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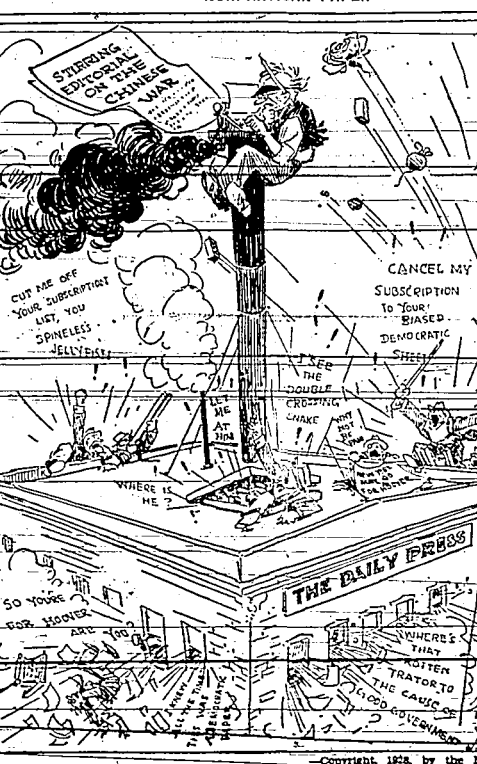
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Bruins Defeat Albion Normal, 13 to 12, In Season's First Gridiron Battle

AERIAL OFFENSIVE IN LAST MINUTES PROVES UNDOING OF VISITORS

College Team Leading 12 to 6 As Timekeepers Announce Two Minutes Left to Play; Many Thrills for Spectators

Twin Falls Bruins snatched a 13-to-12 victory from Albion Normal here this afternoon in the last few minutes of play.

With the score 12 to 6 against them the Bruins took the ball on their own 30-yard mark. A long pass carried them to the Teachers' 30-yard marker.

Three attempts at passes were unsuccessful. The growing crowd gave up the last vestige of hope when the timekeepers announced less than two minutes to play.

The Bruins were successful when the ball rested on the 10-yard line as the teams lined up for the next play.

Frazelle received the ball and dashed back while Albion players gathered about him. No receiver was in sight and the husky Bruin back tossed the oval toward the goal white the crowd groaned.

Out of the clear air raced Hollis Martin, cutting toward the center of the play and scoring the ball to safety almost as it touched the ground.

Spectators Breathless Again the spectators were breathless as the two eleven lined up for the try kick. The Bruins were called back to try for the point and as the ball sailed over the cross bar with only inches to spare the crowd heaved a sigh of relief.

After a first half played in the center of the field with Albion gaining the advantage and the Bruins plugging the line to make up for the loss the third and fourth quarters electrified the crowd with thrill acts.

Teachers Score First The teachers scored first after intercepting a Bruin pass in mid-field. The next pass by Frazier generally were able for a 15-yard pass to make consistent gains through the line. After carrying the ball to the 15-yard mark Herbold passed a pass to Wilson who raced across the field to the first counter of the game.

Early in the second period the Bruins tied the count at 6-6 when Frazelle tossed a long pass to Martin. Teachers intercepted the next pass. Frazier charged in and blocked the attempted punt and fell on the ball behind the Albion goal.

Again Frazier put the Bruins in danger and another pass slipped by the Bruin defense for the second Normal tally. The Bruins broke the attempt at conversion. Only a few minutes were left to play with the Bruins fighting in their own territory.

Teachers' defense was successful and after two threats the Bruin score the deciding tally.

Bruin Line Holds The Teachers were unable to punt the Bruin line and only once were they able to make yardage consistently through the Bruin forward wall. The Bruins had better luck with the teachers and were able to gain at times through the line and to make some gains around the wings. Taylor and Martin demonstrated their ability on every play and the Teachers were unable to circle the Bruin ends. Tooley proved himself a driving back with power on line plays and did Frazelle.

New York League Leaders Retain Two and One-Half Game Lead by 11-6 Victory; Pittsburgh Hurts Club to Triumph

(By The Associated Press) DETROIT, Sept. 28.—The Yankees clinched their sixth American league pennant and their third in succession by defeating the Tigers here today by 11 to 6 in the third game of the series. The Athletics won from Chicago, 7 to 5, but the Yankees retained a lead of two and one-half games with only two more to be played by each of the contenders.

George Williams, pitcher, a leading pitcher since he failed until today on this trip West, turned in the winning victory. The Tigers pitched fairly hard but they were led from the start. Gibson, Stoner, Smith and Page failed to stop the Yanks.

TWIN FALLS TO GET RADIO BROADCASTING STATION IN 60 DAYS

Stanley N. Soule, Salt Lake City, Will Construct Idaho's Largest Plant Here; to Bring Equipment From Utah

Under a permit granted by the federal radio commission to Stanley N. Soule, Salt Lake City, Idaho's largest radio broadcasting station will be established in Twin Falls and will be in operation within the next 60 days, it was stated here last evening by Mr. Soule, who, with his father, O. P. Soule, Salt Lake City attorney, arrived yesterday to make arrangements for location and installation of the new station.

The new station, Mr. Soule said last evening will be a 500-watt station and will be operated by radio with the whole country. With its initial installation of 250 watts power, it will be able to maintain continuous service over a radius of 100 miles, and its reports will be received at times on the Atlantic coast, in California, Oregon, and along the Pacific coast, Mr. Soule stated.

To Be Radio Center Its establishment here, Mr. Soule said, will make Twin Falls the radio center for the entire state, and will draw to Twin Falls the constant attention of the territory within its range.

The broadcasting station, which Mr. Soule built and has operated at Salt Lake City for the last four or five years is to be the nucleus for the new station. The station, he is bringing it here with him and has ordered other equipment necessary for the new station.

Beginning with 250 watts power, the Twin Falls station, if it is given adequate support, will be increased to 500 watts, and will then be in position to effect a hookup with a chain of the national broadcasting system.

Negotiate for Site Mr. Soule and his father yesterday inspected a number of possible sites for the new station, and discovered one or two sites that were pronounced well suited for the purpose. At the station, he explained, will require three or four rooms on the top floor of one of the taller buildings in the city, and a store room on the second floor. On the roof there are to be erected two poles each 80 feet high to carry the antenna across a span of 125 feet, with connection extending down to the control room. Other rooms will be occupied by the studio, reception hall and store room.
