The president-elect will have a busy time during his stay in the Brazilian capital as the government has arranged an elaborate round of entertainments, luncheons, state dinners and receptions.

UNIVERSITY DOCTORS VACCINATE STUDENTS

Campus Comedians and Pretty Co-eds Grumble But Fall in Line to Forestall Epidemic

MOSCOW, Idaho, Dec. 20 (AP)—Saint-Nicholas will bring sore places to every member of the University of Idaho. By midnight tonight each of the 100 students will have a little nick as the whole of the institution's personnel comply with the edicts of President F. J. Kelly that the university will not be vaccinated or miss its Christmas vacation.

Campus comedians and pretty co-eds grumbled, but they all fell in line to receive their shots from the army physicians and take their medicine, the sexes differing only in the location of the injections. The first shot was administered by a nurse who failed to be vaccinated or to undergo a 14-day quarantine should she catch the disease. Early today 100 had been vaccinated and the schedule was expected to be completed by midnight. Meanwhile, the cause of all the commotion, the only case of smallpox on the campus, silently went home. GEM STATE POTATO SEED PRODUCTION DIMINISHES

BOISE, Dec. 20 (AP)—Idaho's production of certified potato seed was down this year, due to hot weather and early frosts. E. R. Bennett, extension division horticulturist, said today that the crop of 4019 acres totaled 20,919,000 pounds and was grown by 335 farmers. Six hundred farmers started out last season to grow certified seed but the number was reduced to about half during the year. The Idaho seed was produced in Latah, Lewis, Fremont and Teton counties, though 20 other counties in the state produced some certified seed.

CALIFORNIA PREACHER TO SERVE PRISON SENTENCE

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 20 (AP)—The Rev. Arthur B. Arnold, Jr., was sentenced to serve one year in the state prison today following his conviction on a charge of leaving worthless checks and other financial obligations to religious organizations. The 21-year-old pastor of the Pentacostal church—Huntington Park—California, had been indicted and held in custody for five years and then was "cured" by Almer Stephens McPherson in order to prevent the rejection of his plan, the high eastern of church workers. Shortly afterward he was made an "apostle" at the Angelus Temple, he claimed. Almost shouting that his sentence would "cleanse" him of his sins, Arnold said he had been "cured" and gave Barr a position as a pastor.

KELLOGG CONFIDENT DISPUTING NATIONS WILL AVERT STRIFE

Secretary of State Feels Both Parties Have Shown Willingness to Submit Controversy to Conference's Committee

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—Although replies from Bolivia and Paraguay to "exact conditions" under which they are willing to submit their controversy to a conference have not reached Washington, Secretary of State Kellogg is confident that all danger of hostilities between them is over. Secretary Kellogg, however, feels that both nations already have shown their willingness to submit the matter to peaceful solution by their acceptance of the good office of the arbitration conference and also by the instructions in the two countries to their forces on the frontier to avoid further activity which might lead them into clashes with one another.

CONFERENCE PROGRESS The arbitration conference's activities towards the conclusion of the multi-lateral treaties of arbitration and conciliation, for which it was assembled, were in the meantime progressing very actively today. A sub-committee composed of J. P. Varela, Uruguay, Ricardo Alfaro, Panama, and Gonzalo Gutierrez, Cuba, met to prepare a draft treaty of conciliation to be placed before the full committee of conciliation treaties as soon as possible. Its general purpose will be to enlarge the powers of the existing international commissions for the investigation of international disputes. (Continued on Page 3, Column 2.)

NIGHT AIR MAIL PLANE PILOT FALLS TO DEATH

HURON, Ohio, Dec. 20 (AP)—Leo J. McMillin, Maywood, Illinois, pilot of the National Air Transport plane carrying the night air mail from Cleveland to Chicago, lost his life early tonight when his plane fell in the heart of the village of Huron, during a heavy snowstorm. Buffeted about by a 30-mile wind, the plane, which McMillin apparently could no longer keep aloft, descended with a crash through the top of an apple tree in the yard of Charles Warnke. Then it bounded into a barn. McMillin's body was thrown clear of the cockpit as the crash came and an explosion followed when kerosene from both the ship and the barn and returned to the ground, where they ignited in the twenty-fourth Illinois regiment. The mail cargo was consumed in the flames.

