Both the house and the senate were visited by Lady Heath, the English aviator who is here to attend the international aeronautical conference. To give another aviation tie the house voted to award the distinguished flying cross to Dr. Wiley Wright and his late brother Wilbur.

Senator Thomas, Oklahoma, wants to propose American diplomats to be schooled. He introduced a bill to establish an institution for such training in the state department. Representative Blanton got voluntary support from the house gallery in the running debate on the interior department appropriation bill but it was short-lived. After he had made an emphatic appeal about an item on the measure an interested individual shouted: "Atta Boy!" He was ejected by a doorkeeper.

DAM BILL GETS VOTE SOON WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—Progress made by the senate today with its consideration of the Swing-Johnson Boulder dam bill brought the measure to a position where a final vote on passage appears probable tomorrow. One of the most controversial points of the bill, the building with the construction of a power plant on the proposed dam, was settled peacefully today with leaders on both sides apparently satisfied that the wants of all states interested in the legislation had been taken care of.

Settlement of the power plant question was brought about by the withdrawal of an amendment by Senator Phipps, Republican, Colorado, which would have made government construction possible only after private concerns had submitted unsatisfactory proposals. As it now stands, the bill would permit the secretary of the interior to use his discretion as to whether the government or private companies are to undertake the task.

PASSES WITHOUT DEBATE WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—Without a word of debate the senate today passed the appropriation bill proposed for prohibition enforcement next year from \$13,500,000 to \$276,227,384—the highest figure ever suggested. The increase, however, still must be approved by the house where repeated efforts to provide such a large sum have met with failure. The move to increase the allotment was made by Senator Bruce, Democrat, Maryland, one of the "wet" leaders in congress, who proposed the more than quarter billion dollars addition in amendment form to the treasury department office supply bill after the senate once had passed the measure. Unable even to explain his amendment because of the rush with which it went through, Senator Bruce later explained off the floor that "if we can't repeal the act, let's enforce it right." He said he had suggested the increase because commissioner Dornan of the prohibition bureau had declared recently that it would take \$300,000,000 to enforce the law. To support this increase for enforcement, Senator Walter of the treasury committee, objected, but at the request of Senator Kinz, Democrat, Maryland, he withdrew. The amendment by Bruce merely proposing that the figures on a certain page of the bill be changed was then sent to clerk Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, the presiding officer, declaring it adopted without voting even for the Marylander to explain his amendment. As Mr. Bruce laughed aloud to the dismay of the small crowd of spectators on the floor when his amendment was declared approved and the bill immediately thereafter was declared passed. He was off the floor when the treasury bill first was passed; returning he asked reconsideration. When the Senate of the appropriations committee, objected, but at the request of Senator Kinz, Democrat, Maryland, he withdrew. The amendment by Bruce merely proposing that the figures on a certain page of the bill be changed was then sent to clerk Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, the presiding officer, declaring it adopted without voting even for the Marylander to explain his amendment.

As Mr. Bruce laughed, Chairman Walter of the committee, who had read it over and then laughed himself, he showed other members on the floor that they had just accepted and they all decided the laugh was on themselves, the senate and house would not accept the enormous increase.

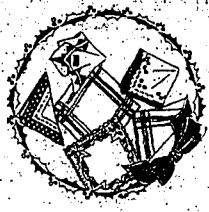

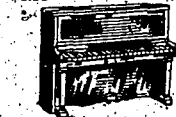

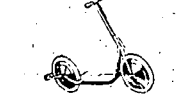

## BASEBALL MAGNATES DISCARD PROPOSITION FOR 10-MAN SQUADS

Harmony Prevails Throughout Session; Fix 1929 Season's Dates; Contracts Not to Be Offered to Players Under 17

CHICAGO, Dec. 13 (AP)—John A. Heydler, president of the National League, tossed his revolutionary idea of a ten-man team to the joint meeting of the American and National league club owners today.

Instead of creating a whopping uproar, the proposal fell as flat as a cocking school cake. It was not even discussed except by President Heydler himself, who presented the idea to the club owners. They talked about it apologetically, explaining he merely wanted to go on record with the scheme for future consideration.

Pitchers Will Bat  
With the idea tabled, the pitchers of both the National and American leagues will bat for themselves during the coming season.

Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis, presiding over the session, had little opportunity to wave the "big stick," as peace and harmony prevailed from start to finish.

Dispute Among Problem  
The minor league situation was discussed, but it was the opinion of the joint meeting that no major league representation should attend the minor league conference to be held at West Haven, Indiana, January 16.

