



# PRESIDENT CONFERS WITH SENATORS ON PACT-BANNING WARS

### Conference Fails to Break Dead-locks—Senator Borah Will Continue Fight to Limit Debate to Expedite Settlement

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—With the house in recess for the weekend, the senate devoted its time to such widely diversified measures as the Kellogg anti-war treaty and the proposed Nicaragua canal today but made little progress.  
The treaty fight remained unsettled because no agreement could be reached in time for a vote. Even conferences at the White House between senators and President Coolidge failed to break the deadlock. Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee, however, says he will continue to insist that the final action may be taken on the pact.

### Senator Edge's Bill for a Canal Survey across Nicaragua occupied the senate for an hour or two, senator retreats on Monday to continue action on the ground that Middle Western senators should be heard inasmuch as the commerce of that section would be affected. The bill went over for future consideration.

## JEROME OPENS NEW BUTTERMILK PLANT

### Factory Has Capacity of 750 Pounds of Powdered Product Daily; Offers Higher Profit

JEROME, Jan. 12 (Special to The News).—Jerome Cooperative creamery today began operation of its powdered buttermilk plant, machinery for which has been installed by L. Kent, Minneapolis.  
The plant will turn out powdered buttermilk amounting to 750 pounds daily from milk purchased including the products of the Twin Falls Cooperative Dairyman's Association. The net profits will be approximately four times as great from the product put to higher uses than from the sale of the buttermilk at a cent a gallon at present. The product is used largely for poultry feed, and, where manufactured from sweet cream, for domestic purposes.  
The machinery was put in operation during the regular monthly session of the board of directors of the creamery.

### May Handle Habbits

A committee, composed of A. N. Johnston, Curry, O. P. Bennett, Charles Ford, and Frank Kludsen, Twin Falls, representing the habits breeders' association of Twin Falls, was present to ask the board whether the Jerome Cooperative creamery could dress and handle rabbits for shipment. Manager Roy D. Smith, who with O. H. Albee and James Knott, will constitute the committee which leaves Monday for Los Angeles to attend the annual meeting of the Challenge Cream and Butter association, stated that while there he would investigate market conditions and report to the directors on his return in order that they might determine whether to enter this line of activity or not.  
Mr. Kent came to Twin Falls last evening from Jerome with Harry Nelson, manager of the Twin Falls Dairyman's association. He will leave on the stage this morning for Meridian where he will install machinery for the new cooperative creamery which is being completed there. This will also include a plant for the manufacture of powdered buttermilk.

Majority of those speaking favored passage of the resolution opposing the plan, although several opposed the idea of taking any action at this time, and voted against the resolution on its final passage. The speakers' resolutions were in the plan, voiced the sentiments of the majority. One speaker repeated approval of a declaration made at the Boise meeting that the county unit plan was "throwing a lamb to wolves."

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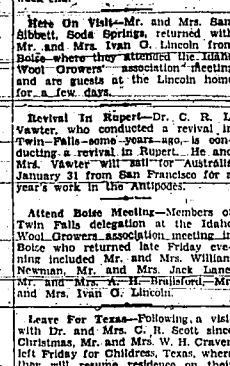

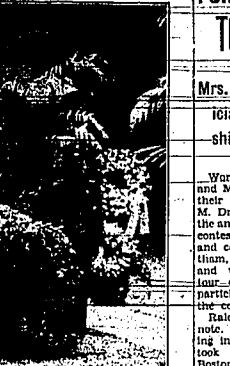
Priest Wins Control Over Bells of Church

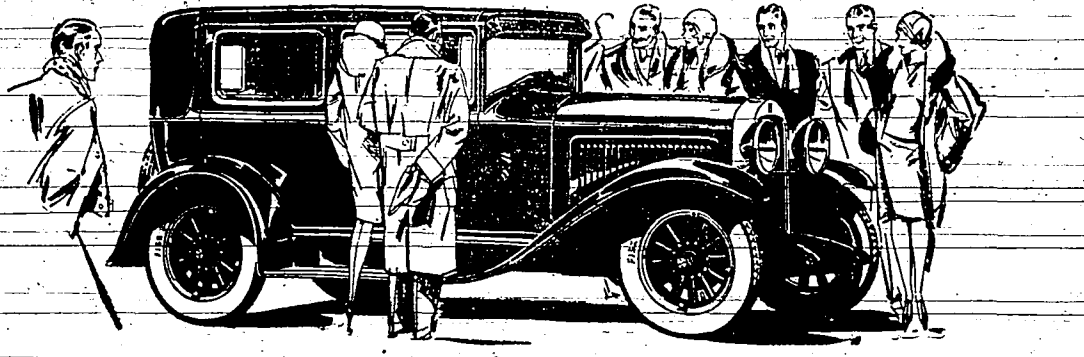
TWO MEN TAKEN IN RAID ADMIT LIQUOR CHARGES