DEATH CLAIMS LAST OF FAMOUS QUINTET

Lone Survivor of Five Youths Who Swore in 1849 to Remain Inseparable, Succumbs

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 20 (AP)—In 1849 five youths met in Chicago, swore to remain inseparable and did remain inseparable through the California gold rush, Indian fights, starvation, a 2,000-mile walk back home and the bloody battles of the civil war. Today death claimed the last survivor of the quintet. He was Henry Ehrenfels, 90, who came to the United States from Germany as an orphan and who rose to the position of department store owner in Chicago. When Mr. Ehrenfels and his four companions started from Chicago in 1849 to participate in the gold rush, they drove before them 200 head of cattle. Their plans were upset by Indians who swooped down upon them and caused the cattle to stampede. Barely escaped with their lives, the five friends, penniless, walked 2,000 miles back to Chicago, where they remained until the Civil war when they all enlisted in the twenty-fourth Illinois regiment. The actual reported number of deaths last year, for the area of the country in which births and deaths are regularly registered was 120,040, against 126,927 in 1927. Heart disease was the most frequent cause of mortality, and accounted for 211,976 deaths in 1927, while cancer, tuberculosis, pneumonia and kidney diseases were next as death causes.

NATION'S DEATH RATE IN 1927 SETS LOW RECORD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—The American people were at about the peak of health during 1927. This was disclosed today in a commerce department report, announcing that the national death rate for the year had dropped to 114 persons per 1000 population. In 1926 the rate was 122, which in turn was a figure considerably lower than that of preceding years. The actual reported number of deaths last year, for the area of the country in which births and deaths are regularly registered was 120,040, against 126,927 in 1927. Heart disease was the most frequent cause of mortality, and accounted for 211,976 deaths in 1927, while cancer, tuberculosis, pneumonia and kidney diseases were next as death causes.

RAILWAY CONDUCTOR DIES WHILE RUNNING TO PHONE

GREENSBURG, Ind., Dec. 20 (AP)—Patrick J. Maloney, 64, Big Four railroad conductor of Cincinnati, Ohio, dropped dead of heart disease today after running several blocks to a telephone to inform railroad officials of an accident in which two persons were killed. AVIATOR SETS RECORD FOR ENDURANCE FLYING

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Dec. 20 (AP)—Flying in an open plane through rain and sleet, Miss Viola Green aligned aloft today longer than any woman flying alone has ever done before. She took off before dawn, bundled in fur, and alighted in mid-afternoon, after a flight of 8 hours, 6 minutes and 30 seconds. Miss Green, who learned to fly at Curtis field, has about 120 hours of solo flying behind her and plans other exploits in the near future. To finance her aviation ventures, she has worked intermittently as a restaurant waitress and cashier.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20 (AP)—The Waldorf-Astoria Hotel—the Bechtel-Engineering corporation was announced tonight by Lutha M. Doomer, president of the Waldorf-Astoria Realty corporation. The purchase price was not revealed but it was recently reported that the hotel was valued at more than \$16,000,000 for the property. Demolition of the hotel will not begin until next June and its operation during the meantime will be unimpeded.

RIVER PARTY NEARS ABANDONED SCOW IN HUNT FOR IDAHOANS

Search for Hansen Couple Narrows Down to Isolated Portion of Grand Canyon, 13 Miles Below Diamond Creek

(By The Associated Press) GRAND CANYON, Ariz., Dec. 20—The search for Mr. and Mrs. Glenn R. Hyde, venturosome, Hansen, Idaho, couple narrowed down to an isolated portion of the Grand canyon of the Colorado river, 13 miles below Diamond creek today.

Searching parties redoubled their efforts following the discovery by army airplane observers of the home-made scow stranded on a jagged rock. Kolb, the only living man who has twice traversed the river, and the Powell expedition, said that he thought the Hydies might be found under the canyon. 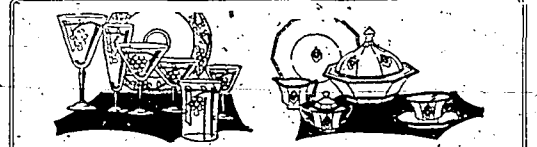

# REFERENDUM BALLOT TO BRING SOLUTION OF PROBLEM OF TAX

## County Unit Plan Draws Largest Attendance of Sessions of State Chamber; Proposal For Commission Disfavored

BOISE, Dec. 20.—Representatives from 30 counties of Idaho attended the first annual taxation conference which met in Boise, December 13 and 14, under the auspices of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce to discuss ways and means of modernizing Idaho's taxation system and relieving the burden now borne by real property. More than 200 delegates registered.

For two full days the discussion carried on resulting all subjects on the program and sometimes branching out in heated debate on other subjects before the chairman, H. E. Shepherd, president of the state chamber, could guide the thought back to the original subject.

At the conclusion of the conference Mr. Shepherd said he thought those who participated in the conference and attended the sessions benefited because of the open discussion and hoped that similar meetings could be held from year to year.

Plan Referendum Voted  
The conference did not go on record as favoring or disfavoring any of the subjects or plans submitted. Mr. Shepherd said he thought the group too small to give a representative cross-section of the state. All subjects discussed, however, will be brought before another meeting of the state in the form of a referendum by the state chamber. Each subject discussed at the conference will be taken up in the referendum with the arguments both for and against presented. The speaker will be asked to vote on the question of whether or not they favor such a plan. The will of the people expressed by this vote will be transmitted to the legislature for its consideration.

