STATE TO IMPROVE ROAD FROM CANYON BRIDGE TO JEROME

Owners of Span Agree to Aid in Construction of Highway On North Side, J. D. Wood, Idaho Commissioner, Advises

Idaho state department of public works has assumed responsibility for improvement of six miles of road between the Pacific north bridge over Snake river canyon and the end of improved road south of Jerome. It was disclosed by J. D. Wood, commissioner of public works, during a visit here yesterday.

Owners of the bridge, Mr. Wood stated, have agreed to contribute \$7,000 toward the cost of the road construction and to pay \$100 a year for five years to maintain it.

The department will advertise for bids and will award contract for building of the road within 30 days, Mr. Wood said.

The department will complete the whole road between Jerome and the bridge next spring, and if possible, will do it next year.

Road Work Progresses on Oregon Trail state highway between Filer and Butte which was completed last week.

The commissioner gave definite assurance that construction and opening of the Old Oregon Trail will be completed at the earliest possible date.

In response to requests on the part of growers and other persons interested in handling of the big volume of crops produced in the Hansen district, the department has authorized issuance of a permit for hauling of over-land trucks carrying crops to market over sections of the old trail between Filer and Butte which were last fall.

SMITH IN FAVOR OF FARM BILL PRINCIPLE VETOED BY COOLIDGE

New Yorker in Omaha Address Charges Republican Party With Deceiving Farmers and Failure to Relieve Distress

(By The Associated Press) OMAHA, Sept. 18 (AP)—Leveling an attack on the Republican party, President Coolidge, and his opponent, Herbert Hoover, for their stand on farm relief, Governor Smith, in his speech, making campaign for the presidency, declared tonight that he stood for "principles" of the McNary-Haugen bill twice vetoed by President Coolidge.

Americans Outline Relief Measures in Stricken Caribbean

Physicians in Interior Towns Working 24 Hours Each Day With Inadequate Supplies; Epidemic of Suicides Grows

(By The Associated Press) SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Sept. 18—Food riots are increasing in this hurricane-stricken island. This was the word given to Henry M. Baker, national director of disaster relief for the Red Cross, soon after his arrival here today. Mr. Baker brought five assistants with him on the United States liner Stager Glimmer and they at once plunged into the work of organizing relief measures.

MAJORS of a dozen towns were among the first to wait upon Mr. Baker. They told him of the desperate plight of the communities and the need of the people who have thus far survived. They begged for something, either money or food, to take back with them. "We cannot go home empty-handed," the people said.

239 Bodies Remain Unidentified; Many Negroes Lose Lives

Second Expedition of Doctors and Nurses Leaves for Area Stricken by Tropical Storms; State Militia Polices Towns

(By The Associated Press) JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 18—The appalling extent of hurricane disaster dealt sections of the lower coast and South Central Florida assumed an ever widening scope late tonight as reports from the stricken areas reported the total death toll would be much greater. Red Cross officials estimated that it would reach 400 in Palm Beach county, one of the hardest hit regions.

The same source placed the damage to property at \$45,000,000. While the exact number of deaths reported by Senator Joe T. Robinson, the Democratic vice-presidential nominee, increased this figure to between \$75,000,000 and \$100,000,000.

Among unidentified dead were given: Two negroes at Jupiter, four negroes at Del Ray, twenty negroes at Tahokee, and 20 negroes at South Bay. In addition, there were reported 10 unidentified negroes at Tahokee, 30 at Belle Glade, 15 in the Okeechee City area and 17 in the Palm Beach area.

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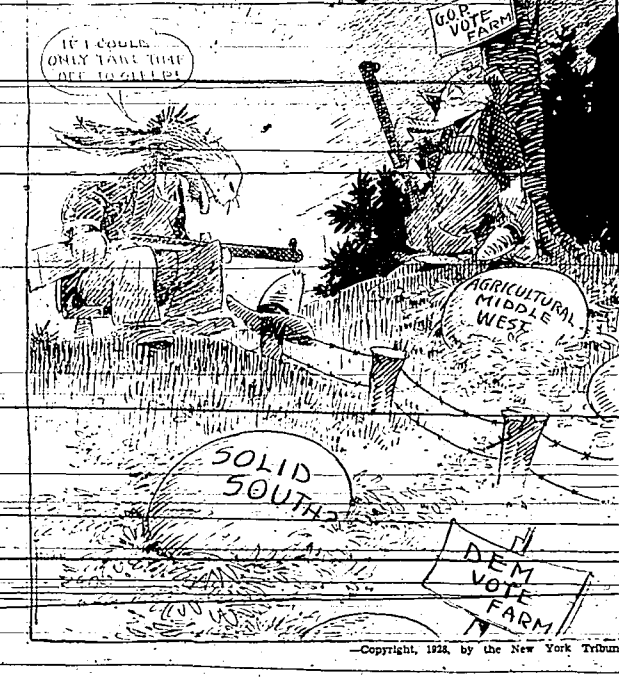
SHORT LINE MAY BUILD STATION IN SHOSHONE

