DEATH THINS RANKS OF ARMY OF SIXTIES BY 15,000 IN YEAR

Secretary of Interior Reports 30,000,000 Acres Coal Lands in United States and Alaska; Pensions Total \$244,222,970

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The news that the United States and Alaska had been cut 15,000 in a year by the toll of time is placed in a maze of statistics alongside the material fact that there are 30,000,000 acres of coal lands in the United States and Alaska, capable of producing 200,000,000,000 tons in the annual report of Secretary West of the interior department.

Speaking in figures roving up to the hundreds of millions involved in its multiple activities, the department's bureau of pensions shows that it distributed from the government's chest last fiscal year the sum of \$244,222,970 of which \$228,965,672 was paid in pensions to veterans and their dependents, while \$14,705,616 went to retired government employees.

Besides these figures which so certainly show the passing of an old order, the report shows that 19,708 British war veterans whose membership as a whole still is robust, have been taken under the government's protective wing, but the largest army of American veterans—those of the World war—is being looked out for by the independent veterans' bureau.

Emphasizes Humane Effort The report of Secretary West emphasizes the humane along with the material effort under his own direction and that of Dr. Hubert Work who resigned to become head of the Republican national committee.

Stressing the need for a new definite policy for the administration of Indian affairs and reporting a general healthy condition on the federal reclamation projects, Secretary West declares that these two subjects represent the most pressing subjects under the interior department.

The department looks to the establishment of closer cooperation between the states having Indian populations and the federal government, the report continues. "Probably states should ultimately assume complete responsibility for the Indians within their borders, but, pending that time there is much to be done by the federal service."

Repay Large Sum Settlers on 22 of the 24 reclamation projects repaid \$5,229,149 during the year and Secretary West attributes this to the general prosperity on the projects and to the new terms of payment established for delinquents under the relief act of 1926.

Crops valued at \$137,207,210 have been grown on the projects comprising 4,925,510 irrigable acres, developed at a cost of \$175,116,945, while settlers are still needed on 120,000 acres. Works under construction involve an expenditure of \$30,000,000 out of the bureau

It added that there are four million acres of oil shale from which 60,000,000,000 barrels of oil may be produced.

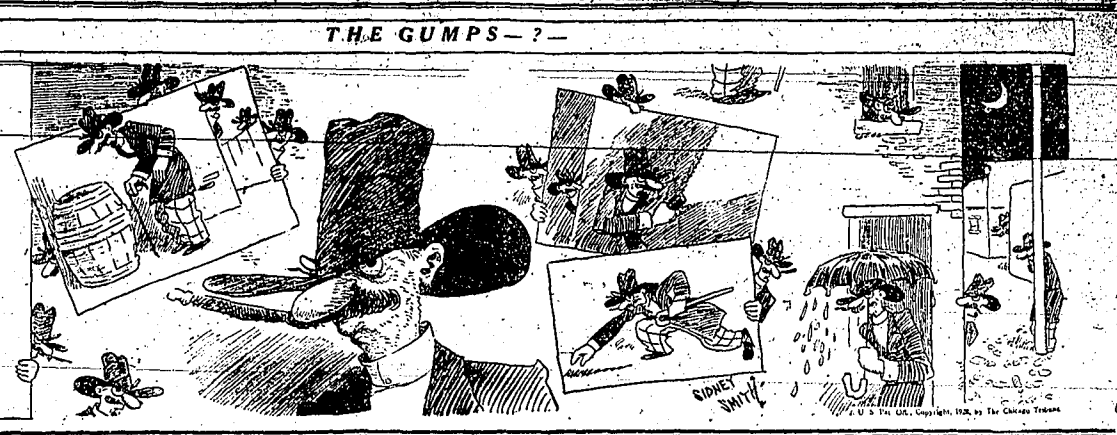

OVER HALF OF IDAHO BEAN CROP ON RAILS

Twin Falls Country Will Ship 1250 Carloads of Product in 1928, According to Estimate

Having ascertained that 75 per cent of the Great Northern bean crop in Wyoming and in Montana and about 65 per cent of the crop in Idaho had been shipped up to December 1, and having shipped what was consigned for shipment on previous sales, the Southern Idaho Wholesale Grocery company yesterday reiterated the market from which it had temporarily withdrawn and made several good sales at satisfactory prices. It was stated last evening by C. P. Bowles, president and sales manager of the company.

Fifty-six per cent of the bean crop had been shipped up to December 1, 1928, and 57 per cent up to December 1, 1927, Mr. Bowles stated.

Total shipments through Minidoka for the entire season of 1928 amounted to 906 cars and for the 1927 season, 1453 cars. It is estimated shipments for the total season of 1928 will be 1250 cars.

It is estimated by Mr. Bowles that 275 cars of Great Northern beans and 275 cars of all other varieties remain to be shipped.

The figures of 441 cars officially reported up to and including December 4, of 492 cars were for shipment. With the total shipments of 793 cars from the same territory up to December 1, it indicates that about one-half of the entire crop of beans shipped out receive federal inspection by E. V. Olipson and his deputies. The rest are sold without official inspection to purchasers in other sections who depend on known dealers for assurance as to quality.

STEPHAN WILL PASS ON OFFICE TERM AMENDMENT

Attorney General Frank J. Stephan, who arrived in Twin Falls last night from Boise on business, said he has not yet passed on the question as to whether the provisions of the constitutional amendment extending terms of certain state officers from two to four years would apply to those selected for such offices at the election of last November 6. He said that he expected to go into the matter soon and would probably be able to give an opinion late this month.

The amendment does not abolish county primaries or state-wide conventions or elections, since the terms of county officers, or of judges of the Idaho supreme court are not affected, and congressional terms of office, which are regulated by the Constitution of the United States, cannot be altered by state constitutional provisions.

SHERIFF AND DEPUTY TO TAKE THARP TO PRISON

Ward Olds Tharp, under sentence of life imprisonment for first degree murder of Mrs. Lois May Bowen last September 26, will be taken today from the county jail to the state penitentiary at Boise. Tharp will begin serving the term although he has given notice of intention to appeal to the supreme court from the judgment on conviction.

Tharp will make the trip to Boise in custody of Sheriff M. E. Finch and a deputized companion who had not been selected last evening.

Two other prisoners also will make the trip from here to the state prison tomorrow. They are P. S. Miller and Charles A. Cleary, each under sentence of from 1 to 14 years imprisonment for forgery of checks, which they had admitted.

TWIN FALLS DRIED FRUIT GOES ABROAD

Dehydrator Company Brings Season to Close; Two Cars of Produce Go to Germany

The Puceneth dehydrator will close for the season Saturday after having run almost continuously since October 5. During that period five cars of dehydrated apples were shipped out and the sixth is now being finished and will be ready for shipment when the plants close. Manager George Rosasco said last evening two cars of 72,000 pounds each were shipped to Hamburg, Germany. Four cars of 60,000 pounds each were sent in America, some going to St. Louis and the rest to Chicago.

Apples this year were better than last, but the manufacture of the product, Mr. Rosasco said, but the season was short because of the relatively small crop compared with the 1927 crop. He said the company hoped to open the plant earlier and to have a longer run next year.

About 60,000 bushels of cull apples were required to make the four cars of dehydrated fruit. The company has employed 15 men and 45 women and girls until about a week ago. Apples are still being received at the plant, Mr. Rosasco said.

Puceneth, O'Brien and two other young men who are alleged to have confessed to a series of robberies in southern and eastern Idaho, were arrested in Oviden a day or two after the robbery here.