After an opening address by Governor E. B. Bradidge, which emphasized the value of such open discussion, the meeting plunged into a consideration of what is known in Idaho as the "Indiana plan." This plan presupposes the creation of a tax commission with special power to raise lawyers and accountants of the state may bring their taxation troubles before the commission and have them reviewed. The commission would have power to reduce taxes and curb bond issues but no power to increase them.

Dismiss Tax Commission  
John D. Robertson, chairman of the state chamber taxation committee, emphasized the subject called attention to the economic damage made when Idaho had a tax commission and what might be done if this body were retained in Idaho.

Objections to the plan may be summarized in the six reasons for not adopting it:

1. Creating a new commission means additional expense.
2. Delegates too much power.
3. Appointive features permits it to be made a political football.
4. Most functions could be delegated to existing agencies.
5. Requires expensive changes in constitution.
6. Indiana plan is in experimental stage. Better go slowly.

Mr. Shepherd called attention to the fact that Idaho had saved nearly \$10,000,000 in the years of 1923-1927 inclusive.

Donald Callahan, Shoshone county senator, advocated the plan of local assessments made locally. He felt this would bring about a more even equalization than any other plan.

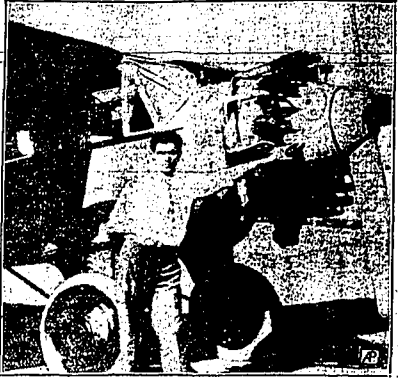
Discuss Sales Tax  
In the afternoon the sales tax subject was brought up by Mr. Shepherd. Discussion centered on taxation which members of the Idaho State Chamber, which co-operating with the state chamber in the present investigation, stood by such a tax, delegates from a dozen Idaho cities and towns presented national and state resources against any such tax. They were deluged by subsidies. Practically all opponents of the sales tax, they were willing to pay more tax if necessary, but pleaded that it be not in the form of a sales tax. A great many of them urged an income tax as something they could pay in a lump sum and forget about it.

The closing time of the first day's program was given over to hearing the report of the state chamber on amusement taxes. They claimed they were already overtaxed and making no profit if they were taxed additionally they must necessarily pass it on to their patrons who are mostly the working class of people including farmers.

Many Hear W. D. Vincent  
The most crowded session of the conference was the one which occurred to hear W. D. Vincent, commissioner of education, present a plan of county unit administration of which, in his opinion, would work in Idaho. He gave the experience of other states where the unit plan is in effect. The highest dividend the unit plan will pay, he declared, will be to the school child. He expects a doubling of the number of children in high school attendance if the unit plan is adopted. For every child now in high school there are six in the high school are out. A survey of parts of 28 counties showed Idaho has 1 in 24 pupils retarded. Utah has 1 in 17, Arizona 1 in 16, California 1 in 7, and Indiana 1 in 2.

equal to bare land in the immediate vicinity or a nominal tax of from 10 cents to 20 cents per acre have been placed against this land. In addition is the yield tax of about 25 per cent of the gross value of the logs to be paid when the timber is cut.

R. E. Whitten, Boise county senator, favors the yield tax, but he also made a strong plea for holding the forests on the land as long as possible in order to preserve the watersheds and save the cost of building artificial reserves.

The next subject proposed for discussion was the extension of the county budget law to other subdivisions of the state. Frank E. Smith, Washington county auditor, said auditors of the state were almost unanimous in favor of the budget, but they thought some of the machinery needed repairing and asked that they be called before the legislature to look into the question of amending the law.

The last question discussed was whether or not municipally owned utilities should be required to make reports to the public utilities commission just as the private utilities. J. M. Lampert, Boise, thought the possibility of publicity should be thrown on such reports just as it is on reports of private concerns. Mr. Underhill, city clerk of Idaho Falls, in opposing action, gave the history of the Idaho Falls light, power, and water plant.

He said electric and water rates were no higher and that the surplus of income over expenditures had made it possible greatly to reduce the city levy.

The city attorney of Buhl endorsed what Mr. Underhill said and declared that if Idaho Falls was satisfied with the way the utilities of the city were being run it was nobody's business.

Friday afternoon the conference took up forest taxation and John D. Robertson emphasized the fact that timber land but already 50 per cent of this acreage has been cut-over or burned. Something must be done to protect the remaining forests and the cut-over land so there will be wood for future generations. Much cut-over land is reverting to public ownership because operators cannot afford to pay the taxes against it.

