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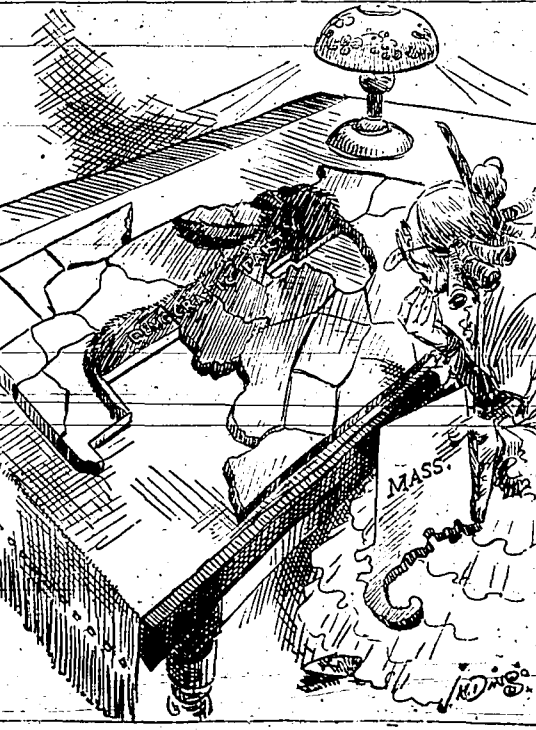
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RED CROSS LENDING AID TO WORLD WAR VETERANS OF UNION

Tenth Annual Roll Call to Assist Society in Work Among Ex-Service Men and Dependents; Helping 60 Idahoans

Work of the American Red Cross for World War veterans and their families is one of the factors making the most generous response to the great Red Cross organization's twelfth annual roll call.

Nationally, the report states, Red Cross chapters have helped an average of 40,593 ex-service and service men each month in addition to special services carried on in government hospitals, camps and training stations where the Red Cross provides an average of 15,965 each month.

Included in the services extended are help in settling government claims for disability, assistance in securing hospital treatment, and the extension of financial and other aid to the families of veterans while claims are in process of settlement.

Of paramount importance, the report emphasizes, is the assistance given veterans in solving personal problems which often present almost insurmountable barriers to their readjustment. The veterans' bureau, which always operates in a cooperative, is circumscribed by definite legislative limitations in what it can and cannot do.

The collection of evidence necessary for the settlement of disability claims is often so tedious and complicated that veterans often find it difficult to proceed without the help of the Red Cross and other organizations. With its 350 chapters, one of which is located in practically every county in the United States, it can procure affidavits, statements, and copies of legal records from any section of the country, while the veteran, working alone and unaided, would find it practically impossible.

STOCK MARKET BREAKS RECORDS DURING DAY

Total of 5,670,000 Shares Pass Through New York Exchange in Day; Caution is Keynote

The stock market Nov. 12 (AP)—The most ravenous public appetite for stocks ever witnessed by Wall Street, together with heavy buying by public and professional operators, gave the stock market the most strenuous day of its life today, heaping up total sales of 5,670,000 shares, almost 500,000 more than on June 12, the previous record day.

The ticker was so congested that traders found it practically useless and were forced to rely upon telephone wires to brokerage houses to keep abreast of news. The ticker was more than a hour late during most of the session, and ran for an hour and 35 minutes after the close, an unprecedented delay.

The feverish enthusiasm of the public gave conservative operators who are looking heavy to an opportunity to liquidate and the result was a wide diversity of losses and gains at the close.

Bonds—Strong; auto rails and utilities advance. Foreign exchanges: Mixed; Japanese yen down; 20 points.

There were no developments in the day's news to account for the unparalleled activity and the market advanced hurriedly on, apparently a day into itself. The buying seemed to result from a general optimism.

An encouraging development was a return to 6 per cent call money. The wide confidence of opinion in the speculative community regarding the position of the market.

Some brokers maintained complete confidence, stating that the present market is only discounting the enormous advances made by American industry.

There was conservative opinion, however, caution was the keynote, as there were indications that stocks were getting passing from strong to weak.

Radio was again the high flyer, skyrocketing about 27 points to a record price at 2:30 p. m. and closing at 288. Montgomery Ward closed at 287.

Several of the pivotal shares were advanced. General Motors, shares, new and old, sagged a point and more and United States Steel closed a fraction lower.

American Smelting made an extreme gain of about 6 points. There were numerous other advances in the day's activity.

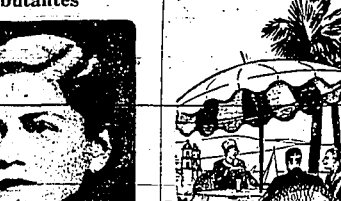

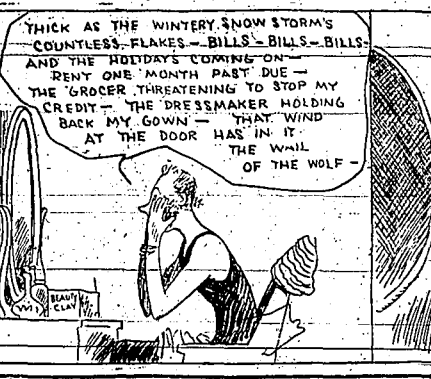
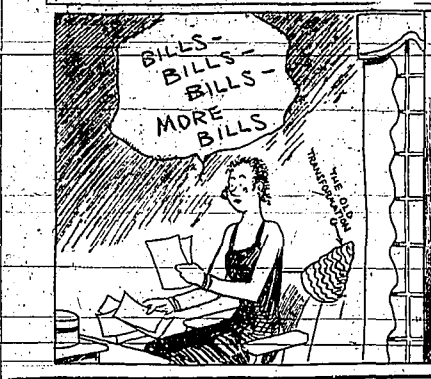
