

CARNES RETURNS TO ATLANTA TO ANSWER FOR EMBEZZLEMENT

Shortage of Baptist Home Mission. Board Approximates \$1,000,000; Curious Crowds Jam Station-to-See-Captive

(By The Associated Press) ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 5.—Clifton S. Carnes, former Southern Baptist home mission board treasurer, came back from a day in jail to be greeted with a third indictment charging embezzlement of \$80,000 in bonds. His total embezzlements were said to be approximately \$1,000,000.

The indictment gave the date of the embezzlement as August 16, the day Carnes disappeared, and charged that he had been guilty of embezzling from the board \$100,000 of general Motors bonds; \$7000 Florida East Coast Railroad bonds; \$15,000 Liberty bonds; \$5000 Northern Pacific bonds; \$10,000 of government of Switzerland bonds, and \$14,000 Toledo Edison bonds.

The indictment said all these securities were the property of the home mission board. Carnes, though Carnes already is under indictment on two counts of having diverted approximately \$180,000 of the board's funds, this was the first true bill which specifically listed any of the misappropriated items.

Carnes tonight occupied a cell with two convicted murderers in the Fulton county jail. He arrived "home" today, handcuffed and in charge of Assistant Solicitor General J. A. Hudson and Deputy Sheriff R. T. Talbot.

All available space at the station was jammed with curious crowds when the train bearing Carnes pulled in. He was 10 minutes before a train could be cleared for the prisoner and his party. Just before the fugitive was led to the car and met his father in the vestibule. They stared at each other a moment and then embraced.

Seven New Englanders, however, were less than pleased to shield him from cameras, officers forced a path through the crowd to the train. There he pulled in the fall. Then he refused to make any statement until he had opportunity to talk with his attorney, William Chubb.

A search of Carnes' baggage revealed "travelers' checks" amounting to approximately \$3000. Carnes had intimated he was "not alone in this mess." He said the indictments were "all wet," and intimated he would ask an independent audit of the board's accounts to prove his contention.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes has established a new record in the annals of the United States supreme court. Yesterday he became the eldest man to sit on that exalted bench, breaking the record previously held by Chief Justice Roger Brooke Taney, who died October 10, 1858, at the age of 87 years, 8 months and 23 days.

Justice Holmes was born March 8, 1841, and yesterday reached the age of 87 years, 6 months and 26 days. He is actively engaged in the discharge of his judicial duties, enjoying better health than in recent years and able to attend not only every session of the court but also its frequent conferences.

GRAFT WITH BERTHS WILL FLY AT NIGHT

Colonel Lindbergh Recommends Establishment of All-Air Route From Ohio to Pacific. NEW YORK, Oct. 5 (AP)—On recommendation of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, the chairman of its technical committee, the Transcontinental Air Transport company, organized to operate a line of plane-train service across the country, decided today to establish an all-air route from Columbus, Ohio, to the West coast. Planes with sleeping accommodations will be used for night flying.

Keen to the transport company announced will place New York one business day from the West coast. It will supplement the originally planned joint rail and air route having a 46-hour service between the coasts. Plans for this service, it was stated, are well under way.

(By The Associated Press) WIENER NEUSTADT, Austria, Oct. 5.—This peaceful industrial center in Austria with its 30,000 inhabitants and 45 factories has taken on the appearance of a gigantic armed citadel in wartime, menacing all who may enter its gates.

In anticipation of possible disorders and looting on Sunday when the Social Democrats and the Heimwehr—so-called home-defense league—of Christian Socialists, who control the national government, will hold simultaneous propaganda meetings, the government has dispatched to the city 12,000 troops and gendarmes armed with rifles, bayonets, machine guns and artillery.

