Porto Rico Damages Mounts To \$85,300,000

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Nov. 28.—A loss of \$85,300,000 in the hurricane which swept the island on Sept. 8, 1918, was reported in the compilation by the official survey committee completed today. This did not include estimated loss of stock, crops, or household goods and furnishings.

BOISE, Nov. 28.—It cost \$100 a mile to maintain oiled roads in Idaho last year compared with about \$300 a mile for gravelled roads, C. P. Humphrey, chief engineer of the state department of highways, said today.

Pocatello Woman Gets Penitentiary Sentence

POCATELLO, Nov. 28.—Mrs. Alice Brooks, who was found guilty of involuntary manslaughter in the connection with the death of James McQuade, 17, in an automobile accident last June, was today sentenced by Judge Jay Bonbrant to serve not less than eight months nor more than 18 months in hard labor in the state prison. Following pronouncement of sentence, a stay of execution was granted with the posting of \$2,000 bond, pending filing of a motion for new trial.

Accused Slayer Insane

POCATELLO, Nov. 28.—Louis Allant, 20, merchant, charged with the murder of Mrs. Florence McQuade, 21, was today adjudged insane by a jury in the district court this afternoon. He was ordered committed to the state insane asylum at Blaine.

HOLYWELL, Nov. 28.—Marie Prevost, motion picture actress, was the first to die here of the Holywell hospital influenza epidemic. The physician had decided she had contracted pneumonia. Final Check of Vote by State Board of Canvassers Gives Governor Smith One County

BOISE, Nov. 28.—(Special to The News.)—The final check of the vote by the state board of canvassers today revealed that Governor Smith had received 12,000 more votes than his opponent, Norman Thomas, Socialist, 1293. This was the largest majority ever won by a president in Idaho. Warren G. Harding won 99,252 votes as against 109,000 of Hoover.

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# EXTREME RETICENCE APPEARS IN REPORT OF KING'S CONDITION

## London Regards Bulletin Favorably; Royal Family Continues Engagements; Prince of Wales Sails From Africa

LONDON, Nov. 28 — Extreme reticence continued tonight to characterize the medical announcement issued at Buckingham palace on the illness of King George. Taken at its face value, this evening's bulletin from Sir Stanley Head and Lord Dawson of Penn, was regarded as favorable, especially when read in conjunction with a letter which the two physicians sent to the cabinet earlier in the day.

It was noted, however, that again nothing was said about the patient's temperature or pulse and that even the rather stereotyped statement that "his strength was maintained" was omitted this evening. The bulletin said: "The king passed a fair day with some sleep. Otherwise conditions are unaltered."

It is possible to infer from the statement "conditions are unaltered" that there had been no diminution in the king's strength.

London is hopeful that the slightest straw of favorable indications are being grasped in London, so there was comment tonight on the fact that the bulletin was issued earlier than had been usual showing that the doctors had taken less time to prepare their statement.

Members of the royal family are going about their daily engagements in ordinary fashion. The Queen of Spain, who has been staying in London for some time with her daughters, leaves tomorrow morning for Madrid in accordance with her original plans. She is a cousin of King George.

All these incidents indicate that the king's illness is pursuing a hopeful course, the doctor's bulletin tonight was to indicate a hopeful attitude. Satisfaction has been indicated by the news that the Prince of Wales is hurrying home. It is felt quite proper that he should be in England during what may prove to be a long convalescence.

He would undertake the public functions which the sovereign usually attends should his majesty so abroad to reorganize.

**PRINCE OF WALES SAILS FOR BELMERE OF FATHER**  
LONDON, Nov. 28 — The Prince of Wales tonight had completed the first leg of his long journey from his exile in Africa to the bosom of his sick father, a trip which the authorities at Buckingham palace persistently emphasize was to be his first and only initiative.

Leaving Dodoma at 4 A. M., the heir to the throne arrived at Dar-es-Salaam about 8 P. M. It was expected that he would wait there for his younger brother, the Duke of Gloucester, who was hunting in another field when the decision to return to England was made.

