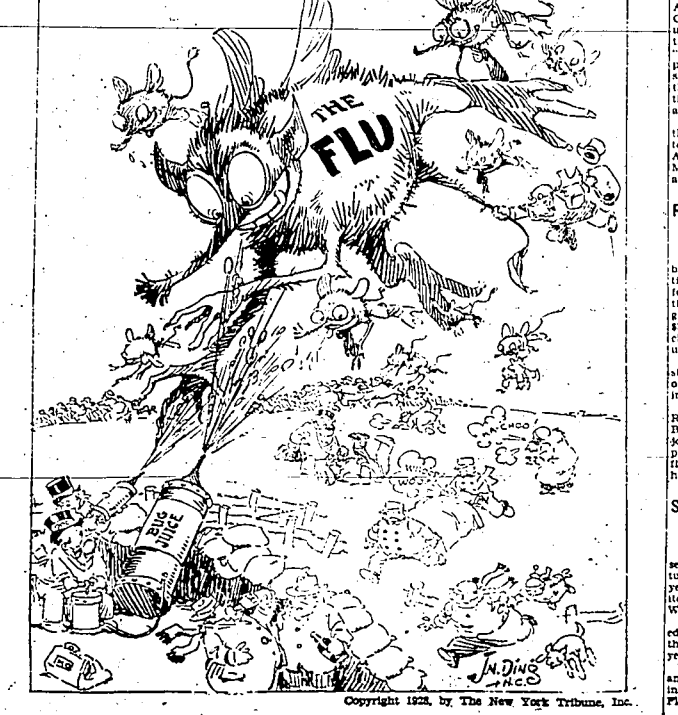
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TESTIMONY BEGINS IN \$10,000 DAMAGE SUIT

Couple Brings Action Against Motorist for Alleged Injuries Sustained in Accident

A jury was impaneled in district court yesterday for trial of the suit of Harold F. Hughes and his wife, Muriel Hughes, for \$10,000 damages from Robert Owen, Twin Falls. The suit grows out of an automobile collision on the state highway between Twin Falls and Kimberly last February 27 in which both Hughes and Mrs. Hughes are alleged to have been injured.

Production of testimony on behalf of the plaintiffs Hughes will begin this morning. It was indicated that the trial will occupy most of the day, and jurors not included in this panel were excused until Friday. The case for the plaintiffs Hughes is presented by C. A. North and Ray Agee. E. Ryborn is associated with J. W. Taylor as counsel for defendant Owen.

Realty Case Ends A dispute over a real estate dealer's commission that had been before the court previously was decided during the day's proceedings when J. Sherman Stewart, realtor and plaintiff in a suit against Joseph Hamilton's realty commission, Hamilton's lender of \$400. This conclusion came after a jury had been empaneled and the realtor's side of the case had been presented.

BOARD OF STRATEGY DISCUSSES METHOD TO FIGHT INFLUENZA

Officials during the week ending November 3, and while the disease now spreading still appears to be in mild form, the death rate has been steadily increasing. Joseph Samuel Weech, Resident of State Since 1882, Dies at Home of Son Near Hanson. Joseph Samuel Weech, 66, died yesterday at 2 A. M. at the home of his son, Miles Weech, six miles south of Hanson. He was born in Utah and came to Idaho in 1882, settling at Fairfield. Thirty-four years ago he moved from there to Hagerman where he lived until 18 years ago, since which time he has lived at Hagerman and Hanson, in Twin Falls county.

