Republican Party Sweeps To Triumph in Gem State

Without One Quaver Ticket Headed by Governor H. C. Baldridge Wins Battle of Ballots; 41 of 44 Counties Report; Hoover Leads in 38 on Partial Returns; Ross Gets 19,943 Votes

BOISE, (Wednesday Morning) Nov. 7.—Without a quaver in the ranks, Republicanism swept to an impressive victory in Idaho in the election, both national and state tickets apparently being seated with majorities all the way from nominal to almost the "landslide" stage.

Though scarcely one-third of the vote in the state was tabulated at an early hour this morning the trend was already established and majorities which appeared early last night continued to swell as outlying districts began to report their vote today.

Reports had been received from 41 of the 44 counties in the state and of these Herbert Hoover had the lead in 38 counties. His lead in the 205 precincts of the 619 in the state stood at 20,883 compared with 15,117 for Governor Smith.

Republican officials watching the returns as displayed by local papers declared the vote indicated the state's desire for a continued protective tariff upon which the major part of the campaign has been waged.

Baldridge Lead Impressive The lead established by Governor H. C. Baldridge over his Democratic opponent, Mayor C. Ben Ross, Pocatello, was hardly less impressive though he stood the brunt of the attack in the campaign. He had a lead in 27 of 39 counties from which reports had been received and the 276 precincts reporting gave him a vote of 27,648 and Ross 10,943.

That the entire state ticket had been received was evident from incomplete returns from slightly over 100 precincts. All the incumbent Republicans had majorities, that majorities were in the majority in the 205 precincts. No complete reports were available on the completion of the next legislation but the returns indicated a strong Republican favor.

COOLIDGE RETIRES WITHOUT COMMENT

Chief Executive Listens to Returns Over Radio in Executive Mansion Until Late

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 (AP)—After listening to the election returns over the White House radio, President Coolidge retired a little before midnight without making any statement on the election.

COOLIDGE LEFT TWO HOURS AT OLD HOME WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 (AP)—President Coolidge voted in Northampton, Massachusetts, today and hastened back to Washington to receive the first election returns.

The chief executive, accompanied by Mrs. Coolidge, spent two hours in his old home today during which in addition to voting, he also visited Mrs. Lemira Goodhue, Mrs. Coolidge's mother, who is ill in a hospital and supervised the storing of some personal belongings brought from the White House to his home on Massachusetts street.

At the White House preparations had been made for the president to receive the electoral returns by radio. He had previously indicated, however, that he would retire as usual between 10 and 11 o'clock on the assumption that by that time the outcome of today's voting would be evident. Should the electoral struggle be close, Mr. Coolidge felt that it would be useless to "sit on the fence" since the election probably would not be decided until tomorrow.

Upon arriving in Northampton early this morning President and Mrs. Coolidge drove immediately to the Northampton memorial hall where the voting booths had been installed. They were met by applause both without and within the building.

Pausing only long enough to respond to the cheers, with smiles and raising his hat, Mr. Coolidge proceeded immediately to the old home, about 40 packages and barrels containing personal belongings accumulated in the years he has occupied the White House had been brought to Northampton on his train. They had been packed by Mrs. Coolidge as a preliminary for the general removal of all of the Coolidge effects from the executive mansion on March 4.

Although Mrs. Goodhue's condition was temporarily improved by the visit of her daughter and the president, they found her apparently much sicker than on their last call in September.

Grand Old Party's Nominee Piles Up Huge Majorities

In Early Morning Hours Smith's Opponent Gains to Extent of Winning Acknowledgements of Defeat From New York's Governor and Chairman Raskob, Democratic National Committee

FIELD TRITTLE, Associated Press Staff Writer The roaring Republican tide which already had piled up majorities for Herbert Hoover in all but a handful of states rolled on triumphantly early today, as the Far West added its support to the fortunes of the "favorite son" of California. In the early morning hours the Republican presidential nominee gained such an advantage that Governor Smith and Chairman Raskob of the Democratic national committee acknowledged defeat and sent their congratulations.

The farm relief issue, stressed by Democrats in their assault on farm belt Republican territory, made no dent in the wall. Even Wisconsin which was lost to the Republicans in 1924, through the elder La Follette's victory, returned to the fold.

