Train of 15 Cars Brings 200 Performers; \$22,000 Merry-Go-Round and Giant Ferris Wheel Feature Equipment

A blaze of 10,000 gleaming incandescent lamps light the way for the Show Midway at Twin Falls baseball park while an uninterrupted flow of melody poured forth from a three stream chalice and each one of the hundreds of amusement seekers and merry makers discovered among a wide variety of attractions.

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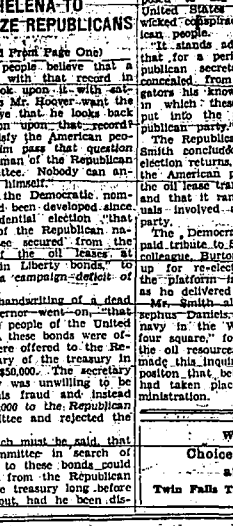

step of the educational procedure in finished and that college is a place where another step is commenced. "Probably the college should be divided more definitely into lower and upper divisions, the first of which, dovetailing with the high school, should constitute the main body of the considerable proportion of students who now enter college and for many who do not enter," he said. "The present division that would be suggested for these young people with sufficient intellectual aptitude to merit specialization and a large amount of independent study."

It is Dr. Kelly's hope to develop of the University of Idaho an institution in which students will assume a greater responsibility in gaining their education. One of his fundamental conceptions is that very early in life the student should be made to feel that the responsibility for obtaining an education and fitting himself for life and the job of earning a living is his rather than the teacher's.

Enthusiasm for Study
Dr. Kelly is fearful of the extension of higher educational institutions are becoming over-specialized and over-departmentalized. He feels that the best equipment education can give is a broad fundamental knowledge which will enable the student to tackle the problems as they arise. The main objective, however, he feels is to instill in the mind of the student an enthusiasm for study that carry on long after he has left college.

The inauguration of Dr. Kelly was an all-Idaho affair. Leading citizens from all parts of the state attended in response to approximately 3500 invitations broadcast into every community by the statewide committee of which W. D. Vincent, state commissioner of education, was chairman. 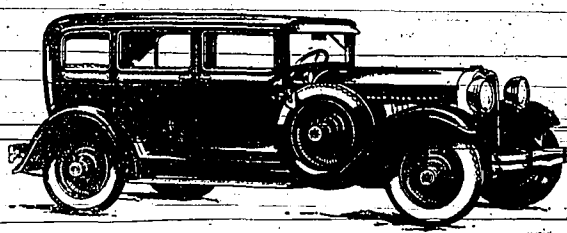

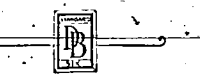

COUNCIL POSTPONES DECISION ON HOTEL LICENSE REVOCATION

City Attorney Suggests Rule Requiring Owners of Houses Where Bootleggers Found Where Bootleggers Operate

Twin Falls city council members formally their approval of a suspended rule that whenever a bootlegger or violator of the prohibition laws were arrested in a Twin Falls rooming house, the proprietor of that rooming house would be cited automatically to appear before the council in defense of his license.

This suggestion was advanced by Captain E. M. Sweeney during alternate deliberations relative to the recommendation made by the council last week for cancellation of the license of Mrs. Anna Hampton to operate the Red Jug. Main avenue south where the police seized nine and one-half gallons of moonshine whiskey in four rooms last Saturday.

In the absence of J. E. White, police commissioner, the council decided to take "no action" in the matter last evening.

Hotel Keeper Questioned

Mrs. Hampton was questioned by members of the council after A. J. Myers, former city attorney, had stated in her behalf that her character and reputation were good and that she was positive she had no knowledge of any traffic in liquor in the hotel.

"We need the cooperation of all the rooming house keepers in doing their liquor business effectively," Mayor R. E. Bobler stated during the discussion. "And unless we can get the cooperation of any traffic in liquor in the hotel."

R. E. Leighton, police chief, disclaimed any desire to press the license case. "But," he said, "I have been petitioned because we haven't made this recommendation in other cases where liquor has been seized in rooming houses."

"There are three or four rooming house keepers who would not hesitate to give a complaint to bootleggers if they could get away with it by practicing ignorance," the police chief told the council.

To Fight Tree Pests

The council's title last evening was otherwise occupied with a preliminary maneuver in a campaign to have trees that are threatened with destruction by hordes of insect pests and disease. Definite action toward this end was taken with acceptance of a resolution submitted by James Anderson, Ohio, who offered to demonstrate the efficacy of his method of defending trees against their insect and disease enemies. He offered to administer this treatment to 50 trees without cost to the city but simply on a "try" basis.

Mr. Anderson said that he had been engaged in this work for 35 years, and that he is here with his family to live in Twin Falls for at least a year.

Application by Alfred O'Brien for permit to construct a building of iron pipe and steel on the corner of Main and alley at the rear of the Bank and Trust company building was submitted through B. P. Thompson, building inspector, and was granted by the council with the approval of the building inspector.

Assessed bills calling for collection of \$81,255.02 to meet payments due next year on account of seven local improvements districts and the assessment for this year for Twin Falls sprinkling district, have been turned over to the county auditor, O. Senator Curtis' train was nearly an hour late in arriving at Idaho Falls, and the reception necessarily was curtailed on that account. The senator also was suffering from severe sore throat, induced by strain of his strenuous campaign and spoke only briefly at each stop.

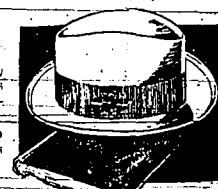
