Governor Alfred E. Smith Res to Idaho Senior Solon As National Republican Party's Principal Spokesman

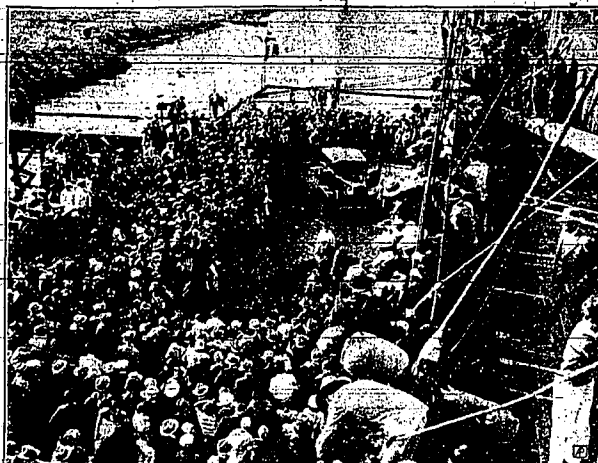
(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, Oct. 18—The renewal of the Smith-Borah fight over the Sinclair interests by Hubert Work while serving as secretary of the interior came for attack tonight by Alfred E. Smith in a speech prepared since his arrival here for closing his campaign in the mid-West.

The Democratic nominee declared that Mr. Work, now chairman of the Republican national committee, was the public official responsible for the renewal of this contract which was this week held invalid by a ruling by Attorney General Sargent. Further, the governor said it was his opinion that the contract should be suppressed if the attorney general's decision until after the election had been held.

TEXAS WILL BALLOT FOR HOOVER-CURTIS

Lone Star State Will Cast All Electoral Votes for Republicans, Believes J. A. Cron

James A. Cron, pioneer citizen of the Twin Falls country who lived for nearly three years past in the vicinity of Brownsville, Texas, and who is here on an annual business visit, is disposed to believe that Texas electoral votes will be cast this year for Herbert Hoover and Charles Curtis, Republican nominees for president and vice president.

"I verily believe," Mr. Cron declared here last evening, "that Texas is going for Hoover. I don't mean that a Republican state administration is likely to be elected in Texas, but my observation leads me to believe that Texans don't like Smith or the things he stands for, and that they are going to vote against him."

"Anti-Smith talk is much more prevalent in Texas than it is in Idaho; and as for the protective tariff policy, I have heard more argument for protection in Texas than I ever heard here. There may be some Democrats in Texas who favor free trade, but if there are, they are saying nothing about it."

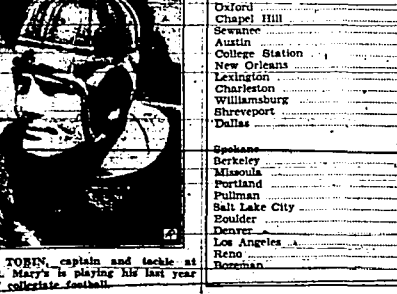

### SERIOUS CAMPAIGNS FOR COLLEGE GRID TITLES UNDER WAY

Two Contests on Opposite Sides of Nation Hold Day's Most Spectacular Elements; 75,000 Fans See Berkeley Game

(By The Associated Press) ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 19.—After a series of preliminary skirmishes in which the intersectional flavor has been sharpest, college football events for the most part get down to the serious business of campaigning for conference or sectional championship honors in tomorrow's main act of contests.

Expect 45,000 Fans. Probably 55,000 will see this colorful affair. Here are some sectional prospects as they appear in advance of tomorrow's kickoffs:

Rocky Mountain—Colorado Aggies, 1927 champions, favored to beat Utah but Colorado college lacking Denver, may have trouble keeping step with the champions. Two other teams untested in conference games so far.

Pacific Coast—California and Southern California, in main event, will decide which is to stay in title hunt. Golden Bears appear to have chance of staying contending. Of the other "big four" contenders, Stanford is idle while Washington plays University of Oregon.

Mid-West—Illinois and Indiana—two of unbeaten teams clash in outstanding fray with Bob Zupka's champions picked to win. Michigan, Minnesota over Chicago and Wisconsin over Purdue.

East—Army-Harvard tops list, with Harvard favored to win. Yale is favored over Brown, Dartmouth over Columbia, Princeton over Lehigh and Pennsylvania over Penn State.

### CARDINALS' ATTACK DAZZLES GEM STATE UNIVERSITY ELEVEN

Mystifying Succession of Reverses and Fake Plays Prove Undoing of Big Squad From North; 15,000 Fans at Game

(By The Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19.—A night Stanford eleven, juggling down the trail toward the coast conference championship, passed and pounded its way to a stunning 47-0 victory today over Idaho's husky Vandals.