Funeral services will be held in Hagerman Monday at 2 P. M. with the Methodist Episcopal pastor in charge. Burial, under the auspices of the Modern Woodmen of America, will be in the Hagerman cemetery beside the grave of his wife who died 20 years ago. Mr. Weech leaves 11 children, four sons, and seven daughters. The sons are: J. W. Weech, Hagerman; and Miles Weech, Charles Weech, and Carl Weech, Hagerman. ERB MAY NOT COACH VANDALS NEXT YEAR

Rumors Float Concerning New Mentor for Idaho; Graduates Favoring Return of Mathews

Twin Falls alumni of the University of Idaho have been discussing rumors floating on the air recently regarding the coaching situation at the university. While no definite announcement has come from any university official it seems to be understood that Coach Charles Erb either does not want a renewal of his contract or will not be offered one, hence the almost rabid discussion of who will be his successor.

Opinion seems to be pretty well concentrated among alumni of this section on the return of R. L. Mathews. Mathews is slated to coach the Multnomah Athletic club, Portland, next season but it is understood that he would listen to a proposition from Idaho.

Possible Successor

Several men have been mentioned as successors to Erb, among them Loren Baker of Boise, high school, Allen Cornell of the College of Idaho, and several California men. Alumni and fans here would approve Cornell, if a man in the state were chosen, but seem to favor the return of Mathews.

However the fate or destiny of the coach at Idaho seems to rest with one man, President Kelly. The Alumni association is not taking part in the body. Despite no announcement from the university, rumors continue to flow thick and fast and probably some action may be had before long.

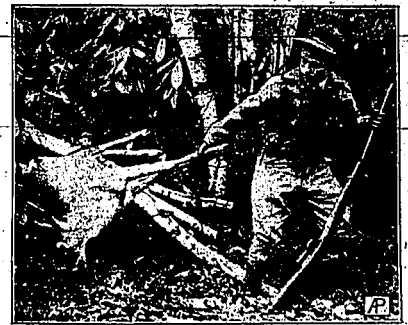

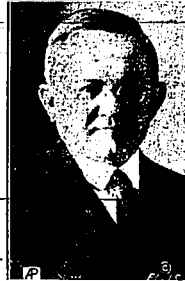

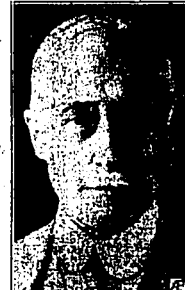

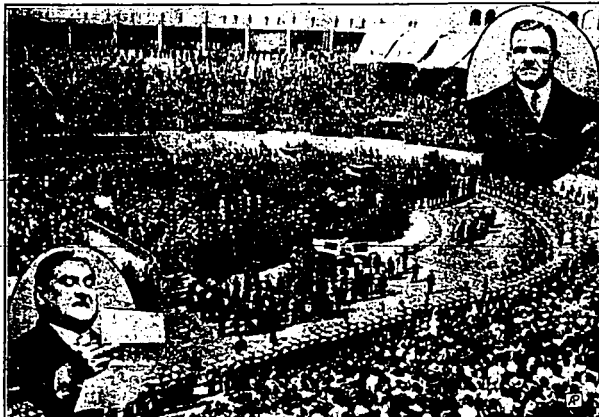

CONGRESS' PROGRAM LOWERS GRAIN MART

Unlikelihood of Farm Legislation Before Spring Tends to Send Quotations Downward

CHICAGO, Dec. 12 (AP)—Fading away of effort to buy grain went hand in hand with reported wide notion of unlikelihood of farm legislation at Washington before spring. In all the grain pits today commission house selling was on a fairly large scale, but the brisk buying movement which had developed during the previous day.

Closing quotations on wheat were unsettled, 1/2c to 3/4c net lower, with corn 1/2c to 3/4c down, oats 1/2c to 1c off and provisions varying from 5c decline to a rise of 7c.

According to commodities received here today, many farmers are proceeding on the basis that no farm measures will be enacted at Washington in time to affect values of general and primary receipts of all cereals are much larger than a year ago.

For example, primary arrivals of wheat during three days this week totaled 4,725,000 bushels against 2,866,000 in the corresponding period last year.

Drainage sentiment regarding wheat was increased by word of enlarged offerings of Argentine wheat to Europe.
