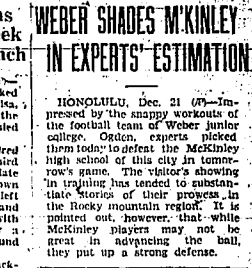

Sewell's batting and fielding, as well as his durability, are noteworthy enough but his specialty at the plate is not being fanned. The Indian star slipped a bit this year, for the official figures show he was whiffed nine times in 155 games, a better record than any other American leaguer, by a good margin, but still somewhat below his average.

In the last four seasons, Sewell has struck out only 25 times altogether in a grand total of 617 games. This is an average of only 4½ strikeouts per year.

Cobb, Tied Speaker and Eddie Collins were noted for their ability to avoid the discomfort of being retired on strikes, but not even the famous batters were as successful in outpunching the twirlers as Joe Sewell.

While on the subject of the vital statistic, it is interesting to note the batting records of what may be styled the Big Six of the American league: batting average—Mussel, Ruth and Gehrig of the Yankees, Gehrig of the Senators, Heilmann of the Tigers, and Simmons of the Athletics. Ruth and Gehrig naturally grab off most of the spectacular honors, but their records for consistency over the past five years are quite as good as those of Gehrig, Simmons and Heilmann—if you measure their performances by a "summarizable" standard, in the statistician's parlance.

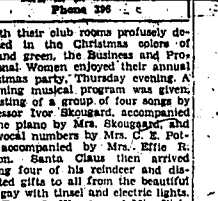

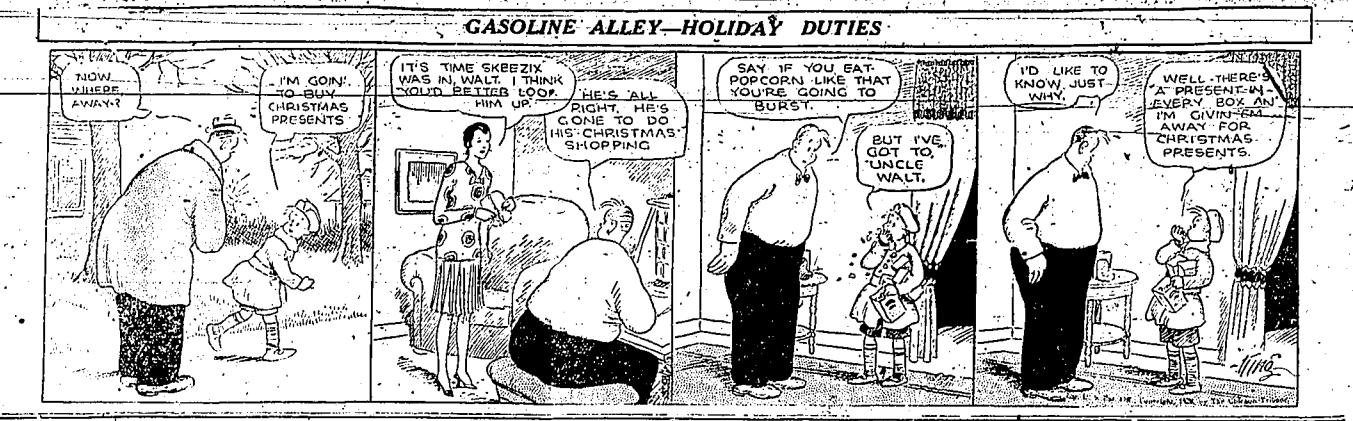

REPORT OF AUDITOR ON BOOKS OF CANAL COMPANY FAVORABLE

Disbursements Total \$615,605. Receipts, \$592,354; Finances On Hand Cover Balance; Surplus Decreases \$41,530

Audit report of the Twin Falls Canal company for the period from September 15, 1927, to September 15, 1928, compiled by H. C. Edmunds, accountant and auditor at the office of the company, shows cash disbursements of \$615,605.19 and cash receipts of \$592,354.27 for the period...

The following is a complete summary of the report touching the general subject of receipts, liabilities, and financial condition:

The balance sheet of the report shows assets of \$225,547.60 and liabilities of \$99,000, leaving a credit to surplus of \$134,547.60.

The comments on the balance sheet state that all cash receipts and disbursements were checked and that the balance of the year is certified and that while the notes and accounts receivable were audited and the balances remaining on hand were of long standing...

The liabilities on the balance sheet consist of bonds payable of \$90,000 due March 1, 1929, and notes payable of \$71,000 due to local banks during March, April, and May of the coming year.

The surplus account shows a decrease over the previous year of \$41,530.22, occasioned principally by the excess of expense over revenue.

REVENUES, ACCOUNTS

The itemized expense and revenue accounts follow:

Expenses—Stockholders meeting and election, \$292.75; directors, \$2,831.70; attorney, \$3,125; general manager, \$4,430.07; secretary-treasurer, \$1,667.50; general office expense, \$705.45; store and yards, \$1,629.54; waterworks department, \$2,515.25; maintenance department, \$17,447.40; engineering department, \$17,122.98; general expense, \$3,074.75; interest received, \$744.86; net receipts, \$2,820.00; total revenue, \$266,666.27; excess of total revenue over expense, \$34,099.10.

CASH BALANCE

The exhibit of cash receipts and disbursements shows disbursements of \$615,605.19 and total receipts of \$592,354.27, leaving an excess of disbursements over receipts of \$23,250.92. The reconciliation of cash as follows: The cash on hand at beginning of period, \$99,077.62, less excess of disbursements over receipts, \$23,250.92, balance on hand September 15, 1928, \$75,826.70.

The budget analysis exhibit shows an over-expenditure in operation and capital outlay of \$125,067.14, and an over-expenditure in reduction of debt of \$63,728.88, or a net over-expenditure of \$168,796.02.

Mr. Edmunds stated in an interview that while his report reflects the facts as recorded by the records of the company, it is misleading, in his opinion, for the reason that additional receipts from sources other than the 1928 maintenance account were not considered in the budget and that that cash was available for the additional expenditures with the exception of reduction of debt.

The comparative balance sheet shows a decrease in assets of \$46,330.23, and a decrease in liabilities of \$5,000, or a net decrease in surplus of \$41,530.23.

WIFE CHARGES BIGAMY IN ACTION FOR DIVORCE

Suit for annulment of an alleged bigamous marriage was instituted in district court here yesterday by Dorothy Anderson Wynn, Bull, who as wife in the complaint charges that she was married to George Wynn in Spanish Falls, Me. on December last year, he had already one living wife who had not been divorced. She alleges also that Wynn married her under the name of Lee Wynn but that she has since learned his name is George Wynn.

She alleges as a further cause of action that Wynn's treatment of her has been marked by cruelty and that he has refused to provide for her support, although he is regularly employed at a monthly wage of \$75 with board and room.

The complaint was drafted and filed by W. L. Dunn, attorney.