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PLANE SEARCHES IN LAKE HURON RECOVERING

## LEADERSHIP WORRY OF IDAHO COACHES

### Discovery of Quarterback Is Chief Problem of Coaching Staff at State University

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Sept. 18—If Idaho can solve the quarterback problem the 1928 Vandal eleven should be as strong as any of the best lineups developed in the California quarter back under Andy South, who is entering his third season as gridiron director of the Vandals.

Along with five other conference teams, Southern California, Stanford, Washington, Rice and Washington, Idaho lost her star signal caller of last season, "Red" Jacoby, who handled this position on the 1927 eleven. His position on the 1928 team is an ordinary quarterback and Erb is worried about a successor.

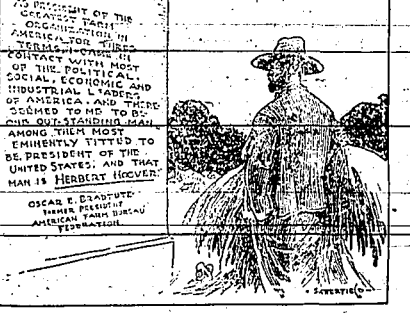

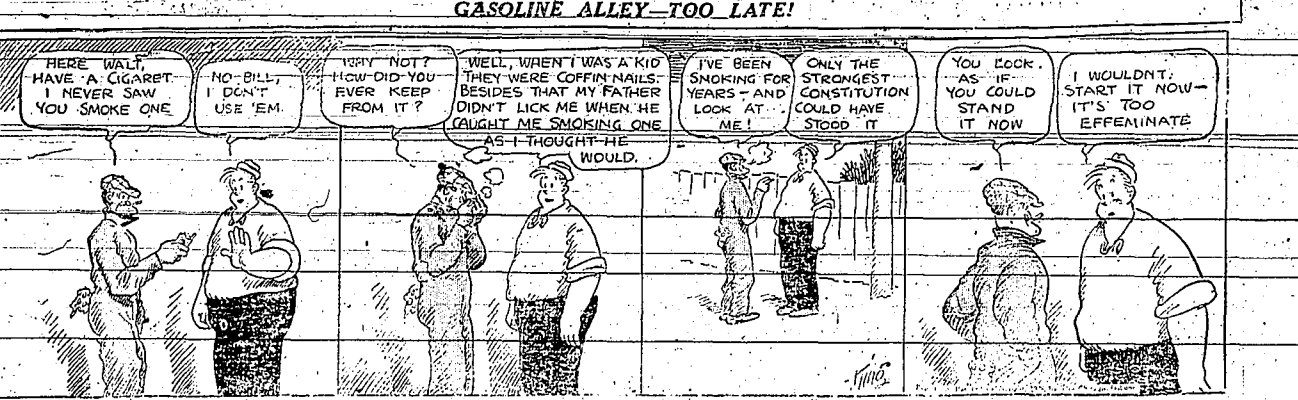

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MICHIGAN BEAN HARVEST PREDICTS INCREASED PRODUCTION IN 1928

Government Estimates Responsible for Reports of Shortages, Says Lansing Dealer. Advocates Moderate Prices

The nation's crop of white beans this year is not less, but probably somewhat larger than last year, according to A. J. Madison, Lansing, Michigan, general manager of Chatterton and Son, bean dealers, who arrived here yesterday.

Madison said he had no personal knowledge of the situation in Michigan, but he has heard from growers and dealers in that state that the crop is about the same as last year.

Madison said that the government's reports of production with records of shipment, Mr. Madison showed that indicated production was greater by 100,000 bushels in Michigan and 200,000 bushels in Idaho, Montana and Wyoming than the actual production in those states.
