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# BOURBONS' NOMINEE MAY TAKE UP FARM QUESTION IN OMAHA

### Governor Smith Refuses to Discuss Six-Speech Tour of Middle West and Northwest: Own Experience to Be Guide

(By The Associated Press.)  
**ALBANY, Sept. 7**—Although the scope of Governor Smith's first campaign swing has been determined, the West and Northwest which will get under way in a few days—has been put under way in Omaha by his experience in gubernatorial battles, the Democratic nominee for president intends to await developments in the Republican camp before stepping out, definitely, into the line of attack in his addresses on the stump. He will prepare his speeches, planning on all occasions to talk extemporaneously.

### Candidates "Farm" Relief

The expectation is that the governor will take up farm relief at his first speech at Omaha, September 14, but he said today when the governor Herbert Hoover will deliver the night before in Newark, New Jersey.

At New York, Sept. 20; Denver, Sept. 22; Helena, Montana, Sept. 24; Minneapolis, September 26; St. Paul, Sept. 28; Chicago, Sept. 30; St. Louis, Oct. 1. It is indicated that he has not any tentative subjects in mind at yet, and that he would draw on his own experience in his speeches on the stump.

### Will Attend Convention

From this week-end, the Democratic nominee will return to New York for the Democratic state convention at Rochester, October 1 and 2, then will be spent, perhaps, by set out on another tour, the direction and extent of which it still is to be determined.

In the final days of the campaign, the Democratic standard bearer intends to cover ground in the Middle West, northern Atlantic seaboard states and New England.

As he passes through the country, Governor Smith plans to conduct a "meeting and greeting" campaign from the rear of his special train, but without open air speeches.

Widepread radio and newspaper plans will feature the Democratic nominee's appearances, and he has been assured that his words in each locality will be carried from coast to coast.

# SENATOR CURTIS IN MAINE ON CAMPAIGN

### Vice-Presidential Nominee of Republican Party Reviews Administration Achievements

**BANGOR, Maine, Sept. 7**—(AP)—Reductions of income taxes, government expenses and of the public debt during the seven years of Republican administration were detailed today by Senator Charles Curtis, the Republican vice-presidential nominee in a speech before an audience of 500 in the auditorium.

The senator came to Maine to apply the finish touch on an extensive Republican campaign for the state to be held on Monday and Tuesday (platform with him tonight were the party's headline candidate, Senator Frederick Hale, seeking reelection to the state senate; and William Tudor Gardner, nominee for governor.)

Republicans here still make use of the slogan, "The man who gave us the Republican state," and those looking on the election Monday as a barometer for the national event in November seem interested in the size of the vote. So Senator Curtis added his word for the state ticket in his all-Republican debatement to colleagues.

Discussing the government's fiscal affairs, Senator Curtis in his prepared address stated that the public debt administration has reduced to \$6,772,000,000. There have been cut four times and the total in approximately \$7,000,000,000. The total cost of the war is about \$46,000,000,000, as compared with \$7,000,000,000 required in 1920 when the party was about to come into power at the close of the war.

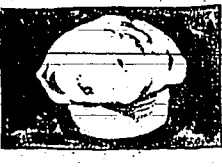

Leighton, Twin Falls police chief, in a chance encounter on the highway bridge yesterday afternoon, shed some new light on a murder-mystery and a garage robbery in Angola, Indiana, on the night of last August 21, with which Art Catlin, arrested here August 27, was believed to have been connected.

Slayer Still at Large Identity of the murdered man whose charred body was found in the ash-tray of a touring car in Twin Falls, established, but the slayer had not been captured when the latest of the newspapers delivered to the police chief identified as one of a band of bank robber suspects. The newspapers, copies of the Angola Herald of August 25 and August 31 and of a Fort Wayne News-Sun of August 27, which said they had had important information concerning the slaying of a man in Indiana, and knew nothing of the stories of crime they contained.

Two Lines of Inquiry Appeal of the Indiana state bureau of criminal identification were carrying on one line of investigation in connection with the murder, while the sheriff, whose resignation seems to have been reconsidered, had launched an independent inquiry.
