## BASEBALL DICTATORS SMOKERS AND HASHERS RECOMMEND RADICAL CHANGE FOR DIAMOND

## Weak-Hitting Pitchers Will Become Non-Participating in Batting Department if National Leaguers Have Way

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—A discussion for the most radical change in the rules of baseball since 1901, was made today by the National League at its annual meeting. If the proposal, put forward by President John A. Heydler, is approved by the American League and the rules committee, weak hitting pitchers will become non-participating in the batting department.

Under the plan a manager before a game would designate a player to take the pitcher's turn at bat throughout the game. The same player would have to appear as batsman in the place in the batting order reserved for the pitcher, even if a change of pitchers was made. The pitcher would be relieved of all batting and base-running duties if his manager so desired. It would not be compulsory, however, and if a manager had faith in the batting ability of his pitcher he could permit him to take his chances with the rest.

# COMMERCE CHAMBER RECEIVES REPORT ON ACTIVITIES OF YEAR

Organization Sponsors Movements Toward Lower Freight Rates; Draws Tourist Trade; Cooperates With Farm Group

Inspiration was given to the annual meeting of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce last evening by the presentation by Secretary Novel B. Wright of the annual report of the objectives attained during the year just closed.

These included nine separate movements toward lowering freight rates. The first of these, the hearing of rates in Twin Falls on April 3, had to do with lower freight rates over the Rogers-Wells cutoff. For which much of the data was compiled by the chamber and in regard to which Examiner Brennan recommended to the interstate commerce commission the adjustments recommended.

**Protest Stock Rates**  
The stock rate case was heard at the same time, where cuts of from 15 to 25 per cent were recommended by the examiner. An informal complaint filed with the interstate commerce commission against the present livestock rates from Nevada resulted in an offer by the railroad company to compromise which was not accepted and was presented at Boise before the interstate commerce commission November 8.

The chamber collaborated with the Idaho Wool Growers' association in presenting evidence for congressional

Investigation into farm products rates and testimony to hold advantage over fruit rates; helped present fruit rate evidence, and potato rate testimony; helped progress to hearing on class and commodity reductions made by Idaho Rate association, and helped push movement for Western Pacific physical connection at Wells with the Oregon Short Line branch to that point.

**Attractions Tourist Trade**  
The organization worked to turn advertising of all sorts in co-operation with Twin Falls real estate board, and supplied 71 writeup studies, and other publicity for newspapers and magazines, including a writeup on Twin Falls county for the new edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica. Besides this no less than 47 kinds of descriptive literature were distributed. Adopting the slogan, "No Need to Buy of Mail Order Houses" and "You Can Do Better in Twin Falls" the merchants' bureau put on four outstanding events: The spring opening and style show in April, the Fourth of July celebration, the harvest shopping events, and the fall window show.

**Improve Rail Service**  
Other objectives either attained or in the way toward attainment include: Further railroad construction; improved mail, passenger, and express service to Wells, including daily train service, regarding which a report was made to directors' meeting Monday night; continuance of the federal employment office which furnished jobs for 212 men and women during the year; movement for securing of new industries allied to farm products; highway bill board advertisement; effort to secure construction of new unit of American Falls power plant; assistance in the zoning system and "blue card" checking systems for retailers; petition in seek for better tax adjustment under the county budget law and in the tax conference in Boise; helped obtain attention regarding field here, and cooperated with farm bodies.

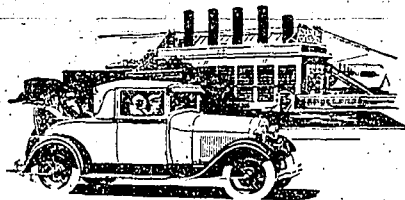

Closely allied to the electrical system is the ignition system. It, too, is of new mechanical design in the new Ford. There is but one high tension cable and that connects the coil with the distributor. Even cables from the distributor to the spark plugs have been

eliminated. Special care has also been taken to make the distributor water-proof, thus preventing short circuits from rain, etc.

The electrical and ignition systems of the new Ford are so simple in design and so carefully made that they will give you surprisingly little trouble. Yet that doesn't mean they should be neglected. Certain little attentions are needed from time to time.

The storage battery should be given water and the connections kept clean. The generator charging rate should be changed as indicated. Spark plugs should be cleaned at regular intervals. Distributor points should also be kept clean and the distributor can given a light film of vaseline every 2000 miles.

These are just little things, but they mean a great deal to your car. You can have them looked after at very small cost by the Ford dealer when you take the car in for oiling and greasing.

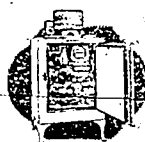

### CANAL COMPANY PLANS TO RENOVATE DREDGER

Purchase of all necessary parts to convert the Ruth dredger, built by the Twin Falls Canal company, from a "two-cut" to a "one-cut" machine at a cost of \$2850 was made yesterday by the canal company board. The transaction was closed with Thomas E. Hyde, Salt Lake City, representing the Ruth Dredger company, Huntington Park, California.

The term "cut" is an abbreviation of caterpillar and has to do with machinery of locomotion. The "two-cut" machine has two large caterpillars and is kept in balance by a bull wheel which is used for steering. The "one-cut" machine had a large caterpillar on one bank and a small one with a ratchet on the other, which proves more satisfactory in operation. It is claimed, than the old and more cumbersome style.

It is said that with the old arrangement it was difficult to get around corners and that obstructions tended to stop the machine. The "made-over" machine, it is said, will operate as well as a new "one-cut" which would cost \$14,500 at the factory.

### SWIFT COMPANY OFFICIAL DIES ON EUROPEAN TRIP

Herbert H. Collins, Chicago, head of Swift and company produce department, who opened the Swift plant in Twin Falls three years ago and spent several days here at that time, died last November 25 in Paris, France, following a surgical operation, according to word just received here.

Mr. Collins was taken ill about three months before his death while on a tour of Europe with his family. He was born on a farm near Kirkwood, Missouri, and had been in the employ of Swift and company for 25 years. He was for a time, during the World war, a dollar-a-year man, serving as head of the bureau of rationing of purchases of the national food administration.

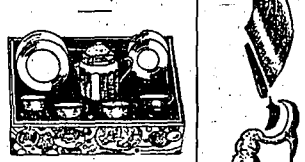

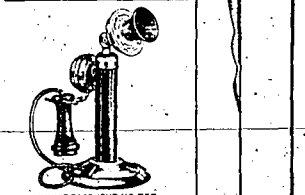

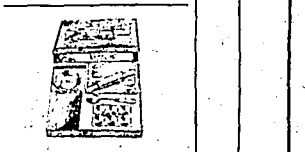
