

GIANT DRIGIBLE ON WAY HOME; CARRIES WOMAN AND 60 MEN

Blond American Youth Stow-away on Air Liner; Vessels at Sea Sight Craft; Commander Takes North Route

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—Carrying the first transatlantic air stow-away, a blond American youth in his teens—the German air liner "Crat Zeppelin" headed toward North America today.

The huge ship, whose arrival in the United States just two weeks ago today thrilled the Atlantic seaboard by her majestic size and power, bade farewell to her American hosts at 11:15 o'clock this morning and turned her blunt nose toward the Massachusetts coast out to sea.

At 10:15 o'clock this morning the returning voyager passed over the ocean a point 60 miles southwest of Cape Sable, Nova Scotia, while at 2 P. M. she reported her position as about 100 miles southeast of Cape Sable.

The ship was then averaging 67 miles an hour and the weather was reported clear. She was about 300 miles from Lakenhurst and hoped to reach her home port, Berlin, richly laden, by Wednesday noon.

The great drigible, which for 6000 miles had struggled with adverse winds on her trip to the United States, was blowing from the south of the Southern route by way of Madeira, the Azores and Bermuda, was to touch at Lakenhurst, and then every indication that Dr. Hugo Eckener would follow the normal Northern route.

It was shortly before 2 o'clock this morning when the "Crat Zeppelin" was sighted by the Lakenhurst, a British liner at Lakenhurst, New Jersey, slowly slid through the great doors and emerged into the night.

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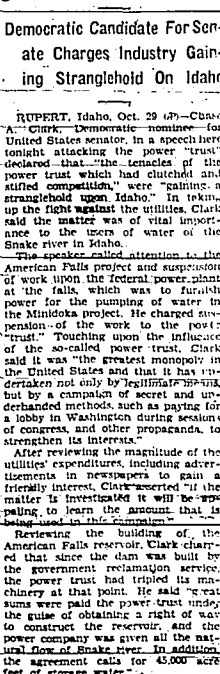

REPUBLICANS LEAD IN WESTERN IDAHO

Hoover and Curtis Will Carry Canyon County by Margin of 4000, Says Shad L. Hodgkin

Hoover and Curtis will carry Canyon county, Idaho, by a margin of at least 4000 votes in the general election, according to predictions of Canyon county citizens quoted by Shad L. Hodgkin, Twin Falls former mayor and one-time Republican state committee man, who returned Sunday from a week's speaking tour in Canyon and Boise counties under direction of the Republican state central committee.

Mr. Hodgkin filled one engagement in Canyon county at Horwax where he said, there were 200 registered voters and fully half of them attended the meeting. Hoover-Curtis Women's Volunteer committee expects to meet here in Horwax before it runs out of membership cards, and called for more of the caucus, Mr. Hodgkin stated.

Democrats will have the fight of their lives to retain control this year of Boise county, which has long been a Democratic stronghold, Mr. Hodgkin declared. He addressed four meetings in Boise county, speaking at Idaho City, Quartzburg and Placerville, and stated three miles north of the latter in Canyon county. Outside of his meetings, Mr. Hodgkin stated, he talked with at least 350 citizens in Boise county and learned that sentiment of the Republican ticket is strong in that region.

Mr. Hodgkin will this week continue his work in behalf of the Republican ticket, speaking this evening at Hetchfield; Wednesday evening at Falls City; Friday evening at Canyon; and Saturday evening at Gannett, and will close the campaign with an address in Buhl next Monday evening.

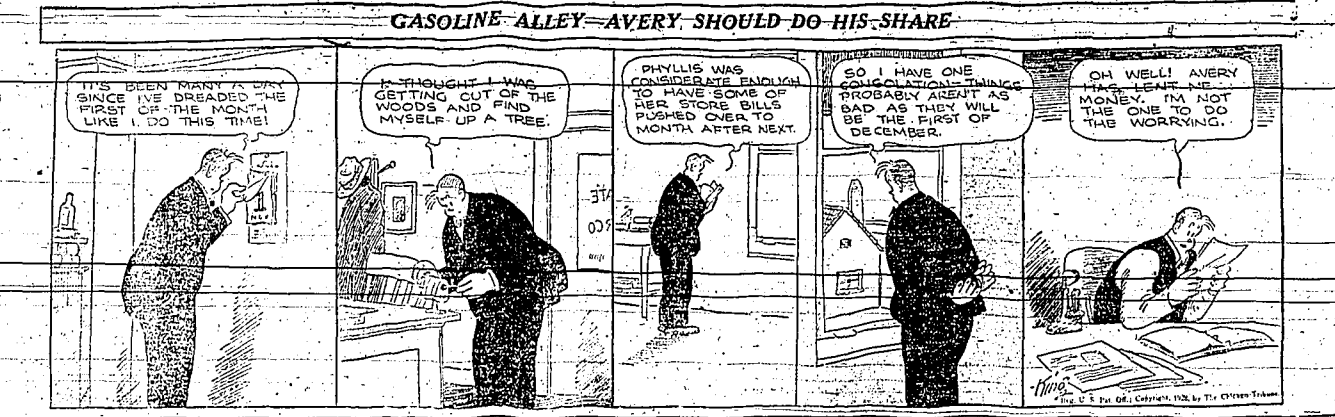

REGISTRAR'S BOOKS SHOW BIG INCREASE IN COUNTY VOTERS

Twin Falls Registration One-Third Larger Than in 1924; Clerk Predicts Largest Ballooning in Region's History

The number of voters registered in Twin Falls seven precincts for the coming general election is 6441, which is approximately one-third larger than the number registered for the general election four years ago, according to comparison of registrars' reports with records of the county clerk's office.

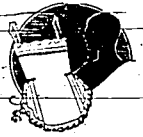
