

FLORIDA WITNESSES THREE-SIDED FIGHT FOR ELECTORAL VOTE

State Rocking in Same Political Guists That Are Sweeping Entire Dixie Area... Republicans Optimistic Over Prospects

(By The Associated Press) JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 18.—Dust with its rebuilding in the wake of a recent and more tempestuous wind, Florida now is rocking in the same political guists that are sweeping all of Dixie. They spring from the well-charted areas of high and low pressure for and against Hoover and are blowing up a fine storm to break about the ballot box on November's day.

Three-Sided Fight

Florida is witnessing a three-sided fight for the favor of her six electoral votes. The elements are two against one for the Democratic party. The Democrats find themselves attacked by their fellows who dislike Smith and by a revived Republican opposition. As in the case throughout the South there is here no tradition-shattering acclaim of Hoover as the Republican party's nominee, there is a considerable talk for him as between Hoover and Smith, and that is the way Florida's electorate is preparing to divide.

If ordinary circumstances prevailed now, Republicans would have to swing a great turnover of the party to win out for Hoover, for other presidential years have recorded uniform majorities of two to one or better for the Democrats. But the situation is unusual, and it is to Democrats who reject Smith that the opposition looks for the necessary support. The Democratic split is upon three rocks of Governor Smith's "wetness," his Tammany connection and his religion.

The Democratic campaign is getting under way still bearing scars of the pre-convention split over Smith. The party delegation to Honolulu is already anti-Smith, having been selected by a three to one majority over the pro-Smith ticket. At the convention the Democrats' slogan is to stand by George, Georgia, and was one of the few delegates that refused to participate in the religious quality democracy and the later parade after Smith had been nominated. Several of those Democrats are now working openly for Hoover, and supporting him with the same vigor as the chairman of one county organization is working for Hoover but supporting the Democratic nominees.

All things considered through Republican eyes, the Hoover managers are "pushing" their state will lift itself out of the Democratic column into the Hoover column. They argue that no matter how this election turns out in Florida, by virtue of its steady absorption of Northerners of mostly Republican politics and the increase of its fruit and vegetable production which they require for tariff protection, will before many years become a doubtful and a really two-party state.

Tonight's program for the visiting airman called for a dinner tendered by the city of Philadelphia and tomorrow there will be a trip to Washington.

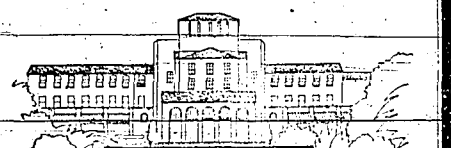
After the mid-west flight the ship will be refueled and start back for Germany, probably the end of next week, carrying an as yet unannounced number of passengers.

GOVERNOR RITCHIE DEFENDS DEMOCRAT

Censuring Smith for Tammany Scandals Effrontery, Says Maryland's Chief Executive

STAMFORD, Conn., Oct. 18.—Governor Ritchie, Maryland, speaking at a Democratic mass meeting here tonight, declared that "Tammany Hall no more dominates Alfred E. Smith than I do."

"If there is any dominating," he added, "Smith dominates Tammany." Answering what he termed "this anti-Tammany slant," Governor Ritchie asserted that to say Governor Smith would not make a good president because he is a member of Tammany Hall would be the equivalent of saying that "no Democrat from the city of New York could be eligible for president, because there are few New York City Democrats who are active party men who do not belong to Tammany."

Name Effrontery
Name Effrontery he said, "is simply the historic name of the Democratic party organization in Manhattan. It has had its black sheep and its black and white days at every party organization has had in every state, city and county of the union. It would be just as reasonable to hold Hoover or Coolidge responsible for the notorious scandals of Grant's column."

He declared that a query "why is Hoover wet in the East and dry in the South" was a "falsehood."

Wherever the American flag flies in this land," he added, "Hoover will stand to the last against the repeal of the prohibition amendment, and will do his utmost to enforce the law, but a quarter century."

He said that Hoover knew there were "evils in the enforcement," but "every one knows most of them are in New York."

Senator Borah assailed Tammany Hall and Governor Smith's affiliation with the organization. The Idahoan declared that Tammany Hall had "debauched New York with its rule of that city."

"To move Tammany Hall from New York to Washington" he added, "would be a national disaster."

The senator declared that liquor control by prohibition is not a successful. He cited his own state of Idaho, which was dry before national prohibition but was fettered by its neighboring wet states.

"The sixth of November will record the view of the American people," he concluded, "in a referendum on this issue. If Hoover is defeated, the control of the liquor traffic will be set in New York for a quarter century."

"The American people, however," he said, "will do as three great presidents have done and select him to administer their affairs for the next four years."

The game tomorrow, depicting the recently enlarged Kezar stadium, will bring together two eleven who tied with southern California last year for the coast conference championship. Idaho has probably the heaviest team in the conference this year and will outweigh Stanford something like 10 pounds to the man. Stanford's versatile attack, however, is counted on to make up for its rivals' weight superiority.

Yet these would perhaps spend all the week with a Gatling gun tearing their neighbors' character to pieces, and refusing forgiveness for injury, all the time praying, 'Thy kingdom come.'"

"We pray so lightly sometimes. The prayer of the wicked is an abomination in the sight of God. But we must forsake our evil and be forgiven. I am sure that you have none of the people I have been talking about in Twin Falls, but we have a heap of them in Mississippi."

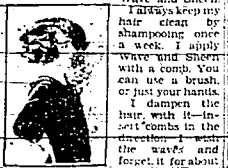

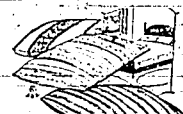

Pilot George King, Garden City, Long Island, possible fracture right leg and shock.

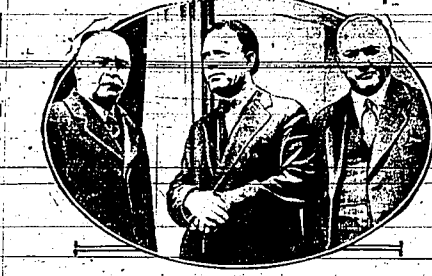