There is a nation-wide movement, he declared, to give holders of cut-over land bonuses by exempting them from taxation provided they will plant trees on the young growth from fire. He also advocated a yield tax on the timber taken from the land when it is cut.

W. H. Hamblin, chairman of the forest taxation committee of the Western States Foresters conference, which met in Boise last August, gave the trend in forest taxation over the country. He said many states have realized that something must be done to reforest cut-over lands and 19 have taken steps in this direction. Many have adopted the yield tax.

Levy Nominal Taxes  
At the same time, he said, it must be noted that forest taxation must have some income. It cannot wait for timber to ripen. To provide this, he said, nominal assessments

State Chamber Neutral  
Several times through the conference President Shepherd emphasized the fact that the state chamber of commerce was not advocating or opposing any of the subjects brought before the delegates for discussion.

The chamber is interested in Idaho, he said, and if any of these things are worthwhile and will help Idaho people we want to find out about them and put them into effect.

Infant Death Rate Tending Downward

Agencies For Child and Maternal Care Save Lives of 24,500 Babies During Last Year

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—Lives of 24,500 babies in the United States were saved last year as a result of the work of various agencies for child and maternal care, the children's bureau of the department of labor reports.

The infant mortality rate was the lowest in the history of the United States, the bureau states through its chief, Miss Grace Abbott.

The estimate of the babies saved is based on the death rate prevailing in 1921 before the Sheppard-Towner bill providing for state and federal care for mothers and infants was passed. According to the bureau's figures the 1928 baby has just twice the chance of living out his first year that a baby born in 1921 had.

The children's bureau has cooperated with the states in the development of an educational program for the promotion of the health of mothers and babies. Last year was the sixth that the funds created by the maternity and infancy act have been available. Forty-five states and the territory of Hawaii participate in the campaign to raise healthy and happy babies and to save the lives of mothers.

Thousands of pre-natal and child health conferences were held. Nurses on state staffs made more than 600,000 visits to homes of expectant mothers, helping them plan for better prenatal care for their babies. More than 150,000 expectant mothers were reached through instruction in classes and correspondence courses.

As a result of all this, not only is the infant mortality rate the lowest in history, but for the first time the maternal death rate, long stationary, has begun to show indications of a downward trend.

AMERICAN WOMEN WILL MEET TO URGE DEFENSE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—In time of peace prepare for war is the motto of the Women's Patriotic Conference on National Defense which will have its fourth annual meeting in Washington January 29, 30, and 31.

Though backing the Kellogg peace treaty now before the senate delegates to the conference also will work for national defense measures. They have been active supporters of the cruiser bill, the universal draft bill, limitation of immigration, and appropriations for better military training.

Thirty-three societies with membership of more than 200,000 women joined in forming the conference four years ago to actively support measures of defense before congress and to combat pacifist propaganda. The organizations are chiefly those designated "friend societies" the membership being based upon the service of relatives in the wars of the United States beginning with the Revolution.

The Christmas club corporation reports that Christmas savings clubs in Idaho are paying for \$35,000 this year, an increase of 2.5 per cent over last year. Retail store sales for 1928 show a gain of 2.4 per cent over the same period last year. Retail drug stores recorded a 9.9 per cent gain for the same period. It is estimated that the total volume of sales of all automobiles in the state will show a 4 per cent increase over 1927. Registrations in 1928 were approximately 20 per cent above the same month last year. Post office receipts in ten representative towns show a gain of 2.6 per cent for the 11 months.

Power Production Increases—Production of electric power by public utility power plants in the state for the first 10 months exceeded production for the same period last year by 16.1 per cent. Total production for the year is estimated at 142,300 short tons, about the same as last year. It is estimated that the total number of men employed in the state in 1928 will exceed that of 1927 by at least 5 per cent. The labor situation in Idaho is good. Metal mines are active and the railroad shops are employing a maximum number of men. Highway construction work should absorb any surplus labor that may exist.

Agriculture's Income is below that of 1927. Farm income in the state for the present time is 13 per cent below a year ago. The cattle industry is in a favorable position. Beet sugar companies are distributing considerable money in the state. The Utah-Idaho Sugar company disbursed \$3,500,000 the middle of November for Idaho beets. An increase of approximately \$1,000,000 over the amount paid in 1927.

"We may conclude that present Idaho business conditions compare favorably with the country as a whole," says Mr. Sutton.

It is expected that the total volume of business in Idaho during the first six months of 1929 will be slightly below the level attained during the first six months of 1928. The Brookshire Service recently estimated that the Idaho money income from all sources during the next six months would be \$114,000,000, which is a decline of 8 per cent when compared with the same period a year ago and a decline of 5 per cent when compared with the average for the corresponding period for the last three years. This decline is in large part explained by a loss in farm incomes resulting from smaller crops and low agricultural prices. This slight recession of business was not expected to be of a serious nature.
