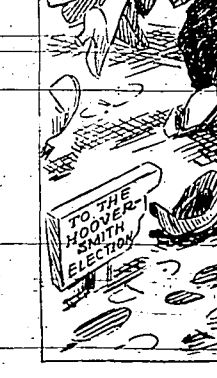

## BRUINS SCRIMMAGE FOR BOISE CONTEST

Two Wearers of Blue and White Out With Injuries; Caravan Will Accompany Braves

Following the usual custom the Twin Falls Bruins went through a hand scrimmage at 10:30 p. m. last night. Coach Jones indicated that it would probably be the last scrimmage of the week in preparation for the game with the Boise Braves next Monday.

Two Bruins watched the scrimmage from the side line. They, Bruin fullback, is still suffering from a bad shoulder and Coach Jones kept him out of the game this week except during signal drill. Bill Bralford, fighting guard, was the other member of the squad that did not take part in the scrimmage. He is suffering from a bad ankle received in the Caldwell game, and it was thought best to let the flashy guard rest for a season.

Tickets for the reserved section of the stands were placed on sale Tuesday and early purchases indicate that the post-boys will go fast. The section will be reserved between the 30-yard lines. Continued reports from Boise indicate a sizable reception from the capital city on the tenth anniversary of the signing of the armistice, despite a collection of Boise as counter attraction that day. Dope from Coach Bralford's Braves points to a complete recovery of Edwin Brues in time to play with here next week. He was injured almost two weeks ago.

Lincoln field was sold last night in spite of the heavy rains of the first of the week. Dry weather for the balance of the week is the prayer of both Coaches. tive office. Yesterday was the twenty-first time that my name has appeared on the ballot in New York state. I am happy and content, taking my place as private in the ranks of American citizens.

"I have a heart full of gratitude to all the people who voted so untrusting to promote my candidacy and to all those who cast their ballots for me."  
In this way he wound up his unsuccessful drive for the presidency as the standard bearer of the Democratic party, and his statement that from now on he was through marked the end of a political career unique in many respects in American politics.

Now that it is over, he said he had no plans for the future after retiring as governor at the end of the next year, except that "an-going-to-work."  
Tomorrow he expects to leave Albany and then take a brief rest before winding up his duties as New York's chief executive.

seeing the election of the first negro to membership in the house in many years, the election disclosed a general willingness of the people to stand by their party, so far as the election of house members was concerned.  
This was generally true throughout the country except along the border, especially in Kentucky, where the largest number of Democratic upsets followed in the wake of the Hoover vote piling.

A Republican negro, Oscar DePriest, Illinois, was elected to the house to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Martin Madden, Republican stalwart chairman of the appropriations committee.

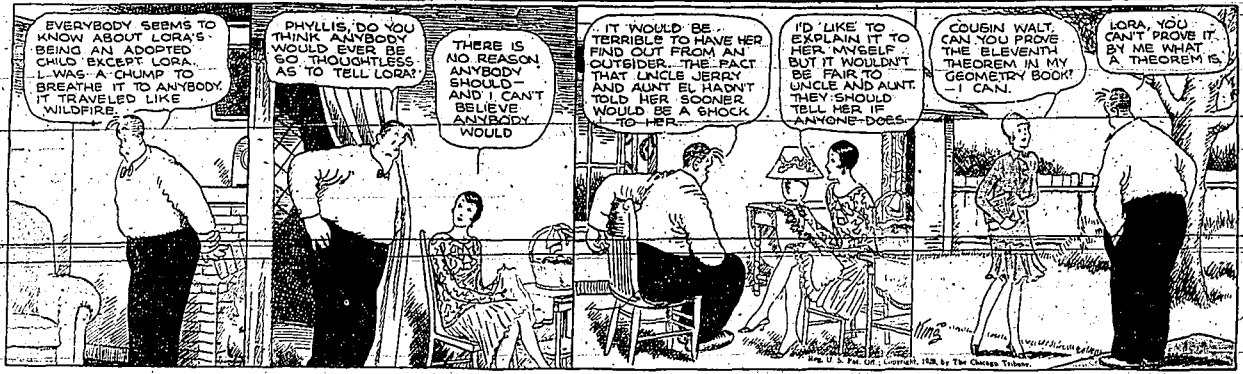

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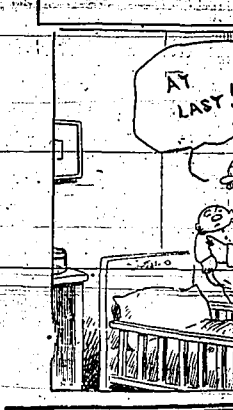

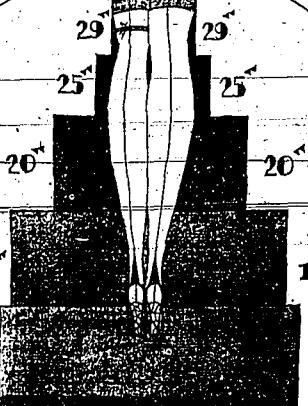
