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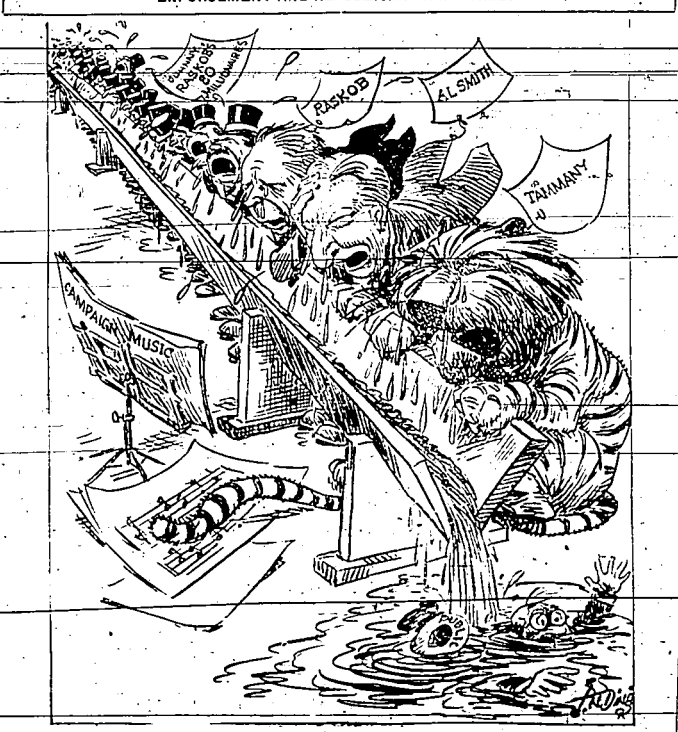

CAMPAIGN OFFICERS REQUEST VOTERS TO GO TO POLLS EARLY

Registrars' Books Show 15,000 Persons Qualified to Cast Ballots; Election Boards Hope for Early Tabulation

A record of absent voters' ballots already received at the county auditor's office showed last evening. Absent voters' ballots will be issued and received at the county auditor's office up to next Saturday evening.

Almost every voting precinct in the county is represented among absent voters' ballots already received. These ballots will be distributed among the precincts on the day of the election and will be counted by the election boards in those precincts.

Distribution of election supplies including voting booths, ballot boxes, ballots, and registration cards, began yesterday by Harry Parsons, county auditor, who visited Buhl, Deep Creek, Maron, and Filer on this mission.

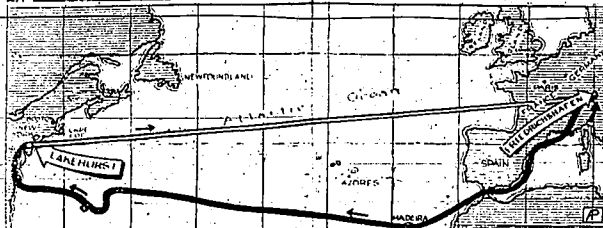
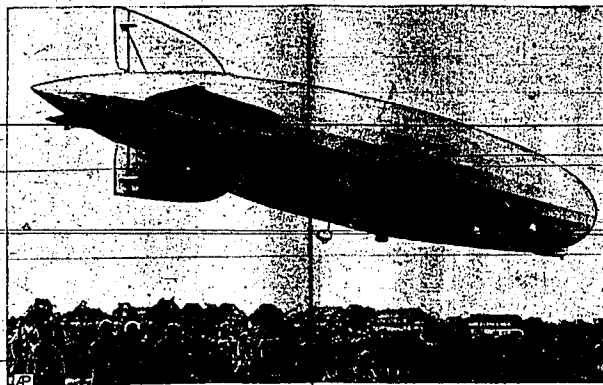

RABIES CASES MORE COMMON IN WINTER

State Bacteriologist Advises Penning Animals Suspected of Disease For Observation

BOISE, Nov. 1 (AP)—It is an antiquated belief that rabies cases of rabies occur in the hot summer, for most cases are reported to the state bacteriologist during the winter months, Dr. J. Peterson, state bacteriologist, reported today.

About 50 heads of dogs come in every year for examination for rabies, Peterson said, but this year promises to fall below the record as only 31 heads have been sent in to date.

