ALFRED SMITH WILL INVADE BAY STATE; LABOR TO BE THEME

"He's in the Yard," Replie Governor, When Asked Regarding Disposition of Roost-or Tossed to Him in Kentucky

(By The Associated Press) — Alfred Smith's campaign has been mapped out by Governor Smith for a one-day invasion of Massachusetts in an attempt to capture for the Democratic cause the 18 electoral votes which the Bay State usually casts for the Republican column each four years.

The Democratic nominee said today he would leave for Boston Wednesday morning for Boston where he is due at 3:30 P. M. at South station. He will start from his apartment in waiting automobiles to be whisked away for an hour's parade through the streets of the city.

To Face 12,000 Hearers — The candidate will speak at a clock in the arena, which he said, has seating capacity of 12,000.

The governor said he was not prepared to announce the subject of the Boston address, but several days ago he indicated he might talk on the subject of labor.

The nominee today conferred with a Massachusetts delegation which included Senator David L. Walsh, Frank Donahoe, state chairman, Mayor Guinn, Cambridge, and Charles H. Cole, Democratic candidate for governor.

Conditions Satisfactory — He said they had assured him that conditions in the Bay state were satisfactory from a Democratic standpoint.

While the nominee emphasized his plans beyond Boston were indefinite, a tentative schedule calls for an address in Philadelphia on Saturday, Baltimore, October 29; Newark, October 31; Brooklyn, November 1; New York City, November 3. He is expected, after leaving here Wednesday to use New York City as a base and visit the other major campaign points.

At a conference during the day with press representatives, the nominee said he was sure there was a question he knew of a candidate which would be interesting to the voters.

"I would not tell you that," he said. "It is too difficult to ascertain what interest there is in."

Nothing More in Work — He also was asked if he had any other additional to say about Herbert Hoover, chairman of the Republican national committee, regarding the Salt Creek lease to the Sinclair interests which serving as interim secretary.

"I saw your son Arthur in the news," he replied. "It is the doctor's best word."

SIX MINERS PERISH IN WEST VIRGINIA

Rescue Crews Recover Bodies; Failure to Pack Explosives Held Responsible for Tragedy

BECKLEY, W. Va., Oct. 22 — Six miners met death today in an explosion in the McAlpin Coal company's mine 700 ft. below the surface here. Their bodies were recovered tonight by rescue crews.

Rescuers who located the bodies last night after the explosion said the mine was not particularly deep and that little difficulty was experienced in reaching the explosion area.

The blast, according to Robert L. By, state mine inspector, who led the rescue crew, occurred when a miner in removing state fired 10 sticks of dynamite without tamping the explosive.

Approximately 60 miners were employed in the immediate vicinity of the explosion, company officials said.

GEM STATE SENATOR POINTS TO SMITH'S INCONSISTENT VIEWS

Idahoan Says New York Governor "Changed Mind For Political Expediency" During Campaign on Several Issues

(By The Associated Press) — DALLAS, Oct. 22 — Governor Smith was declared to have "changed his mind for political expediency" during the campaign on several of the leading issues of the presidential contest by Senator William E. Borah, Idaho, tonight in an appeal to the electorate of the Lone Star state to support Herbert Hoover.

Replying to the charge of the Democratic presidential nominee that he had "about faced," in supporting Hoover, the senator in a speech prepared for delivery at the Fair Park auditorium here charged Governor Smith with having reversed his views on the "open ration," the Saint Lawrence waterway, the protective tariff, immigration restriction and the farm question.

Reetes Charges — The governor in his speech at Chicago last Friday had declared that Borah had assailed Hoover in 1919 in connection with a major part of the tariff.

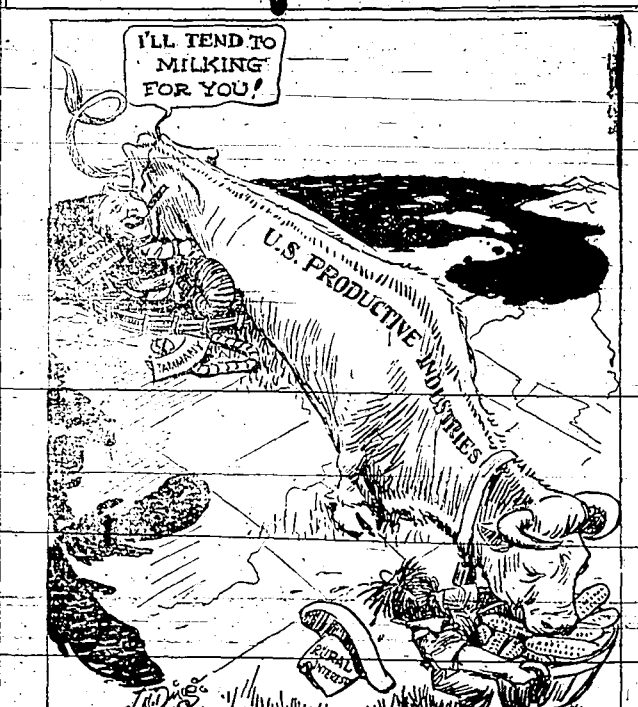

BRUIN CUBS DEFEAT SECOND-STRING OF FILER BY 25 TO 0

Victors Unable to Score After Close of Half; Potter, Diminutive Wildcat, Plays Brilliant Game at Quarter