The club owners agreed that no player under 17 years of age would be eligible to sign a contract. They also decided to turn over another \$50,000 to the American League for the next summer to be used to conduct a baseball tournament for junior players.

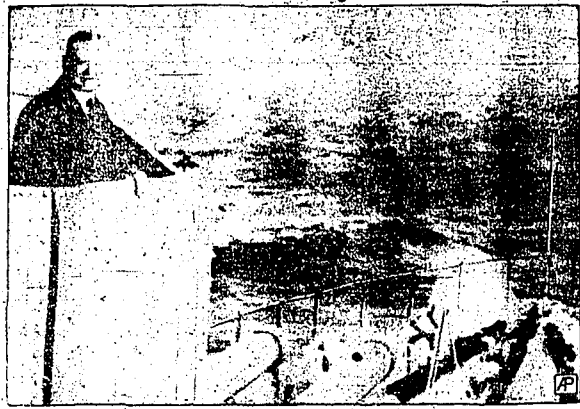

# BABSON FORECASTING REVOLUTION IN COAL INDUSTRY OF NATION

## Fuel Miners Appear to Be On Threshold of New Era, Says Roger W. Babson, Prominent Statistician of Bay State

(Special to The News)

**BABSON PAIK, Mass., Dec. 13** — "When an industry of such and only depressed it attracts very little attention," stated Roger W. Babson, Massachusetts financial expert, in a recent weekly interview. "This has been the situation of the bituminous coal industry for several years. Various causes have been advanced for the hard times in this business, among which the most prominent are, over-production, too much man-power, and prices falling. All efforts at stabilization have failed up to the present time. As a result coal securities have been a leading market, new capital has been invited to obtain, and the leading companies for the most part have reported deficits instead of profits. Labor unrest, strikes, intermittent employment and other troubles have beset the industry.

"Now, however, coal appears to be at the threshold of a new era. Where the economy has failed in advance of this problem, the scientists now bid fair to succeed. The chemists and engineers have come forward with discoveries which sooner or later seem likely to put this great industry on the road to progress and profits. Of course, like all new inventions, they will require a period of development before put into practical operation. The Second National Conference on Bituminous Coal recently held under the auspices of the Carnegie Institute of Technology did, however, reveal amazing progress during the past year in the development of new uses for coal.

**New Conception of Industry**

"The most hopeful development and the greatest step toward progress, is the new conception of coal brought to the public by the chemists. In the future we shall look upon coal not merely as a 'billy fuel' to be transported and burned as it is, but as a highly valuable chemical with almost unlimited possibilities for breaking up into a number of valuable products which can be used not only for fuel, but for gas, oil, fertilizer, alcohol, and many other new uses.

"The time may come when liquefied coal can be piped to distant cities from the mines. In the same way processing of coal will produce great quantities of gas, formerly wasted, and this can be piped to industries and homes in far away localities. The farmers will obtain quantities of fertilizer in the form of ammonia and nitrogen, which are by-products of the liquefied coal. These fertilizers are absolutely necessary in increasing the production of cotton, corn, and winter wheat.

"Our petroleum industry will, sooner or later, have a great additional supply of oil from the chemical treatment of coal. Already the Germans are manufacturing and distributing light gases and gasoline from coal in their country. Thus far the cost of production of coal has been high in the United States, but has now fallen to compare with the natural production, but with our increasing demand this will not always be true. In the future soft coal may become our chief source of gasoline.

"One of our largest petroleum companies has purchased certain patents in preparation for the day when it may need gasoline from this source. Since there is an abundance of soft coal in this country, enough to last over 7000 years, the time may come when this new process will be one of the greatest stabilizing factors in the oil business. It will not be dependent upon new oil discoveries, with alternating periods of over-production and scarcity, such as now characterize it.

**Draw Toward Coal Fields**

"Dr. Baker of the Carnegie Institute has a report of the time when a number of important new industries will locate close to the source of coal supply. He is of the opinion that the new industries, such as the new coal fields, new industries which were not thought of a few years ago, may be concentrated in the mouth of the mine. The use of coal will also produce quantities of gas which will be used for power, and which will be used for the production of electricity. The chemists are now working on the liquefaction of coal, and the production of gas, oil, and other products from coal. This will be a great step toward the solution of our energy problem.

plete confidence, that these regions where soft coal is to be found will enjoy an ever increasing activity and probably an expanding prosperity.

**Would Help Employment**

"One of the important difficulties of the soft coal industry has always been too many employees. As a result the average miner's working time has been from two to three days a week, with occasional unemployment for weeks at a time. This situation has caused poverty and distress throughout the soft coal regions. The fact, however, the total potential has been one of the principle causes of the dissatisfaction and strikes which have from time to time paralyzed the whole industry.

