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**BORAH WILL OPPOSE SENATE'S RIDER ON PACT BANNING WARS**

(Continued From Page One)  
Borah will oppose the negotiation of the treaty asserting the British empire accepted the pact upon the distinct understanding that it does not prejudice the freedom of action in defense of the territories.  
"The treaty is precisely the same as if no note had been written by Great Britain," said Senator Borah. "The British correspondence doesn't change the meaning of the treaty in the slightest. Nor is there anything in the note which needs to be offset by an American reservation."  
Senator Borah announced he would oppose a reservation to the treaty which would require negotiations all over again with all the powers who have signed the document. Not did any member of the committee declare he would demand a reservation.  
Will Meet Again  
It was agreed to meet again Tuesday and Mr. Kellogg was asked to be at the call of the committee if he were wanted there. Senator Borah said there had been no request from committee members for further hearings or for additional documents in consideration of the pact.  
The questioning of Secretary Kellogg was done in the senate, but Senator Borah said he would make the testimony later and that he would ask for open consideration of the treaty when it reached the senate.  
After leaving the capitol, Secretary Kellogg later reported to President Coolidge that the committee's attitude toward the treaty appeared favorable. The secretary was of the opinion that the question in the minds of committee members was whether any action would be required by this government in case of a violation of the pact.  
President Coolidge believes that a violation of the treaty would leave the United States in exactly the same position as though the pact did not exist, and therefore, should the treaty be broken, action on the part of the United States would lie with congress.

Procedure for Remainder of  
Semester; Issue Bulletin

Plans for the opening of school Monday were considered and determined yesterday at a meeting of principals in the office of Superintendent W. E. Smith. Uniform system of procedure was agreed on. After the meeting a bulletin of procedure was issued to teachers in all schools of the Twin Falls Independent school district.

Two factors are to be considered in completing the records of the semester, attendance and grades. The bulletin states. In making reports each will be considered independent of the other.

The second six-week period began October 22 and ended November 30. All students not dropped when school closed will be considered present during the closed period. The half-day of school November 29 will be entirely disregarded.

**One Week Vacation.**  
The third six-week period begins Monday and will close January 25. There will be only one week of Christmas vacation, December 22 to 30 inclusive. School will be in session Monday, December 31, and on New Year's day.

The week December 3 to 7 inclusive is not to be included in either the first or second periods. This week will be made up at the end of the year.

Report cards will be given to students December 10. Teachers in junior and senior high schools will spend the first part of the week in review, and will give six-week exams the latter part of the week.

Much time has been lost and teachers will attempt to speed up the work of the semester. In some cases it may be impossible to finish the required work for the semester. In such cases, where possible, the work of the second semester will begin where this first semester's work ends.