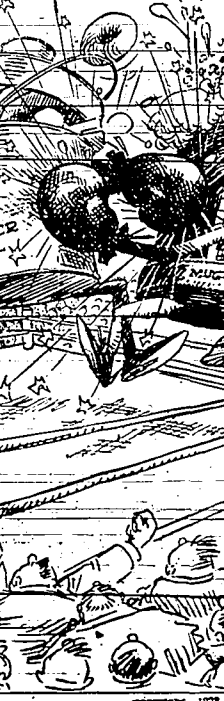

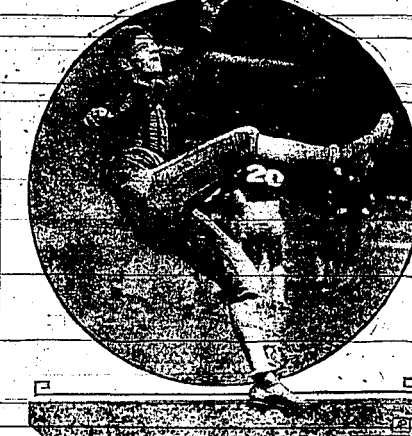
Albion Normal Eleven

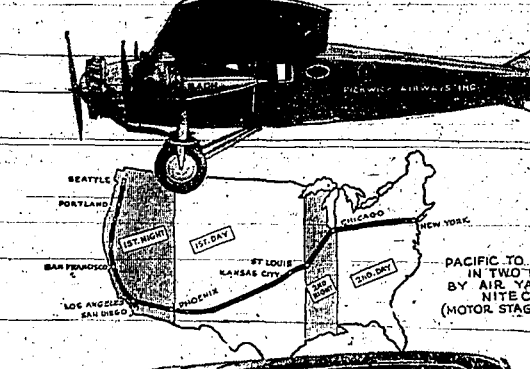

Borah's Warning Against Contract With Idaho Company Brings Objections to Deal

BURLEY, Oct. 5 (Special to The News)—At what was to have been the final and decisive meeting of the Burley irrigation district board Thursday evening, for consideration of the proposed contract between the government and the Idaho Power company for rental of the use of the unsold water at the American Falls dam, controversy developed that has made the matter as far from solution as it was at the time it was first brought up for action.

This meeting was attended by all the directors of the irrigation district boards of the Minidoka project, together with farmers and business men. The proposed contract provides in part that the government rent the use of surplus water at American Falls to the power company for a 10-year period, with certain certain power privileges and mutual termination provisions, for an annual rental charge of \$31,000.

It also developed at this first meeting that there was a serious question as to the validity of the original contract entered into between the government and the power company, by reason of insufficient consideration, and since that meeting it has been taken to bring the original contract to a court interpretation.

At the Thursday night meeting, all the irrigation districts expressed themselves as firmly opposed to the execution of the proposed 10-year contract. 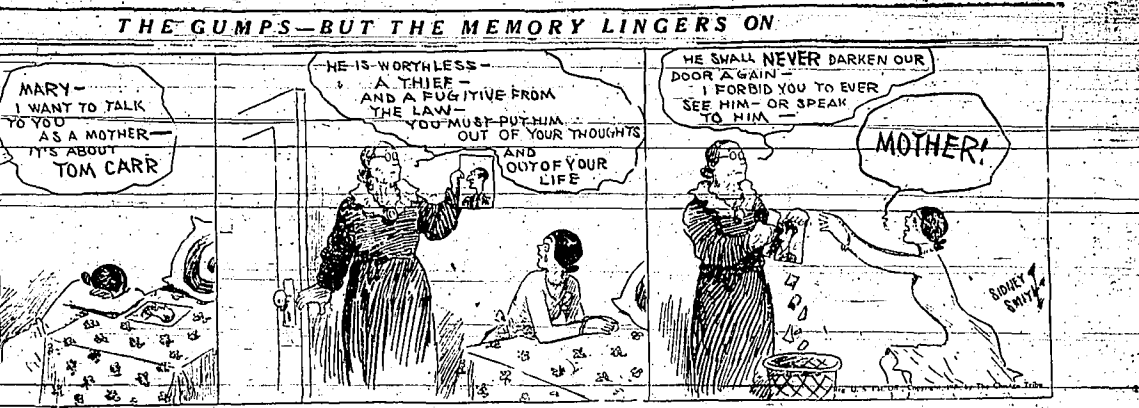

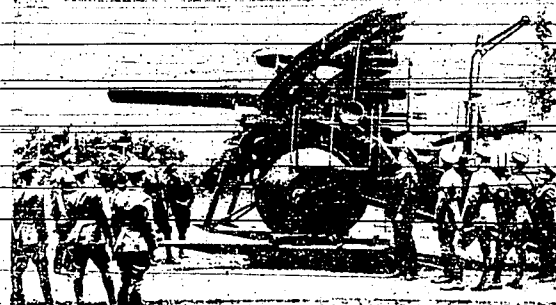

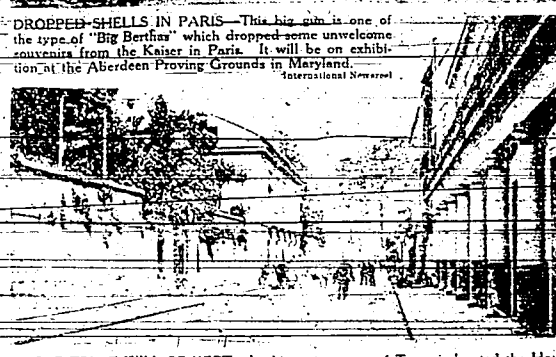