"If, as we may confidently hope, the newer chemistry of coal provides additional industries and enterprises, it will afford employment to a large surplus of labor and help to correct one of the most distressing economic situations in the country today. It would bring a new spirit and a new hope to that large group which have from time to time been bound up in coal.

"Diversification of the industry is just as important as diversification of crops and if U. S. developments which eminent chemists have recently described work out successfully in practice, as it now seems probable they will, we shall have diversified industrial interests in all of the great soft coal regions. From the standpoint of continued national prosperity this policy is highly important.

lary the relative importance of water-power as a source of electric current will tend to diminish. We shall still build large hydro-electric plants, but these will be supplementary to the larger plants of the generation of electricity by the use of coal and gas.

Three distinct possibilities stand out for the future. (1) An increasing tendency for electric power and light plants to merge with gas companies. (2) In place of the many small local gas companies we shall have consolidated plants supplying gas within a radius of 100 miles or more through pipe lines. In so far as possible, these great central plants will be located either near the mines or at tide-water where coal is readily accessible. (3) Instead of selling merely electric current or gas, the utility company of the future may sell both of these products and also have other important by-products for sale lines.

"If the engineers and chemists are correct in their calculations the time is coming when soft coal will be split up into as many commercial uses as we now split up crude petroleum. The prospect of such developments holds out an investing opportunity to those who have investments in well-

located gas or electric utilities. Moreover, it should eventually lead to lower gas prices, which would increase the use of gas for domestic and industrial heating.

The Babson report now records business as 8 per cent above normal compared with 1 per cent above a year ago this time.

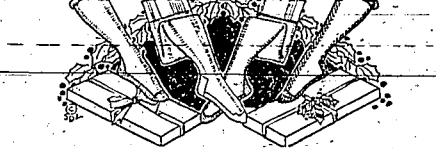

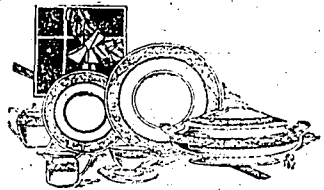

Completion of the swimming pool at the camp was reported.

Scout Commissioner Nixon reported that there had been nine courts of honor held during the year at which 155 badges had been presented. He said that the Twin Falls district now has five Eagle Scouts, 11 Star Scouts and two Life Scouts. The meeting discussed matters which will come before the annual dinner meeting of the Snake River council next Wednesday at the Perrine hotel at 7 P. M. when representatives of all cities and towns connected with the council will convene. No definite action was taken in regard to this matter. It was agreed that the drive for scout funds begun here some time ago should be completed as early as a relatively small amount is now lacking.

# JURY TO PLACE BLAME FOR COLLISION OF CARS

With introduction of evidence virtually completed last evening in the trial of Harold F. Hughes and his wife, Muriel Hughes, for \$10,000 damages from Robert Owen, Twin Falls, on trial in district court here, it was apparent that it would be left for the jury to determine what actually had caused the collision in which Mr. and Mrs. Hughes both are alleged to have been injured, and upon which they are basing their claims for damages. It was indicated that the case would be given to the jury early today, after introduction of some additional testimony in rebuttal on behalf of the Hughes. Trial in the case occupied all day yesterday. The jury was empaneled late Wednesday afternoon.

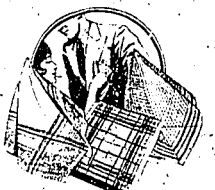

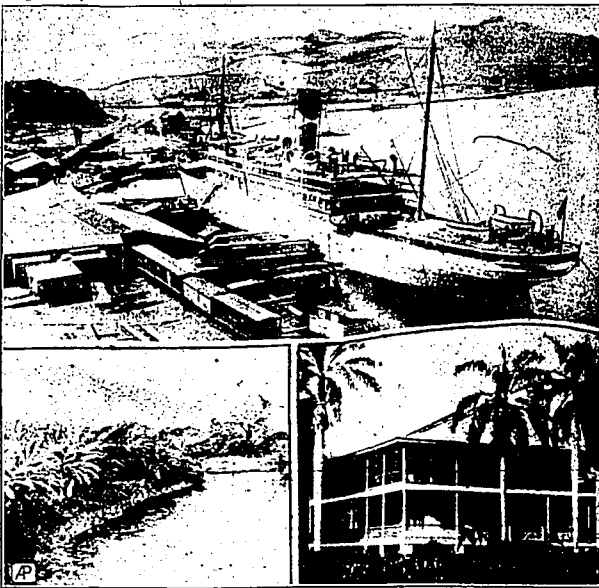

**Radio Increases Safety of Vessels By Speeding Survey of Seven Seas**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—Use of radio and sound transmission through sea water is revolutionizing the methods of hydrographic surveying and increasing the safety of mariners, E. Lester Jones, chief of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, declares.