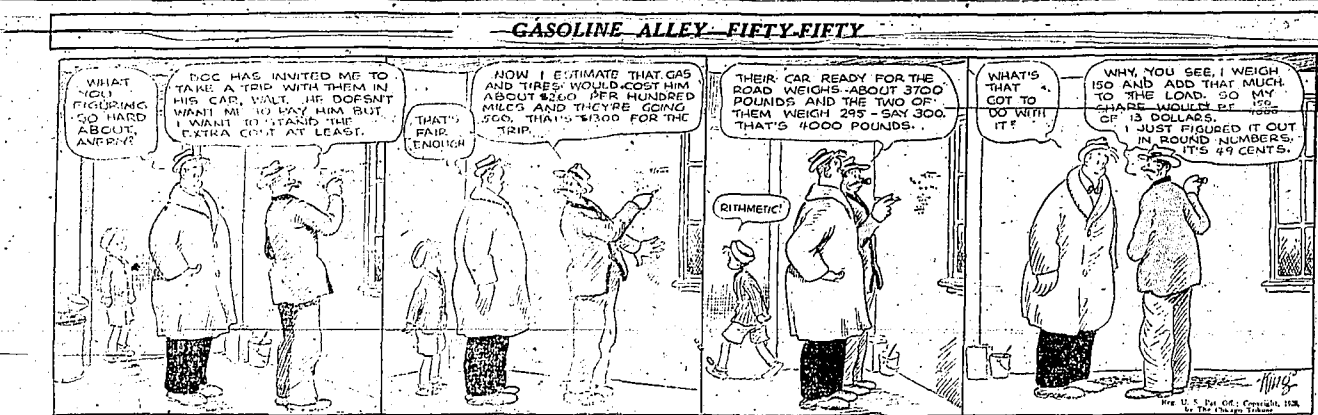

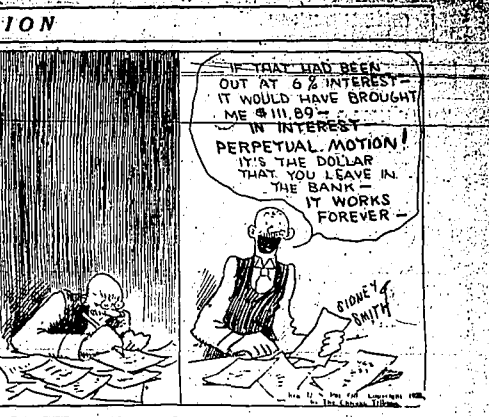

James F. Davis, Frontiersman, Prominent in Western Mining, Answers Last Summons

BURLEY, Dec. 7 (Special to The News)—James Fernandez Davis, 100, was buried here Thursday afternoon. Davis was a trader and prospector. He was a Knickerbocker family from Troy and Albany, New York, who moved to Ohio and Illinois in his early years. Here he met both Lincoln and Douglas and heard their memorable debate.

In 1852 he answered the urge to California, and passed through this country over the Sublette cut-off with an emigrant train. He took up placer mining in Shoshone City, California, and thereafter became known in practically every prominent mining camp in the far West. A fearless prospector, he made and lost several fortunes. In 1850 he went to Virginia City, Nevada, and in 1874 to the Placer district, Utah. In 1893 he overhauled a mill in Park City, Idaho. Davis' longest sojourn was in Custer, Idaho, where he remained from 1893 to 1912. He returned to Burley, The date of his birth is September 2, 1828. He is survived by his brother, Fred, who is residing in Kansas, and by two nieces, one being Lottie Strauss, Burley, Idaho.

And it is further ordered that in case each party appears and answers or appears and pleads within the time allowed, the court may cause the same to be entered and judgment thereon to be made and that no such order or judgment shall be made until such time as the balance of the action and justice shall appear.

### MAN CHARGED WITH HOLDUP, IMPLICATES TWIN FALLS WORKER

Story of James E. Carol, suspect, involves Frank Smith, Cafe Employee, in Robbery of Adele Littau, Waitress

Accused of complicity in a robbery here, Frank Smith, employe of the Perrine cafe, for some time, was arrested last evening by a deputy sheriff and was lodged in the county jail.

Smith is alleged to have participated with James E. Carol, 35, and J. H. Wilson in robbery of Miss Adele Littau, waitress employed by the Manhattan cafe, Shoshone street south, from whom \$70.00 of the cafe's money was taken by the up near as the climaxed the stairs in her apartment in the McCornick building, Main avenue south, shortly after midnight last November 12.

Charges Completely The complaint charging Smith with complicity in the robbery was handed out of probate court here shortly after Carol, who had been arrested with Wilson in Openda a day or two after the holding there, was returned in custody of A. P. Senior, deputy sheriff. The complaint was signed by Earl Killeen, one of the proprietors of the Manhattan cafe. Carol, when interviewed by O. W. Witham, prosecuting attorney, upon his return here, told a detailed story of the holding here and implicated Smith, Mr. Witham said last evening. Smith, according to Carol's story as quoted by the prosecuting attorney, told Carol and Wilson when they arrived in Twin Falls on November 11, that Miss Littau would close the Manhattan cafe at about midnight and would take a certain amount of money with her when she went to her apartment.

### Establish Friendship

Carol told Wilson, according to Carol's story, established friendship with Smith when they inquired of him about one, "Blackie Diamond." About two weeks before the holding, Carol was quoted as saying, Smith and Wilson rode together for a while in an automobile and a little later they were joined by Carol.

Carol said that Wilson held the gun when Miss Littau was stopped at the top of the stairway, and that a purse containing the money was turned over to him. He said that he and Wilson had gone from here to Idaho Falls and then to Openda where they were arrested.

Insurance Agent Carol told the prosecutor that he had been born in Massachusetts, and that he had traveled extensively for a number of years as an employe for some time as representative of a number of insurance companies. He said that he had met Wilson in Montana and that they had traveled together to Salt Lake City and that a few days before coming here they had robbed a "referee" station in Salt Lake City.

Wilson was detained by the Orenda authorities in Openda in Salt Lake City while the "referee" answer for the robbery station robbery.

On arraignment before Judge C. A. Talley in probate court here yesterday afternoon Carol pleaded guilty to the robbery charge, and was held to the action of the district court.

What changes the dipping hemlines in formal afternoon and evening frocks will bring about in hosiery is concerned mostly with color. It is easy to imagine how the irregular borders provide a more exacting background for the hose. Whereas the straight hemline merely lends the stocking at one point all around, there is an entirely new color effect where a pointed section rests diagonally across the leg, bringing the color of the stocking and the color of the gown in longer and closer line of contact. Which probably has something to do with the quantity of new shades one finds on the hosiery counter.
