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WOMEN BANKERS OF COUNTRY GATHER TO CONSIDER PROBLEMS

Fairer Sex Possesses 'Specula' Gland as Well as Men: Removal Best Accomplished By Knife of Financial Losses

(By The Associated Press) PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 3.—The "specula" gland, functioning in the male sex, is possessed also by women, according to a diagnosis of the Association of Bank Women which is holding its annual convention here.

Today women bankers from many parts of the country posed as nurses and doctors of financial ailments and discussed the "specula" gland, adapted from the word "speculate" between the muscles "that control grasping fingers and the crazy bone." In her opinion persons attacked by the "specula" gland become affected "to an almost insane craving for higher rates of interest and removal of the gland is best accomplished by the knife of financial loss.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE AND HOOVER DISCUSS POLITICAL SITUATION

Chief Executive Plans to Deliver Addresses Before Day of Election; Nominee Hears of New York State's Status

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Herbert Hoover today paid another visit to the White House to discuss the general political situation with President Coolidge.

The Republican presidential nominee declared that he did not know whether a species of Mr. Coolidge would be political. He would not reveal the subject of their conversation beyond declaring that it was upon various matters pertaining to the campaign and the general progress of his presidential fight.

Earlier in the day Hoover received a group of five from the home town of Governor A. E. Smith, his Democratic opponent, with a view to assisting in the chief executive's campaign.

The candidate also learned from Representative Hamilton Fish, New York, a new angle on the political situation in the state. The election of A. B. Houghton, ambassador to Great Britain, as Republican senatorial candidate, Fish declared, together with vigorous fight of the Democratic forces under Governor Smith, had thrown that state into the doubtful column.

Later Fish said he had informed Dr. Herbert W. Hays, chairman of the Republican national committee, that unless the circulation of religious literature was stopped, the party would lose the election.

In greeting the delegation which represented the United States Republican club, Hoover said the aim of the party was to meet the many national problems, "with a policy that would be open-mindedness and humanity sympathy, a policy that can be stated so that intelligent people can understand it."

The party to maintain itself in vigor must be constantly replenished, not alone in numbers but in training and in the traditions of its service, their ideas, policies that must be lined to the necessities of the present.

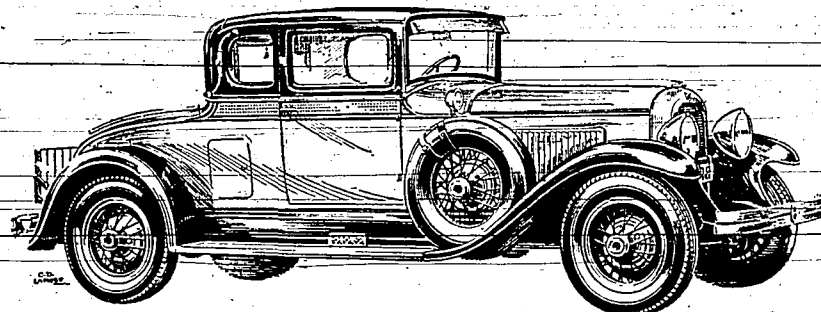

EMPLOYMENT SITUATION FOR WEEK ON DECLINE

Opening of Dehydrator Will Furnish Work for 100; Dealers Make Harvest Estimates

Business decreased this week at the federal employment office at the chamber of commerce headquarters, with Charles L. Hart in charge of the service, but is expected to pick up late this week when about 30 men and 80 women will be needed at the dehydrating plant. Mr. Hart taking names of applicants for these jobs now.

A tour through the wholesale and warehouse district yesterday resulted in the following estimates of crop gathering conditions: Most of the onion crop is in. Only one per cent of the bean crop has been harvested. One-half of the total apple crop is in. Ninety per cent of the southern gold has been picked. Harvesting of delicious has started, and some Beauties will be ready in a few days. Ten per cent of the Russets and 2 per cent of the rural potatoes have been dug. One-third of the red clover yield has been hulled. Some fields are still uncut.