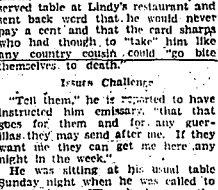

DARSON DISCUSSES RETAIL MERCHANTS' BUSINESS-OUTLOOK

Independent Dealer Need Not Despair, Despite Growth of Chain Stores, Says Boston Financier; Advertising Vital

Statistics clearly show that despite the great growth of chain stores, the independent retailer is not hopeless. Roger W. Darsen said in his weekly business survey, "Four years ago the chain stores were doing about 6 per cent of the total retail business of the country. Today they are doing 12 per cent of it. Taken by themselves, they figure it might be used to show that the chains will ultimately have all the business. We should remember, however, that the total retail trade in the past four years has increased 20 per cent.

"Current trade conditions indicate a larger volume of business than of this time last year. The chain stores are doing about 12 per cent of the total retail trade in the department store trade also showing up well. In considering the retail trade, the greatest danger to the independent retailer is not the chain store, but the number of inefficient, unimaginative, under-capitalized, shoe-string retailers who through their wasteful and old-fashioned methods are keeping up the cost of distribution throughout the whole structure. If wholesalers and manufacturers alike would agree not to encourage incompetent and inexperienced men to enter the retail trade, the independent store would have far less to fear from chain store competition.

Buying Pools Successful

"Unquestionably we have entered a new era in merchandising. Mass production, which is the key note of modern manufacturing, is forcing mass purchasing. The chain store is an outgrowth of the necessity for buying in large quantities for mass distribution. The chain store has many advantages and disadvantages. By purchasing in large quantities it can sell in large quantities, chiefly on price appeal. By standardizing its goods and concentrating on few items, buying power is further increased.

NEW YORK ENGINEER PLANS RECLAMATION OF SAHARA DESERT

American Explains How Climate May Be Changed to Provide Irrigation Projects From Waters of Mediterranean

NEW YORK, Nov. 6 (AP)—Shades of the Sahara may become oases and orchards and more than 4,000,000 colonists will establish orchards and farms in the world's greatest desert if the plan of Dwight Brannan, New York engineer, not reclaiming North Africa is carried into effect.

Brannan, now in New York after having held conferences with British, French and other officials, has made a formal offer to Italy to participate in a joint venture with France in the great scheme which he hopes to execute through a French colony.

At present, he is enthusiastic about the idea of a "great climate" of Northern Africa and termed it a "true Roman idea," says Brannan.

The project would have an average depth of 10 feet, afford water communication for ocean-going vessels, and in Brannan's opinion, change the climate of a great part of Northern Africa.

By means of dykes and dams, Brannan says, it would be possible to divert water necessary for great irrigation projects. Furthermore, much of the desert is underlaid with water, which could be utilized for intensive agriculture, thus making a great African garden similar to southern California.

"I can make North Africa a country where populations can live, crop-raise, and sheep raise," Brannan says. "The Duke of Abruzzi and Prince Ruspoli of Italy are much interested in the plan. France and Italy have provided surveys of Tripoli which make it possible to estimate the great benefit which can be rendered to Italy."

French officials in the various colonies which would be affected by the creation of new inland seas are investigating the advantages of irrigation toward a plan to remake northern Africa.

Lake beds, similar to that of the "dry" Salton sea in California, which lies below sea level and was flooded by the escape of the Colorado river through irrigation canals, exist in Algeria and Tunisia and canals cut from the Mediterranean and the Gulf of Gabon would link these with the Mediterranean world commerce. Short Meljir and Short Jerid are the largest of the lake beds below sea level. Canals with an average length of miles would flood these areas, Brannan says. Another canal would submerge a large area in Tripoli. By this means the narrow strip along the Mediterranean which is cooled by the sea would be extended far inland, the engineer declares.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 6 (AP)—Lillian Boyer, who has been skydiving in the air for seven years, has been brought to earth by federal authorities. Her pilot has been warned that his license would be revoked if he continued "stunting" with the girl-wing walker, so there is nothing left her to do but leave the aviator which has provided plentiful thrills for herself and her audience.

Lillian Boyer's career was purely a product of her own will and not the result of yearning or ambition. Before she started to learn air stunting she had never ridden in a plane nor done any of acrobatic work.

A booking agency in Chicago needed a girl stunt flyer and one of the executives approached Lillian Boyer and broached the idea of a course of training. The girl assented and took to an airplane like one already well versed in the ways of the sky.