Most of the heads sent in are more or less useless for determining whether the animal had the disease, Peterson said. Usually the dogs are killed immediately after they bite someone and the nerve tissues in the brain where the test as to the disease is made, are broken down and little can be decided.

Advises Penning Animal

In such cases where the identity of the disease is not decided, the victim must take the required Pasteur treatment as a measure of safety.

When the animal has been penning up for two weeks to allow symptoms to develop it might be possible to save the victim the necessity of going through the treatment as well as to allow the dog to live.

The disease is 100 per cent fatal, both to dogs and to humans, once it gets under way. Often valuable dogs are slain because they develop distemper or even indigestion, when if precaution had been taken to pen them up for two weeks they would prove themselves to be free of the disease.

The progress of rabies in the animal is such that the animal dies within a very few days after it reaches the "raging" stage during which it can transmit the disease to humans by biting, licking or scratching. With the death of the animal, there is ample time to take up the preventive treatment which is 100 per cent perfect in action against the disease.



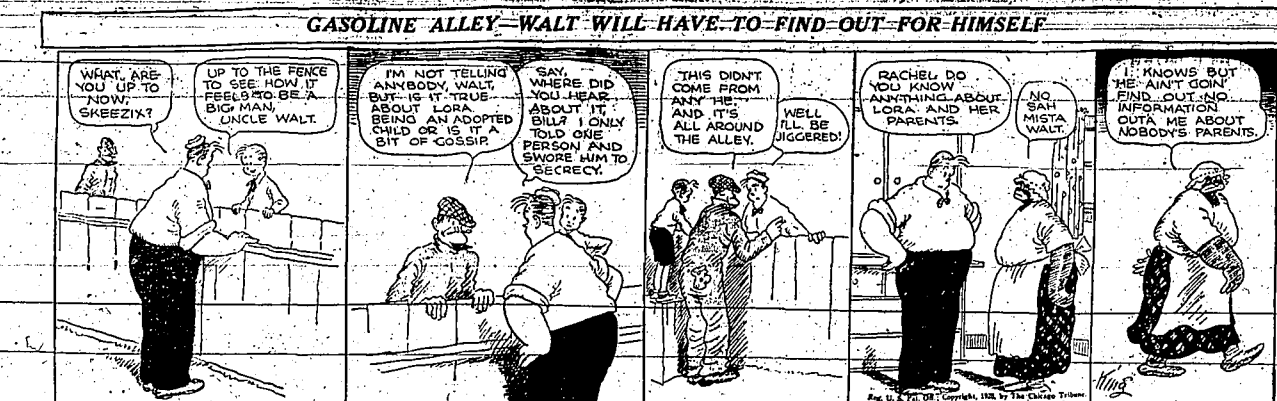

Herbert Hoover Promises to Revise Tariff to Meet Need of Farm, Says John Thomas

MALAD, Nov. 1 (Special to The News)—Discussing the issues of the present campaign at a rally here Wednesday evening, Senator John Thomas Gooding, declared that the Republican party has pledged itself to continue in any tariff bill that might be enacted under the administration the policy of protection to all American industries that are dependent upon tariff protection for prosperity.

Low Tariff Ineffective
"The Underwood tariff bill which Senator Thomas has introduced in his acceptance address, put sugar, meal, beans, wheat, potatoes, milk, corn, onions, and other farm products on the free list or under tariff so low as to be ineffective," Senator Thomas stated. "On the other hand, the duties under the protection policy are: Butter, 12 cents a pound; beans, \$1 a bushel; potatoes, 30 cents a bushel; peas, 60 cents a bushel; sugar, \$1.75 per hundred; lamb, 4 cents a pound; wool, 12 cents a pound, and wheat, 40 cents a bushel.

Farm Tariff Inadequate
Because of recent developments in the agriculture world some of the present tariff duties on farm products are inadequate, the speaker said, in regard to these he added: "Hoover has pledged himself to revise them to meet the needs of the situation at present."

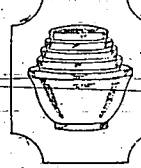

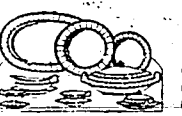
