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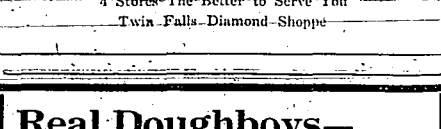

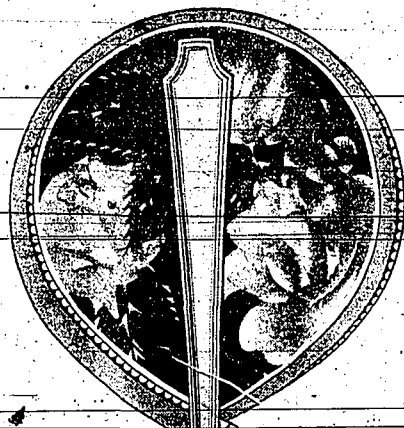

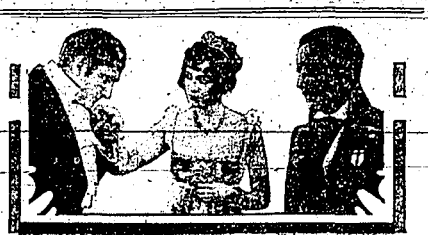

NEW YORK, Nov. 8 (AP)—Gridiron greatness seems to go with red hair. You hear the cooing and bragging these days about the relative merits of Red Grange, the ex-galloping shoo and Red Cagle, the Army's Louisiana lightning. Some \$5,000 will turn out next Saturday in the Yankee stadium to see just why at this stage of the current campaign Red Cagle happens to be the most widely talked of back field ace in the country and as certain an all-American as any candidate can be by the first fortnight of November.

Cagle isn't a 1928 flash in the pan. He was one of the greatest backs in the country last year. Notre Dame admitted it and they may vote him a majority again this Saturday when the Hoosiers try Knute Rockne's latest tricks on the Cadets. But is Cagle greater than Grange? he's a trifle faster, but no more, cooler than Harold the Red was in negotiating a path through a broken field. Cagle, they argue, is more valuable to the Army than Grange was to Illinois because the Southern star is a triple threat on attack as well as a stalwart defensive back. Halley, will participate with national guard engineer units of Buhl and Twin Falls in staging the American Legion's spectacular sham battle with elaborate pyrotechnic display at Buhl-Buhl center tomorrow in Pioneer Monday evening, not only to play an important part in the spectacle in demonstrating the work of the medical department in actual warfare, but to be on hand and ready to serve in event of unforeseen accident.

In the presentation of the spectacle itself an interval in the action is to be devoted to representation of the work of the medical corps and on a scene illuminated by red flares men of the unit will be seen attending to the wounded, applying bandages and carrying them to the stretcher.

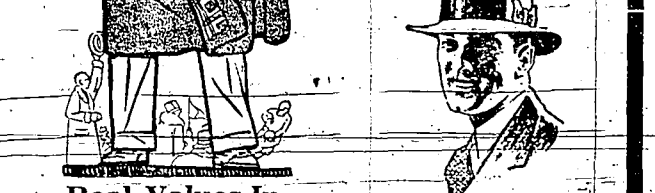

RED CROSS SOCIETY PLANS TO INCREASE SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Correction of Physical Defects of Nation's Youth One of Principal Objectives For Year to Enroll 5,000,000

With approximately 70 per cent of all school children in America suffering from physical defects, the American Red Cross, through its public health nursing service, is planning to intensify its work in the schools during the coming year in an effort to correct these defects, which are said to be a menace to the development of children and a deterrent to effective scholarship.

This is one of the objectives that the Red Cross plans to achieve through enrollment of 5,000,000 members in its "United States and Territories" Red Cross chapter, with a quota of 800 members to enroll, will make its roll call campaign November 15-17 with the purpose of completing the undertaking in a single day.

Last Accomplishments Figures on the year's work in Idaho show that 219 extra bonuses have been made by nurses in behalf of cases, 29 health conferences, lectures and demonstrations have been held which were attended by more than 200 persons, and as a result of 268 visits to school rooms 11,881 children have been inspected.

One result of the work among the school children, it is pointed out, is a noteworthy saving in truancy and delinquency. The correction of physical defects, such as bad teeth, defective eyes, impaired hearing, and dislocated shoulders, results in better scholarship and therefore a decrease in the number of repeaters. Some authorities say that it does not cost a school administration less than an average of \$100 for every school boy or girl who has to repeat a grade, while health authorities state that a large majority of failures are caused by physical defects in the child rather than natural inability or indifference.