In his annual report, Mr. Jones says that the method known as radio acoustic sound ranging has reached a stage of dependability and accuracy which, while not guaranteeing perfect performance under all conditions, warrants official endorsement. It has more than doubled the accomplishment of ocean surveying parties in regions of prevalent adverse weather conditions, as it permits the making of surveys during foggy or rainy weather and during the hours of darkness, he says.

Knowing the location of the shore stations by previous surveying, the three sides of a triangle are known, from which the ship's position can be computed.

On the ship is a timing device, a chronograph comprised of a strip of paper like a stock ticker tape on which two lines are drawn by pens that may be deflected by magnets. The first of these pens is operated by a chronometer so that it makes a kink in its line each second, and the tape is drawn at such a rate that the distance between seconds is about one inch. The second pen may be connected either to a sound receiver or a wireless receiver.

The shore stations are equipped with a complete wireless transmitter and receiver, and a sound receiver is placed out in the water from a few hundred feet to a mile from shore, depending upon the depth of water and severity of the surf. A cable connects the receiver to the shore apparatus where the weak sound signal is amplified sufficiently to operate a relay and send a radio signal to the ship.

Of seven carloads that were shipped from Idaho, four carloads were routed over the Western Pacific and three over the Southern Pacific.

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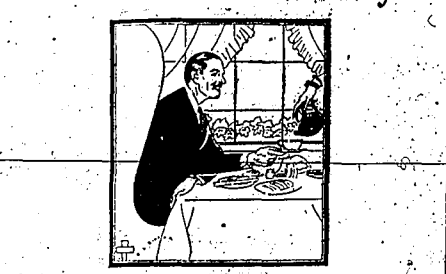

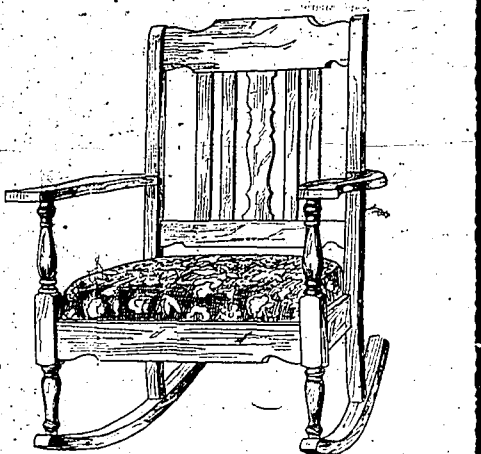

# DUCKS SOUTHWARD BOUND; WILL FIND MANY IDAHO LAKES

## Deer Flat Reservoir Near Nampa, and Lake Walcott Furnish Refuges for Thousands of Water Fowl; Enjoy Protection

(By The Associated Press)  
BOISE, Dec. 13.—No duck flying through Idaho need complain that he couldn't find a place to sit down without being shot at.

Myriads of lakes and rivers cover the state from north to south and the flight of ducks to the southward, now underway, will not be hindered by lack of resting places.

As a special refuge several large tracts of water have been set aside especially for the birds and from which all hunters are barred. Two of these in southern Idaho look up with a series running through Oregon and Washington to Canada and provide the birds with a safe flight southward.

**Patronize Refuges**  
These two bird refuges are "patronized" by literally hundreds of thousands of ducks and many geese, both migratory and native. One of them, Deer Flat reservoir near Nampa, is a long body of water fringed on all sides by a rank growth of willows which give the ducks ample shelter and good feeding grounds. The other refuge is Lake Walcott, formed by water backed up by Minidoka dam.

At different points along these areas the various turns and twists of Snake river and several large reservoirs.

As a result of the careful protection given the birds on Deer Flat reservoir, hunters of Boise, Nampa, and Caldwell have protested that the ducks refuse to light any place else save by low enough to provide any sport along Boise river.

**Boise Shooting Poor**  
Shooting along Boise river has been notoriously poor this year and now that the ducks from the north are coming south hunters are attributing the poor hunting to the effects of the refuge rather than to the late flight of the ducks. Marshes near Sunnyside have been partially drained and hunters who have come from here to Snake river have enjoyed myriads of ducks but little success at shooting them because they follow the middle course of the river.