If that proves the case, the brothers probably will sail Sunday on the cruiser Enterprise. That vessel left Aden yesterday and had 2,000 miles of steaming before her. She was expected to arrive at Dar-es-Salaam before Saturday.

Another plan, according to reports from Capetown, was for the prince to board the steamer yacht Aqueduct and sail immediately to meet the emperor at Mombasa or some other half-way point. At the earliest, he is expected to reach London December 12.

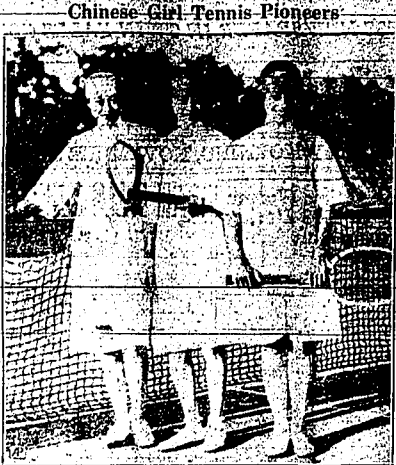

## Dutch-Farm Families Fruit Growers Adjust Seek Land in Florida

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 28 (AP)—H. J. Drane, member of congress from Florida, expects a miniature Holland to spring up in a selected section of this state if negotiations under way with the federal immigration bureau are successful.

It has been proposed by H. J. van Blijk, Dutch vice-consul and J. P. Blunk, retired dairyman from Holland, that a large colony of their fellow countrymen, all dairymen transplanted to Florida with their families and their herds.

According to the proposal, the present immigrants are substantial and successful farmers who will welcome the opportunity to own their own land. The project is being financed by Chicago and Holland bankers who have deposited sums sufficient to equip 25 farms for modern dairy methods.

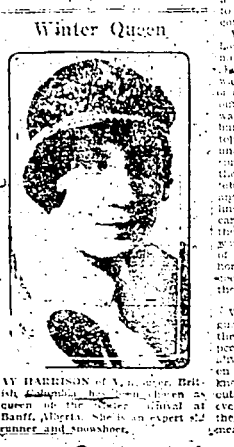

SUIT INVOLVES SALE OF SILVER FOX Pelt

E. J. DeLuche Denies Guilt in Bartering of Hide; Defense Claims Animal Strayed Away

E. J. DeLuche pleaded not guilty to a charge of selling and sale of a silver fox pelt, valued at \$25, alleged to have been stolen, at arraignment in Justice of the Peace John R. Dwyer court yesterday afternoon. Testimony was received and the case will be argued Friday afternoon by A. H. Nielson, assistant prosecuting attorney representing the state, and J. H. Barnes, representing the defense.

The complaining witness, Charles Braman, testified that he has been taking care of a mother fox and her pups, six months old, for Mrs. Rosalia Haddock, Twin Falls, Idaho, since that on November 10 he got up at 3:30 A. M. and started from his home at the end of Harrison street, on a horse named "Buck" which he returned about 10 P. M. On his return he says that Mrs. Braman told him after he had returned home that before daylight she heard a noise near the fox kennel, accompanied by wild barking or howling, and was afraid to get up.

When day came, he said, his wife declared she found the fox on the kennel broken down and dead. The husband with which the dog was fastened, she could not determine whether the fox was still there or not as they had retired to their place in the kennel. That night Braman says he made an investigation and found one of the pups near the fox. He says he made an effort to locate the missing animal at the 7 P. M. on Friday, November 16, but failed.

Clonus DeLuche Away The claim of the defense is that DeLuche was away from home November 16 when the fox disappeared, and did not return until two days later. W. A. 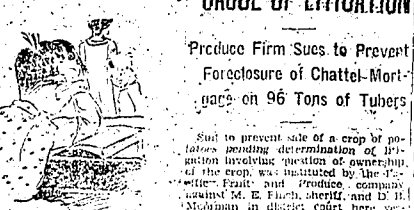
