GOOD WORK. So many factors are involved in the county hospital situation that it is hardly to be expected that the figures of the county auditor's report showing the hospital's income approaching its expenses, that the county hospital tax levy this year will be reduced below the cut of one-third that the county commissioners already have agreed upon tentatively.

The auditor's figures show for the five months last past an income of approximately \$12,000, which is only about \$500 less than expenditures for the same period, and on the face of these figures it is apparent that a levy of one or two mills for the hospital would be ample to take care of an ordinary deficit for a year.

It will be recalled, however, that the charge for hospital rooms in effect during most of this five months period was reduced recently, so that a corresponding reduction in the hospital's income is to be anticipated.

The "higher rate" is the proper one would depend upon facts that an audit now under way is expected to reveal. The higher rate certainly could not stand if it were based on costs that include the expense of caring for county charges, which expense ought to be borne by the whole county and not by a few whose insurance makes them patients at the hospital.

The "higher rate" means that the financial affairs of the hospital have improved "greatly" during the "past year or two. As a matter of fact it is not so very long ago that the annual deficit amounted to many times the amount represented by the difference between income and outlay for the five months period.

### STUDENTS TO ENTER "DRY" LAW CONTEST

#### Motor Firm Offers \$5000 For Best Plan to Enforce Prohibition Originated by Pupil

Twin Falls high school students will have an opportunity to suggest "dry" law enforcement methods in a contest for prizes offered by the W. C. Durant, president of the Durant Motor, Inc., who recently posted \$25,000 toward the drafting of the most effective prohibition enforcement scheme.

The second contest is limited to high school or preparatory students. It offers \$1000 for the winning plan, which \$1000 is to be paid to the student drafting the plan and the remaining \$4000 to his school.

The offer for the students is being transmitted by letter from the Durant Motor headquarters to school principals throughout the county.

#### Law Enforcement Vital

"The major issue in our country to-day," the letter says over Mr. Durant's signature, "is the problem of law enforcement and obedience to law. To paraphrase the words of Lincoln: 'It is a question whether our country is to continue with a citizen ship half lawless and half lawabiding. It is my belief that the majority of our people do not want the Eighteenth amendment abandoned. The legislators of 46 of the 48 states voted the Eighteenth amendment into the Federal constitution because there was solved by it. Naturally the people wanted it enforced and obeyed.'"

Mr. Durant declares that the work of preparation for the enforcement program should be "an education in the complexities of our greatest national problem, which after all must be solved by the younger generation." Each school is entitled to submit one plan, which is to be chosen in an elimination contest in each institution. The plans, not exceeding 2000 words, must be submitted before December 1. The winner will be determined by Durant's jury, by a committee of men and women who are yet to be selected. Plans will be addressed to the office of Mr. Durant in the Park building, 250 West Fifty-seventh street, New York, where full information concerning the contest may be had.

Mr. Durant has also sent to the school heads a copy of his offer of the \$25,000 prize, entries for which also close on December 1.

"Shippers must be sure to have clearance into market by having each shipment accompanied by a certificate from the state department of agriculture showing that it is clean. Otherwise it is subject to seizure and to such other action as may be held necessary thereafter."

"Reports indicate that the Idaho potato crop is far below early estimates. Digging has started in a number of localities and in most of these the yield falls short of what was anticipated. The quality is fair, and if only No. 1 grade is shipped the reputation of the Idaho spud will be maintained."
