VETERAN PROMOTER RATES CONTENDERS IN BOXERS' REALM

"Dempsy Will Fight Once More And That One Battle Will Be For Me," Wrote Guiding Genius in Special Article

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—Tex Rickard's contribution to boxing literature in his ranking list for 1928, coupled with the definite announcement of Jack Dempsy's comeback this year, is contained in a copyrighted story written by the promoter for the issue of The Ring, monthly boxing publication, appearing this Friday. Rickard's rankings are especially significant, giving the promoter's final analysis of the game he developed so extensively. Equally interesting is his forecast of Dempsy's plans, even though they now are in doubt as a result of the promoter's death.

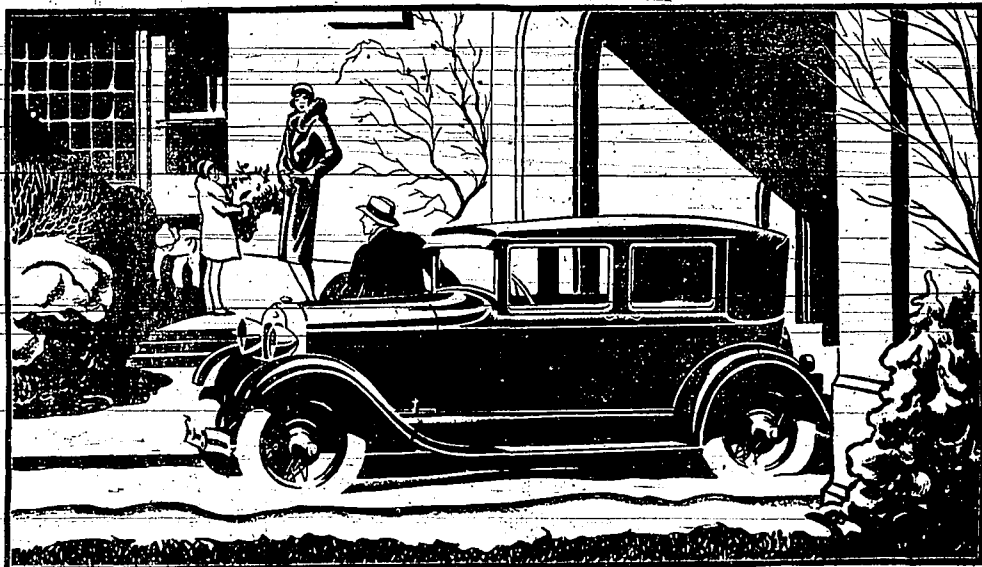

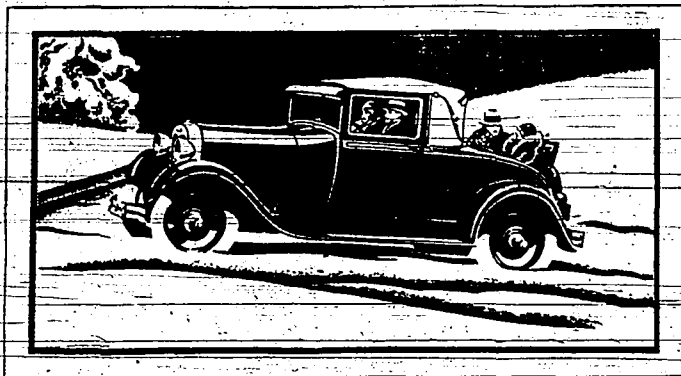

800 STOCKHOLDERS OF CANAL COMPANY TO ASSEMBLE HERE

Election of Officers and Reports of Manager and Other Officers Features; Sale of Storage Will Be Considered

Stockholders of Twin Falls Canal company who are the owners of 230,000 acres under Twin Falls canal system will assemble here today in order to elect officers and to receive annual reports of Burton Smith, general manager, and other officers. Attendance of at least 800 stockholders is anticipated.

Resolutions to be presented will urge continued effort toward reduction of water delivery through the canal system during winter, and will advise consent with stockholders in event of emergency requiring expenditure in excess of budget limitations.

Consider Individual Members Without Committee to its support, the proposition of sale of water rights in Jackson Lake reservoir will be presented to the stockholders' meeting for discussion. In the resolutions committee reports which will propose that "the state of our water rights in Jackson Lake reservoir and authorize the directors of the company to make such thereof at such price and on such terms as they may determine."

Directors whose terms expire are N. V. Sharp, Edgar T. B. Baird, Twin Falls, R. H. Hatfield, Buhl, W. C. Brown, Castleford, Peter Link, Hansen, with the exception of Mr. Baird, who is re-elected. The names of the candidates for reelection.

Stock Basis of Vote
Vote on directors will be by stock vote, each share of stock which represents entitled to five votes for director.

The meeting will be called to order at 10 A. M. in the canal company's office here where temporary organization will be effected by election of temporary chairman and secretary. MAYOR CASTS CITY'S CANAL STOCK VOTES AT ANNUAL MEETING

Council Authorizes R. E. Bobber to Act On Its Behalf; Report Heads Report; Retire \$15,000 in Bonds

With consent of members of Twin Falls city council expressed at a regular meeting last evening, R. E. Bobber, Twin Falls mayor, will vote the city's canal company stock in the election of directors of Twin Falls Canal company at an annual meeting of canal company stockholders.

The mayor's colleagues declined to instruct as to what candidates should be given the city's vote but left the question up to the mayor's judgment. A number of the councilmen joined in the expressed opinion that L. M. Smith, who it is reported, is a candidate for reelection, has given faithful and efficient service of unusual caliber to the company during his term as director.

Departments Report
Monthly reports of municipal officials received at this meeting revealed the month of December, of the police department and of the plumbing inspector and summarized financial receipts and disbursements.

Police during the month, Police Chief E. E. Lightner's report stated, had 123 arrests, besides the 122 complaints of various nature and including four search warrants. An accident, resulting in various injuries, occurred there were a violation of traffic ordinances, 12, drunkenness, 10, misdemeanors and 10, under state laws. 2. Fines assessed in police court totaled \$200. Seventy-nine meals were served to prisoners. 18 persons held in jail were furnished 18 persons other than prisoners. Police reported attendance at eight fires. Two automobiles were reported stolen and two were recovered.

Fines Total \$150
Police court's collections of fines during the month totaled \$150, with \$94 cents additional, report of H. D. Read, police magistrate, showed. The city's share in the state's income of the police court was \$160.

Waterworks department reported collections totaling \$400 in November and accounts in charge of \$387 for December.

Expenditures of municipal funds for the month totaled \$150, in the city clerk's reports as follows: General fund, \$14, \$16.40; street sprinkling, \$40.20; public library, \$14.50; street lighting, \$20; treasurer's tax anticipation note redemption, \$10,000; bond, interest and sinking fund, \$33,069.97.

Bonds totaling \$15,000 were retired, and \$18,018.75 was paid as interest. Plumbing permits were issued to 10 applicants and one sewer application was received, according to the report of Alex W. Murray, plumbing inspector. The council voted authorization for issuance of a builder's permit to W. P. Snodgrass, 409 Fourth avenue east, for construction of an addition to his residence. The estimated expenditure of \$500.

The first meeting of which W. B. Smith, newly elected post commander, is to preside. Definite action with respect to the building project and other matters is scheduled.