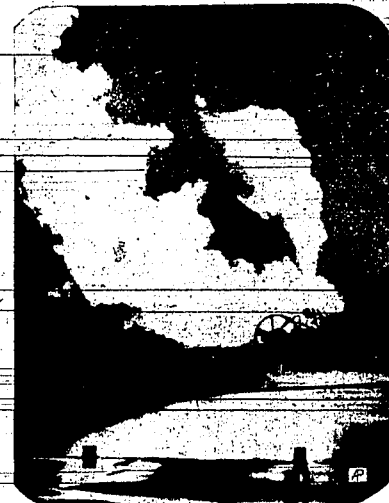

## University Girl Studying Astronomy Discovers 2000 Separate, Distinct Worlds



Miss Adelaide Ames, working under the direction of Professor Harlow Shapley at the Harvard observatory, is credited with the discovery of 2000 universes.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Jan. 12 (AP)—The popular belief is that the stars in the Coma-Virgo group, and, estimated to be part of one large size-shaped disk, are all the same stars away from earth, yet one girl at the Harvard college observatory has found not less than 2000 separate and distinct ones, and of this number 2000 stars and is making a study of these, and 200 other universes previously known.

Miss Adelaide Ames, daughter of the late U. S. senator, is working at the Harvard observatory under the direction of Professor Harlow Shapley, and a Vassar graduate of the class of 1922, has been working at the Harvard observatory during the last five years under the supervision of Professor Harlow Shapley, director of the observatory. Her studies cover an area of about 100 square degrees in the heavens, an area about twice the size of the band of the Dipper, and in this area are included these 2000 universes.

Miss Ames' work deals with the Coma-Virgo group of stars, numbering between 200 and 300 and estimated to be at a distance of 10,000,000 light years from the sun. And one light year is approximately 6,000,000,000 miles. Under Professor Shapley's direction, her studies are centered in making various measurements of the stars in the Coma-Virgo group from a series of photographic plates which were taken mostly at Harvard's southern observatory at Mount Wilson, Ariz., Peru, recently moved to South Africa.

Measurements of the positions, diameters, concentration, orientation and brightness of these galaxies or groups of solar systems are obtained from the photographic plates and the results are arranged in a special system of classification, devised by Professor Shapley for Miss Ames, who is first in time to make use of it. 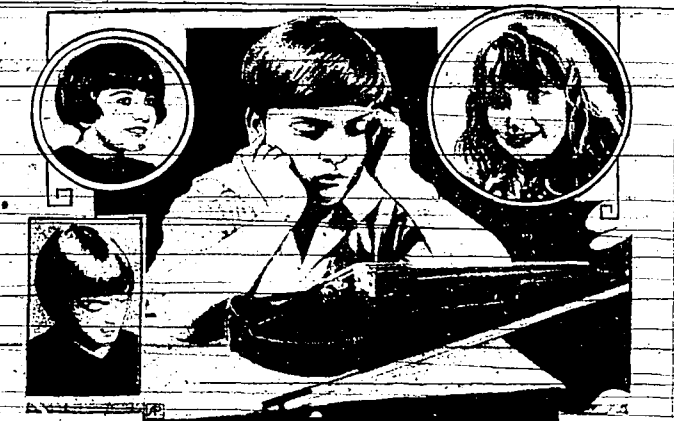

# COLLEGE PRESIDENT SPEAKS IN EAST END

Dr. Frederick J. Kolly of State University, Discusses Proper Use of Leisure Time

DURLEY, Jan. 12 (Special to The News)—Attendance at the fourth annual southern Idaho leadership conference here is estimated as being larger than any heretofore held by officials in charge.
