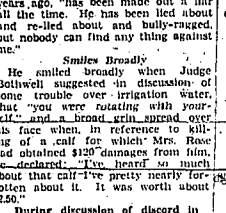

Tharp said at another point referring to his brother: "He said to me one time that he was going to get me out of the street in a week."

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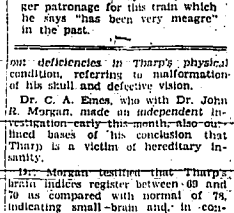

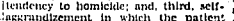

Retention of the federal inheritance tax with no reductions in rates and of the federal income tax also with no reduction until the World War debts are paid also was adopted as part of the Grange legislative policy. "The Grange likewise went on record in support of state income taxation designed to protect the tangible property holder. In presenting the report on taxation, Ralph W. 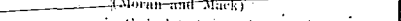

## 90,000 Fans Will Witness California and Stanford Gridsters In "Big Game" of Pacific Slope

### OFF-TACKLE SLASHES AND PASSES FEATURE TWIN FALLS ATTACK

Unleashing a varied and spectacular offense for the first time this season, the Twin Falls Bruins swept through the Granite Farmers yesterday to tally 25 points and hold the Utahns scoreless. Using passes, end runs, and off-tackle slashes the Bruins tallied in the first few minutes of play thrashing 55 yards for their first conversion.

The Bruins had to meet their own brand of offense during the whole contest for the Farmers used everything in the category to drive within 10 yards of the Bruin goal late in the first period. Walker, guard, was through time after time to save Bruin backs behind the line of scrimmage. The fight of the Farmers was expected by Bruin fans and they were disappointed.

The Bruin backs unit was functioning more as a unit yesterday than at any time this season. It would be hard to pick any one of the four as outstanding. But if you had to pick, Warden and Shoemaker, with dashes around the ends, consistently

Not since 1923 have the California Bears vanquished the Stanford Cardinals, and until this season, not since that time has a California eleven had such a fine opportunity. Undeatable in conference play and tied with Southern California for the title, the Bears are in the midst of topping powerful Cardinal squads to finish the season with unblemished records.

81,000 Fans to Gather—Lured by the promise of struggle, as bitter and as even as any these two ancient rivals have engaged in since 1922, some 81,000 spectators will throng the stadium at Berkeley today. From 5,000 to 10,000 more will view the contest from the hills overlooking above the stadium. Tightwad hill, famed in earlier years as free territory, will have its quota of long-legged spectators.

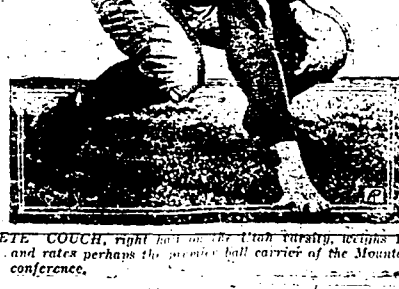
ARMY AND NAVY USE TWIN FALLS BEANS. 25,000 Sacks, 40 Carloads, of Great Northern Variety

Carnegie Will Battle to Keep Record Clean in Game With New York; Nebraska to Meet Cadets; Navy Plays Tigers

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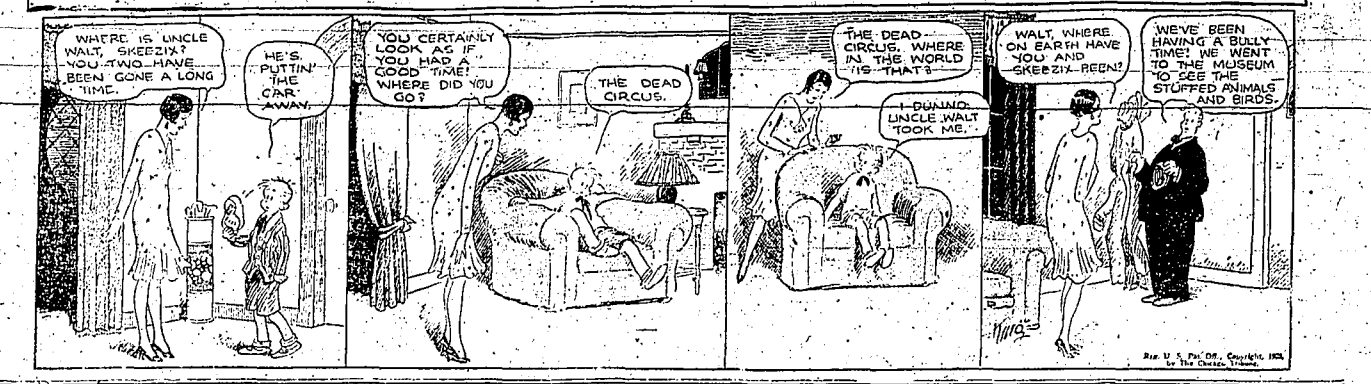
