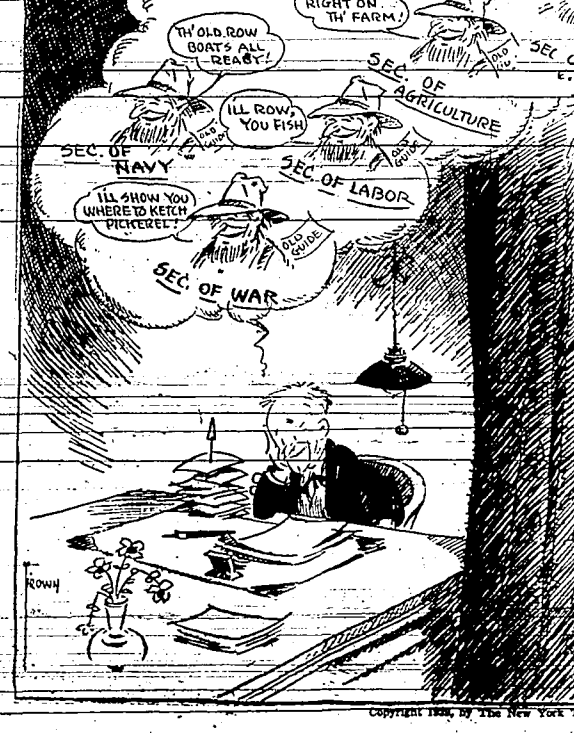

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YOUTH RELATES TALE OF ALLEGED CRIMES ON CALIFORNIA FARM

Sanford Clark, 15, Nephew of Principal Accuser of Gordon Stewart Northcott, Recites Role in Awful Tragedy

By The Associated Press. RIVERSIDE, Calif., Jan. 15.—Sanford Clark, 15-year-old nephew and principal accuser of Gordon Stewart Northcott, on trial for the laying of the director of his nephew's murder in Pomona, and an unidentified Mexican boy, today took the witness stand and related a gruesome tale of the alleged crimes connected with the Winlock children ranch.

"The youthful witness told of digging three graves on the Northcott ranch in the vicinity of Winlock, Calif. One of these graves, he said, was intended for Mr. and Mrs. Dahl Los Angeles, but was never occupied because Gordon Stewart Northcott did not get away with it."

"The bodies in the other graves were removed," Sanford said, and taken "50 miles out into the desert." Questioning of Special Prosecutor Loyal O. Kelly led Sanford into the details of the alleged killing and burial of the Winlock children.

UNIVERSITY OFFERS SEED TEST SERVICE

Twin Falls Potato Growers to Send Samples to State College For Experimental Work

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow Jan. 15 (Special to The News)—Potato seed growers in Twin Falls county who plan to take advantage of the comparative vitality and disease test service of the University of Idaho college of agriculture have been requested by E. R. Kestner, their representative with the university's agricultural extension division, to send 15-pound samples of their seed direct to the university at Moscow by the middle of February.

A change in comparative test methods is being made this year instead of conducting the comparative tests at the Aberdeen substitution in Blingham county, the seed samples are to be planted here. February 15 (of the crop) sections of the state. This will enable the experimenters to get information on vitality, diseases and other points about the seed in time to apply it during the commercial certified seed growing season. The new method virtually will mean a generally better grade of seed, and it is expected to prove increasingly valuable to the seed growers of the state. The comparative seed tests have been conducted four years and between 500 and 700 growers from practically every county in the state have sent samples. Seed samples this year are to be 15 pounds of untreated seed. They must arrive at the university by the middle of February. All seed samples will be given a uniform disease treatment before planting.

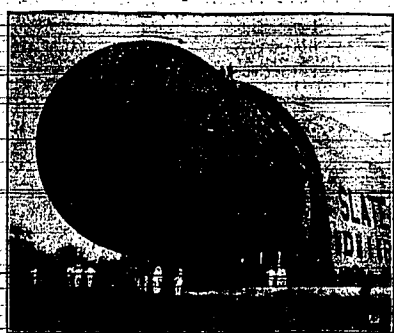

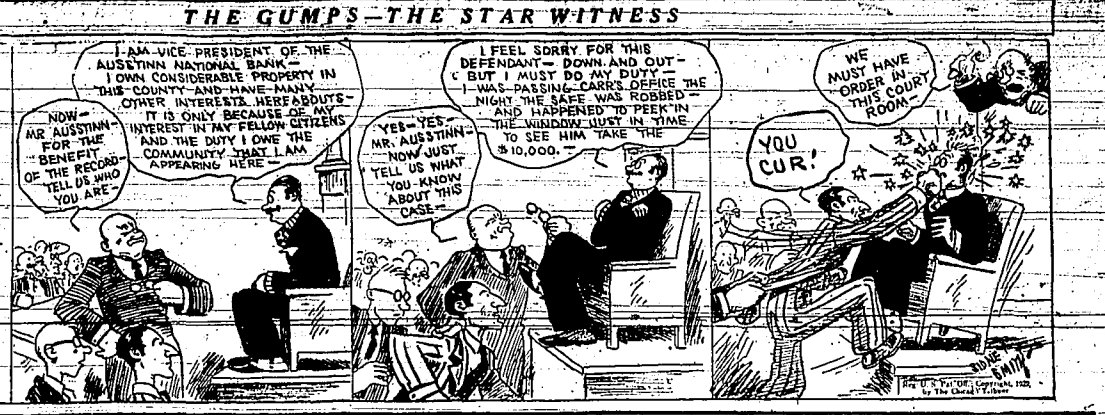
