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JOSEPH T. ROBINSON TRAINING GUNS ON CURTIS AND WHITE

Bourbon Vice-Presidential Nominee Delivers Most Extensive Address On Farming of Western Tour in Wichita

(By The Associated Press) WICHITA, Kans., Oct. 1—The home state of Senator Charles Curtis, William Allen White as selected tonight by Senator Joseph Robinson, the Democratic vice-presidential nominee, as a site from which to open his campaign attack on the activities of both.

Further, the senator singled out Kansas, one of the great farm states, as the place from which to deliver the most extensive address to farmers of his tour of the west on the record of the Republican party toward the farmer.

In a speech specifically prepared for delivery here, he accused both Curtis, his rival for office and other Republicans with "strifing" with the agricultural problem, and declared that public health Kansas senator John Neber Hoover, the Republican standard bearer, had advanced "any definite and effective plan for carrying out party pledges on this question."

"Both Mr. Hoover and Senator Curtis profess the belief," Mr. Robinson said in his prepared address, "that increased tariffs on farm products are an adequate remedy for the depression in agriculture."

"If increased tariffs is the remedy, what excuse can be given for the failure of the Republican party to apply that remedy during the last eight years?"

Turning to William Allen White's charges against Governor Smith, the Democratic presidential nominee, Mr. Robinson said the Kansan had charged that "Smith's record as a legislator indicates him to be sympathetic with immorality and vice."

Mr. White subsequently retracted a portion of his statement, the senator continued, but the manner and terms of the retraction failed to undo the great injustice of the original statement.

Robinson contended Smith's reply had shown that White was willfully misinformed as to the record, or committed the unpardonable offense of reporting and misrepresenting matters of public concern.

On the other hand, the senator went on, Mr. White paid a glowing tribute to Smith in an article published in Collier's weekly under the date of August 1, 1926, at which time he said in part:

"There is not in American life today a clearer, stronger, more accurately working brain in any man's head than Smith's brain. His processes of thought are logical and he has the courage to defend them. Here is a man, human, affectionate, wise and brave man, whose sincerity has never been questioned, whose courage is proven by those who humanity holds friends with steel rods."

After concluding this quotation, the senator appealed to the "people of Kansas to fight the great wrong which one of your own eminent citizens has done to a fellow man whose courage is proverbial, whose humanity holds friends with steel rods."

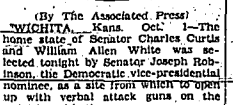

RELIGIOUS ISSUES ECHO DRAWS REBUKE (Continued From Page One) when he was asked regarding published reports that Chairman Neber of the Republican national committee, had sent him a telegram commending distribution of campaign material dealing with religion and with Governor Smith's membership in the Catholic church, Washington dispatches today quoted Mr. Neber as confirming that he had sent such a telegram Saturday, but Mr. Street insisted today that he had not received it.

The circular, which is several inches long, reads in part a letter from Street to the Birmingham News, which that paper refused to publish, explaining that it violated its policy of not printing letters dealing with religious matters.

"When I see Governor Smith declaring that he is a faithful and loyal member of the Catholic church, which I see the pope hailing him as our beloved son in Christ, when I see Governor Smith calling in a Catholic priest, Father Duffy to assist him in answering the purely political questions propounded to him and to aid him in running the gauntlet of Roman Catholic church laws and doctrines, I am driven to the conclusion that, however he may seek to camouflage his real opinions, at heart he is in accord with his church on these political questions."

COUNCIL AUTHORIZES NOTE ISSUE TO MEET MUNICIPAL EXPENSE

Tax Anticipation Paper Will Cover Outstanding Bills Until Collection of Payments On Levy; Local Bank Agent

With available credit to the extent of \$5 per cent of \$148,853 assessed taxes for the current year, Twin Falls city council in regular session last evening authorized issuance of municipal tax anticipation notes to meet current municipal expenses until the first installment of tax money next year begins to come in next month.

The council, in this regard, adopted a resolution conferring blanket authority to the mayor to issue and then specifically authorized issuance of \$10,000 of the notes for payment of \$800 bills approved last evening. The notes will mature and be paid during the remainder of this month.