Correcting Defects Searching out the defects in the children, which often go for years unnoticed, the nurses make efforts to have them corrected. When financial difficulties stand in the way of necessary operation, attention to the teeth, or the procuring of eyeglasses, they assist the families in overcoming these difficulties. The work in this state during the year is part of a national campaign the organization is conducting to improve health conditions in the nation. In every state, and in the local and foreign possessions of the United States, 745 public health nurses have been working under the Red Cross flag, and in the last 12 months have served more than 2,300,000 persons.

TWIN FALLS DAIRIES UNITING TO IMPROVE CITY'S MILK SUPPLY

Dr. Frank T. Harris Establishes Score Card System; Sanitation Factor Vital in Dealer's Comparative Rating

Twin Falls dairymen and Dr. Frank T. Harris, Twin Falls meat and dairy inspector, are conducting a campaign with view to providing Twin Falls consumers with the best possible milk supply.

Re-establishment of the score card system is a prime factor in the campaign, and Dr. Harris reported that during his first month's work he had applied the score card system to the dairies situated within the limits of a five-mile radius from Twin Falls.

Adopt. Card System. The score card system which was adopted a few years ago by the United States department of agriculture, provides for grading of dairies both for equipment and methods.

The system, Dr. Harris explains, works no hardship on the individual dairymen, provided he is in harmony with the laws of sanitation.

Dairymen Cooperate

Many of the dairymen with whom the inspector has consulted, Dr. Harris reported, are in responsive mood and indicate by their suggestions that they are eager to assist in bettering the milk supply of the city.

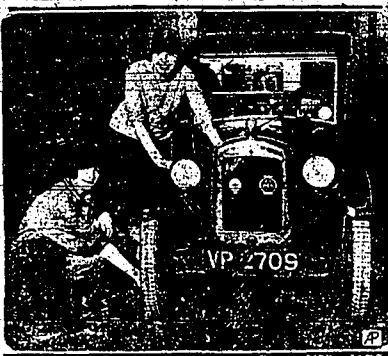

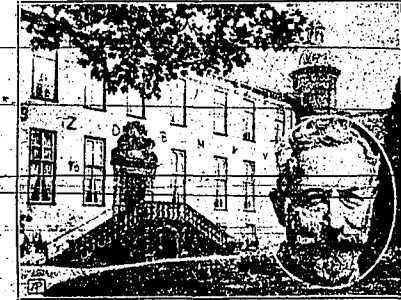

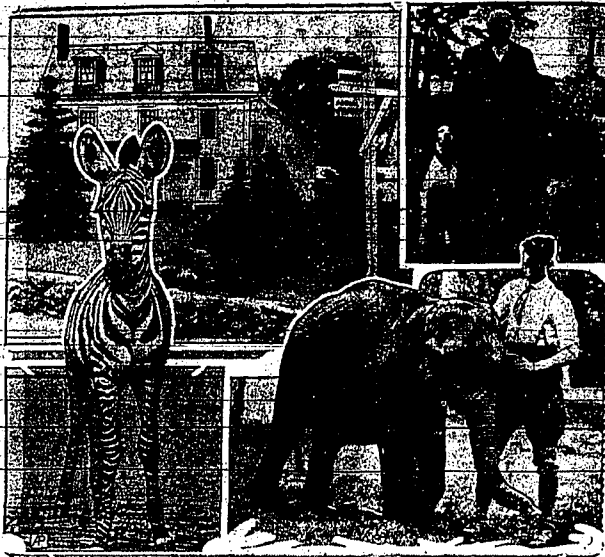

NASHUA, N. H., Nov. 8.—One of the world's strangest farms is laying plans for one of next season's strangest crops.

Near Hudson Center, a few miles from Nashua, a placid white farmhouse nestles on a typical New England slope. If one did not notice a little white sign on a pole near the road's edge he would have no reason to believe that the banyard beyond the house contained anything more startling than contented cows.

As a matter of fact, cows seem to be about the only animals conspicu-

ous by their absence there. There are elephants, leopards, hyenas, bears, monkeys, yaks, emus, buffaloes, peafowl, zebras, African sanders, parrots, pythons, lions, tigers, eagles, lynxes, gnus and other unexpected creatures in the banyard, barns and in the pastures beyond.

If one did notice the white sign in the doorway he would know this was "Benson's Animal Farm." The well-known Alice would have found here a wonderland almost as surprising as the one conceived by Lewis Carroll. Even the paring brook contains its surprises, for out of it are taken, not trout, but gold fish.

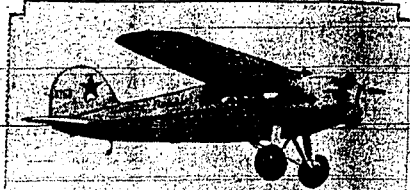