Idaho's feeble efforts were crushed beneath a series of reverses that started with the opening kickoff. Before the crushing drive, the Vandals defense wilted in the first quarter, sagged sharply in the second and crumbled completely as the teams took the field for the second half.

Its line ripped to shreds and reeling under a dazzling series of reverses and fake reverses, the big team from the North, heaviest on the coast, fell a victim to the most disastrous conference eleven has suffered in years.

15,000 Fans See Game. About 15,000 persons, heavily chilled, were to see two of the teams that tied with Southern California for last year's conference title, dedicated the new stadium, recently enlarged to accommodate 60,000.

Stanford failed to score in the first period, but had Idaho backed into its own territory three points. In the second quarter, Idaho gave way before the powerful drives of the Cardinal backfielders and the first touchdown—made—came. Stanford, setting at right-half-for-Sims, coming over for the first score. Coming on the field—for—the third—quarter—the Vandals started an offensive that broke no opposition. Less than five minutes after play started they scored a touchdown. Lewis went over again for another score when the game was tied. Stanford replaced Fleischhacker at quarterback added six more points in the same period.

Coach Fernan Warner's new famous "B" formation, an offensive that Idaho was unable to solve. From it unraveled the bewildering reverses, fake reverses and lateral passes that counted.

No one Stanford man played the entire game and everyone "down to the third-string gridiron." Idaho's efforts were smothered almost completely, but what outstanding work was noted came from Hutchinson, left tackle, who carried the ball down the field, six times to gain nearly 10 yards.

Stanford's power was shown in 373 yards from scrimmage, compared with 45 yards for Idaho. The Cards completed 43 first downs while the Vandals made four. Eleven forward passes completed as compared with three for Idaho. Penalties were passed out to Stanford for a total of 35 yards while the Vandals were assessed 15 yards.

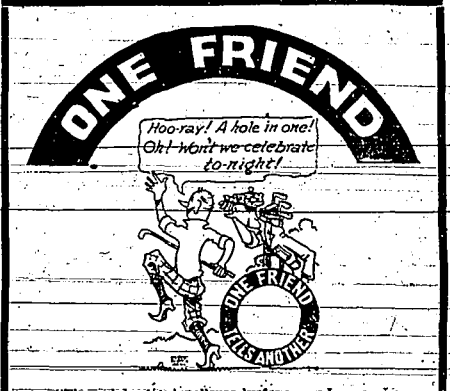

Last-Minute Rushes to Collect Profits Force Values to React On Grain Market of Day

CHICAGO, Oct. 19 (AP)—Sudden new upturns in corn prices today whisked all grain to a higher level. Last-minute rushes to collect profits forced values to react. 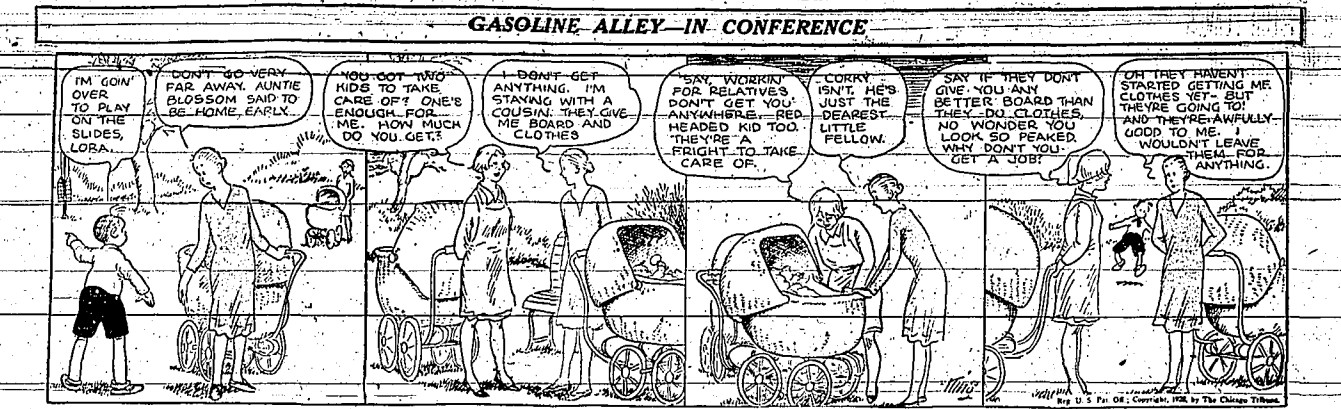

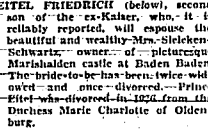
