalent there.

NEW BULL RAMPAGE ON NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Sept. 5 (AP)—The stock market today successfully absorbed the heavy selling inspired by the large increase in stock exchange member loans and started on a new bull rampage under the leadership of the oil and the public utilities exchange gains in the active issues ranged from 2 to 10 points, with at least two score individual stocks selling at their highest prices of the year.

So great was the volume of trading that the ticker was 38 minutes late in recording the final quotation. The day's rise aggregated 4,626,909 shares, the highest since June 12. The market opened irregularly in reflection of the speculative uncertainty created by the increase of 424,000,000 in brokers' loans. In the absence of any extensive forced liquidation, pools quickly resumed their campaign for higher prices.

Call money held steady at 7 1/2 per cent all day, although the banks called more than \$15,000,000 in loans. The market's recovery was hastened by announcements believed to create bullish enthusiasm in today's market. These included an advance from 94 to 98 in the annual rate on Utah coupon.

Texas Corporation was the leader of the oil group, setting a new high for the present issue at 47 1/4 a share and then coming to 60 1/4. A sharp rise in Harjardahl & Co. launched a new top at 31 1/4.

Radio returned to its old role as a market leader by soaring 11 1/2 points to a new record high of 72 1/2, and then leading to 224. General Motors dipped to 200 1/2 in the early trading, but then within 3 points it was up at 207 and closed just below that figure for a net gain of 3 1/2 points. United States Steel common closed 17 1/2 points lower at 127.

Wheat transactions again took place in the Warner Brothers issues. The "A" stock opened 3 1/2 points lower at 112 1/4 and then rallied to 121 1/4 and closed to 117 1/4.

Chrysler responded to reports of record-breaking sales by crossing 104 1/2. A series of favorable figures on other issues to reach new ground were Calumet and Hecla, American and Foreign Power, National Power and Electric Bond.

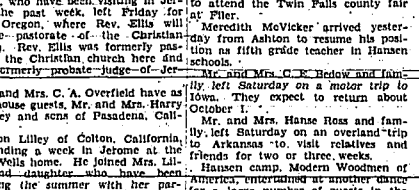

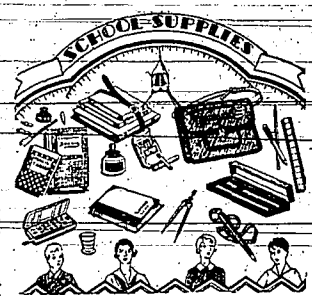