Brain cubs took the measure of Filer's second-string team at Lincoln field, 25-0. The victors made all of their scores in the first half. Frequent fumbles kept the ball changing possession much of the time. The cubs, however, were in Filer territory much of the first quarter. Vance, cub quarter, scored the first tally. The cubs gathered three punters in the second period. Two were results of intercepted passes; the last was on a fumbled punt. Stumpf, cub half, intercepted a Filer pass and raced 75 yards for the second tally and a few minutes later almost repeated the feat by landing the ball on the 10-yard mark. "Skip" Towan, cub fullback, plunged over a few seconds after the Filer line.

Last Score Comes Late
The lead cub score came late in the half when the Filer safety fumbled a punt near his own goal and the cubs recovered it. Smith went over on a split back.
The second half was staged mostly in the center of the field with Filer making several determined drives toward a score. Neither team could do much through the line and the Filer line especially, filtered through to break up cub attempts at reverses.
Bud Potter, diminutive quarter for Filer, was a shining light. The youngster, weighing only 102 pounds, returned punts through the broken field like a veteran and his tackling was beautiful. 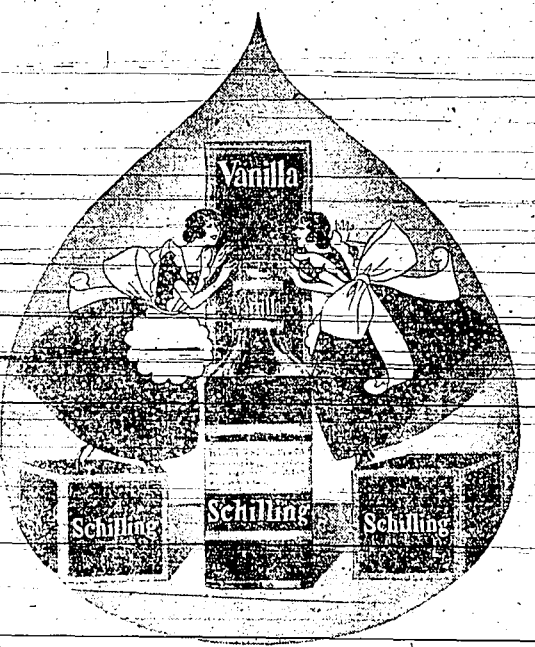

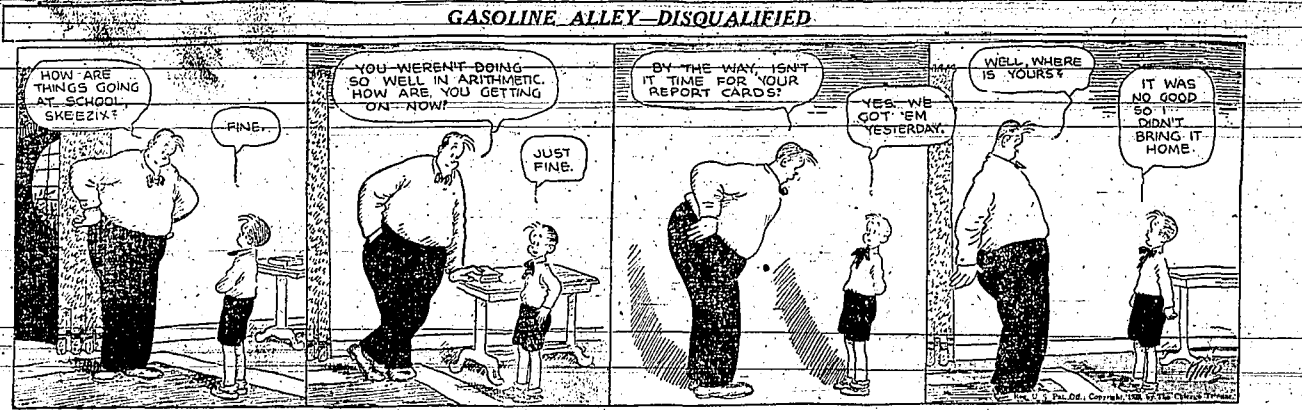
