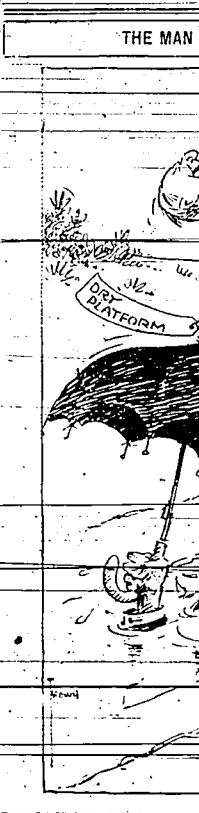

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GOOD ROADS BOARD CONSIDERS DIVISION OF STATE'S GAS TAX

Association Favors Legislation to Provide Traffic Officers and to Increase Salaries of Highway District Officials

Equal division of the gas tax revenues between state and counties was urged by the Idaho Association of Good Roads districts in resolutions adopted at its second annual meeting in Nampa last Monday, according to Stuart H. Taylor, secretary of the Twin Falls highway district and secretary of the state organization.

A second resolution adopted by the association calls for legislation to authorize highway districts to employ traffic officers where deemed necessary, and a third resolution urges fixing of adequate salaries for highway and good roads district commissioners.

Association Grows

The secretary's report to the Nampa meeting showed that 19 districts have joined the association since its organization meeting at Jerome last March 12.

The association's next meeting will be held in Twin Falls in November, 1928. J. T. Windle, Twin Falls, was elected president of the association, with C. H. Duval, Nampa, vice president. An executive committee was elected consisting of the president, the members of the Board of Highway Commissioners, C. E. Sumner, Edin, Axel Johnson, Payette; Wilson Burkhardt, Bliss; Anton Dedeckens, Payette, and H. Fowler, Burley. A legislative committee was elected including W. E. Talbot, Weiser; Ross Seely, Eden; J. A. Patton, Cam; J. H. Boor, Payette; C. H. Duval, Nampa; Charles McCarthy, Spirit Lake; E. E. Fisher, Rupert; and F. J. Marshall, Murtaugh. Votes in the committee are to be filed by the chairman.

TALK TRADE PROBLEMS

NEW YORK (AP)—Representatives of the Converters' association and of the Association of Finishers of Cotton Fabrics plan to meet here next spring to discuss trade problems and to settle among other things, the question of ownership of remnants and irregular goods created in the course of processing merchandise sent by converters to finishers. Converters claim ownership of pieces more than a yard in length, any remnant up to 10 yards long is a by-product of the finishing business and consequently their property.

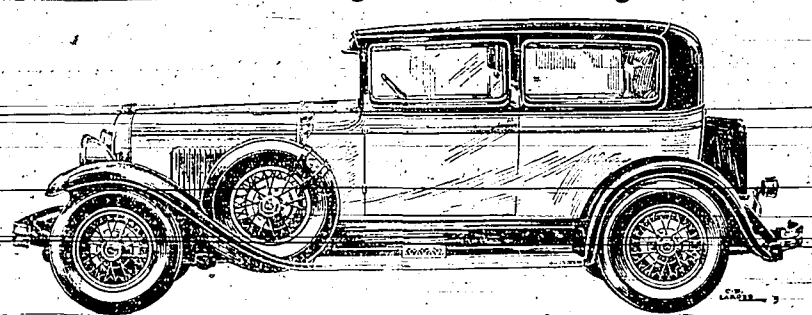

Class \$5000 Damages
Tomita's suit originally included claims for approximately \$6000 damages on account of alleged misrepresentation in purchase of seed potatoes from Johnson. These claims were dismissed on motion for non-suit that were sustained by the court.

Dispute between Tomita and Johnson, which was embraced in this suit originally, has been taken under advisement by the court.

Trial in the case occupied three days.

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MONTANA MARKETS QUARTER BEAN CROP

Prices to Growers Range From \$4.50 to \$6; Twin Falls to Harvest 1,100,000 Bushels

Eighty carloads of Great Northern beans, estimated at approximately 25 per cent of Montana's crop for this season, were marketed during September and October to the growers, ranging from \$4.50 to \$6 at the close of the month, according to a report from Billings concerning the first weekly report relative to bean crop and market conditions based at Sacramento, Calif. October 3 by the California department of agriculture and federal bureau of statistics, cooperating.

The report also contains a report that Montana's bean crop for the entire season will total 1,100,000 bushels, and that the price to growers is \$5 with a strong and active market. The beans from the states were moved until after a movement of growers by September 25 when the minimum price of \$4 was set.

Dealers at the Twin Falls meeting authorized cooperation with the California department in preparation of a present marketing information available in California and other producing sections of the United States for each county.
