JUDGE DISCHARGES JURY HE ORDERED TO DEVOTE 11 DAYS TO LEARN DUTY

CHICAGO, Jan. 8 (AP)—A jury which was ordered to deliberate by Judge George Fred Ruth in circuit court to spend the next 11 days in his court in observation and learning after it had rendered a verdict of acquittal in an attempted robbery case today was discharged by the judge. "I believe that you gentlemen violated your oath in failing to return a true verdict," Judge Ruth said. "But I do believe that I should ask the county to bear the expense of keeping you here for the next 11 days."

THRONGS PAY SILENT TRIBUTE TO RICKARD

New York Thousands File By Massive Bronze Casket Holding Body of Famous Promoter

NEW YORK, Jan. 8 (AP)—The spot where the great arena promoter was laid at Madison Square Garden the body of Tex Rickard rested tonight, awaiting funeral services to be held tomorrow. Before the final words are said in praise of the genius of the sports promoter, thousands of men and women from every walk of life will pay their silent tribute. For three hours tonight the doors of the garden were swung open to admit the public to pass the massive bronze casket holding the body of the promoter. Boiling clammers and title holders of other days were in the throng, several while-haired men held gloves and hats over their heads. At the funeral tomorrow boxers and hockey players and officials will join with enthusiasts for both sports in saying "we'll do it."

MASTODON'S TOOTH GOES TO MUSEUM AT HARVARD

BOSTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—The largest tooth ever measured, measuring 11 feet 2 inches in length and weighing more than 300 pounds, was shipped from Colorado to the Harvard museum today. It came from the jaw of a mastodon, and scientists estimate that it is more than 50,000 years old. The tooth was found embedded in the bank of the Porcupine river, a tributary of the Yukon, by Dr. Albert Fernald.

PHONE COMPANY WILL SPEND HUGE SUM IN FAR WESTERN STATES

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8 (AP)—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company plans to spend \$22,000,000 in the Pacific coast states this year for plant and equipment improvements. The states included comprise the whole area of the company's activities in California, Oregon, Washington, West Idaho and Nevada. The chief officers will go for replacements of existing manual equipment with dial Central office throughout the system, via changes in wire cables and installing new toll lines.

HOOPER MEETS WITH BORAH AND MELLON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—President-elect Hoover talked over many problems today with Secretary Mellon, and a number of congressional leaders and approved plans for a simple inauguration to be followed by a military review parade lasting about two hours. Dempsey, Grief Torn, Announces Plans to Return to Ring

"When a Fellow Like Rickard Dies It Takes the Edge Off Everything," Says One Time King in Heam of Pugilists

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Grief-torn and weary, but still much in the "fighting" picture, Jack Dempsey came back to New York from Miami Beach today with the body of Tex Rickard, to help work out the pretentious plans the great promoter had for him this year.

Bereft of the guiding ruler of Rickard's friendship and advice, Dempsey could have only the things Tex Rickard done, the way he wanted, "Tex" wanted him to fight again for the heavyweight championship of the world.

Dempsey will leave Thursday for Miami Beach to actively undertake this task. Mrs. Rickard, the promoter's widow, probably will go back to Florida at the same time for a rest.

"When a fellow like Rickard dies it takes the edge off everything," said Dempsey.

Dempsey would frankly of his position in the boxing world now that the great promoter, the man who made him a millionaire had passed away.

"No one could do that and perhaps myself least of all," he said simply.

Dempsey said Rickard never had a chance to recover from the opponent's operation on New Year's day. He said the accompanying infection had spread through the muscular walls of the stomach before the operation was performed.

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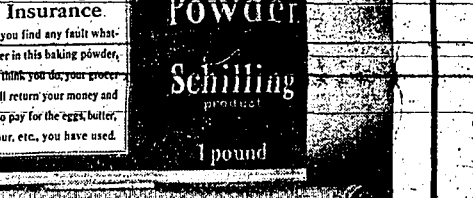

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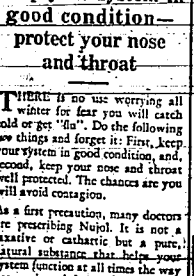

BURLEY, Jan. 8 (Special to The News)—That actual volume of the United States potato crop and other factors in the potato situation warrant a higher market for this product, is the opinion of Lincoln Wilder, Burley potato dealer.

Wilder has investigated the Eastern situation and outlook, and in his position as a dealer in the East, he usually every potato growing state in the United States and he asserts that his information supports the belief that the government estimate of potato stocks on hand is entirely too high.