The suggestion has been made to R. E. Thomas, state game warden, who was recently appointed to the board of directors of the Migratory Bird treaty act, that some provision be made for shooting on Deer Flat reservoir. Thomas is now in Washington attending a meeting of the board, the duties of which include fostering protection of migratory birds. Both Canada and the United States are represented on the board.

**Lack Ice Equipment**  
"Fireade hunters" here are chuckling over the story of a Boise hunter, that he got three ducks because they were not properly equipped for landing on the ice.

He said he saw four ducks attempt to land on a frozen slough near the Boise river, evidently believing the pond was not ice-covered. A light wind added speed to the flight of the ducks with the result that they skidded across the ice and crashed into the bank. Two were stunned and another broke a wing. The fourth flew away before the hunter could capture him.

**Harry Lauder Finds Microphone Device**

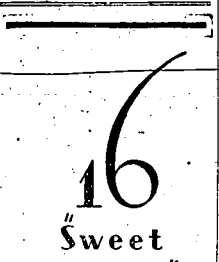
LONDON, Dec. 13 (AP)—Sir Harry Lauder has "invented" a device to improve the broadcasting of the voice.

## British Radio Broadcasting Company Includes Photographs on Programs

DAVENTRY, Eng., Dec. 13 (AP)—Broadcasting of "still" photographs has been added to the programs of the British Broadcasting corporation transmitted here from 5XX, starting every afternoon at 2 o'clock, London time. The Pilotship system is used. This move is in answer to the plan of the Baird Television company to broadcast television in England from a Continental station. Previously it had been announced that the British Broadcasting corporation would demonstrate television, but this failed to materialize. The Baird people then reached an agreement with a French station.

A photograph of King George was the first to be publicly broadcast in England. It required nearly four minutes to complete the operation, but at the end of that time it was taken from the air in London, 70 miles away, in fair condition.

The photograph receiver is in two parts, the smaller of which is the receiving panel and the larger the electro-work-driven machine with synchronizing equipment on which is supported a roller, to which the sensitive receiving paper is attached.

Captain Otto Fulton, inventor of the system, superintended the reception in London of the King's picture. He used an ordinary portable radio receiver with no outside aerial, his picture receiver replacing the speaker.

### 500,000 TROUT FRY IN IDAHO HATCHERIES

Liver Forms Principal Diet of Fish; 1,500,000 Eggs Will Be Carried Through Winter

BOISE, Dec. 13 (AP)—Nearly 500,000 young cut-throat trout are being cared for this winter by the state fish and game department so they may be released in public streams early next year, William Kelly, state fish commissioner said today.

The fish will feed the usual diet of liver and will be in excellent condition to stock when the streams open.

Of the fish the greatest number are at the Sand Point hatchery. There 250,000 are being raised for stocking the north fork of the Coeur d'Alene river.

At the Coeur d'Alene hatchery are 50,000 more; 50,000 are at the hatchery at Henry's lake, and 70,000 are in the Hayspur hatchery near Halley.

To Rear Brook Trout Besides the cut-throats upwards of 1,500,000 eggs of Eastern brook trout have been taken this fall and will be carried over the winter for hatching out in the spring.

According to Commissioner Kelly, the different varieties of fish have a comparatively long life span. In the winter seasons of the year, with the result that the department employees can be kept almost constantly employed taking spawn, both from brook stock and wild stock caught in fish traps in the streams.

Spawns During Winter The Rainbow brook trout stock spawn from late in December until the end of February. As they finish, the wild Rainbow stock begin spawning and their eggs are taken from then until the last of April. The cut-throat trout begin spawning in April and continue through May. After a short summer season, the brook trout begin spawning in the fall and continue until the first of December.

Part of the brook trout spawn taken this fall from Elk river in Clearwater county will be sent to the hatcheries at Sandpoint, Hayspur, and Coeur d'Alene, while a considerable number will be sent to the hatcheries at United States bifurc of fisheries at Manchester, Iowa, in exchange for cut-throat trout which will be taken from Yellowstone lake.

Stand Winter Well

The young fish in the hatcheries stand the winter in good condition in spite of the fact that they are sometimes under a ceiling of from four to six inches of ice in the rearing troughs. Water running into the troughs supplies them with plenty of oxygen so that it is unnecessary for them to seek air holes in fish tanks in natural streams.

They are less active and consume slightly less food. The latter factor is a considerable aid to the department which has much difficulty getting sufficient liver for the fish when they are active and hungry during the summer. Tons of liver are fed at the various hatcheries and the supply has to be eked out with supplies of other kinds of meat.