Issuance of the tax anticipation notes will be a benefit to the city interest, obviates necessity for purchasing warrants bearing 7 per cent interest until the first installment of the tax money for the fiscal year that began last May 1, begins to come in next month.

Local Bank Agent
Twin Falls Bank and Trust company, it was announced, will handle the city's tax anticipation notes. Two years ago when similar notes were issued, a Boise concern handled the notes. Members of the council expressed confidence that the transaction would be handled this year through a local institution.

Authorization was voted last evening for payment of bills among the several funds as follows: General \$634.74; street sprinkling \$124.25; street lighting \$954.40; public library \$700; claims against the general fund were divided as follows: Administration \$10,000; waterworks \$208,600; police \$840,800; fire \$830,500; parks \$110; sanitary \$148,233; streets \$181; scales \$100; meat and dairy \$1,100; \$150; general \$261,400; labor \$117,170.

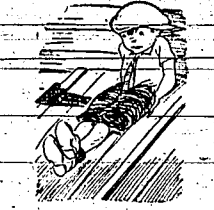
Issues Building Permits
Subject to approval by the mayor, the building inspector at the council last evening authorized issuance of building permits to F. W. McEwen for construction of a 2000 garage at his residence at the corner of Blue Lakes boulevard and Sixth avenue east; James L. Waver, 242 Sixth avenue east, for construction of a 2250 building; C. H. Howe, 827 Main avenue east, through F. T. Thompson, contractor, for construction of a 4500 addition.

Permits also were granted to F. T. Waver to build a new business block at the corner of Spokane street and Third avenue north, and to O. A. Poberly to run for a drive on the second avenue south between Spokane and Second streets.

Monthly Reports Given
Reports received by the council last evening showed that the waterworks department last month collected \$46,600 water rents receivable; that Alex W. Murray, plumbing inspector, issued 20 permits and collected \$23,000; that the city clerk received \$177,200 for licenses, sewer connections and sale of material.

Reports of the city engineer showed an increase of \$455.75 and \$153.83 costs, and collection of \$388.75 and \$133.05 costs.

INJURY OF WITNESS DELAYS BUSH TRIAL

George Jasper, Hurt in Shooting Gallery, Unable to Give Testimony for State's Case

Injury of George Jasper, reported to have been hurt by fragments of a bullet rebounding from an iron target in a shooting gallery, was the reason given yesterday by O. W. Whitman, prosecuting attorney, in requesting postponement of trial in district court here of Cleo (Slim) Bush, charged with assault with a deadly weapon. The trial had been scheduled to be held yesterday. It was continued to Tuesday, October 9.

Jasper is the complaining witness in this case. He alleged to have been attacked by Bush with a pistol and a sharp instrument believed to have been a knife, in an altercation in a Flax dance hall last week. Bush, who was brought back from Los Angeles to stand trial on the charge, is at liberty under bond.

Trial in the case of John Bradley on felony charge of second offense illegal possession of firearms, which also had been scheduled for yesterday, also was continued to a week from today.

Jury, accused by Judge W. A. Babcock last Saturday afternoon for two days, will return to district court, tomorrow to hear attorneys' arguments in the case of J. C. Sanger against E. N. Flory, R. D. Slover and O. E. Duke involving claim for judgment for approximately \$200 on a promissory note, payment of which is alleged to have been guaranteed by the defendants.

The hearing days of this week, it was indicated, will be occupied with trial of suits on the civil calendar.

POLICE REPORT SHOWS 66 ARRESTS IN MONTH

Violations of state laws defining felonies and misdemeanors were alleged in cases of nine out of 66 persons arrested by Twin Falls police during September, according to report made to the city council by R. E. Leighton, police chief. On account of violation of traffic ordinances, 27 arrests were made, violation of various other ordinances, 16, and drunkenness 14.

Fines assessed in police court during the month totaled \$23.85.

The report showed that 192 complaints of various kinds had been investigated, and two search warrants executed by police during the month. Meals served to prisoners in the city jail numbered 192 and three beds in jail were furnished to persons not prisoners.

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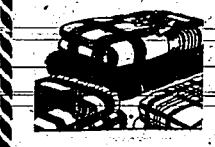

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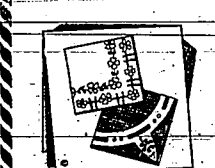
