(Continued From Page One) of power companies used in pumping water for irrigation were filed in the senate agricultural committee, and a bill to "bring about" similar exemptions.

The exemptions were originally granted with a view to relieving farmers under pumping projects for the amount of the exemption which is refunded to the farmers by the power companies.

Senator George Barrett, Ooding, chairman of the committee, said the law in effect placed an extra burden on about 90 per cent of the taxpayers in order to subsidize the other 10 per cent.

The measure to abolish the exemptions is known to have considerable support in both houses.

PARIS, Jan. 16 (A slight improvement in the condition of Marshal Ferdinand Foch was reported by his doctors as they emerged from their early evening consultation over the stricken generalissimo of the Allied army. The fact that they issued no formal communication and that none of the doctors remained overnight with the patient combined to produce some feeling of encouragement among the marshal's friends.

There was open joy and exuberance at the Foch offices in the Invalides building where General Weygand, chief of staff, was seen to smile and exclaimed:

"That is much better, the great marshal will see it through."

(Continued From Page One) left from the national campaign of 1924 until the spring of 1928. He urged that the Democratic party be a progressive, militant party and pointed out the needs of a minority party under a system of government such as that of the United States.

The dark chapters of American history from 1921 to 1924 are an indication of what can take place in the government of our country in the absence of an active minority party," he said. "Were it not for the vigilance of the Democrats and Progressives in congress, the whole shameful story of the oil leases might have never been told."

In 1928 a switch of 84 per cent of the total vote would have given victory to the Democratic ticket, the former governor said, whereas in 1924 it would have required a switch in about 152 and in 1920 more than 137 per cent.

"A change of only 420,000 votes out of the total of 38,500,000 votes cast, properly scattered throughout the states," he asserted, "would have altered the whole complexion of the electoral college and would have given the Democratic party 268 electoral votes, which would have meant victory instead of defeat."

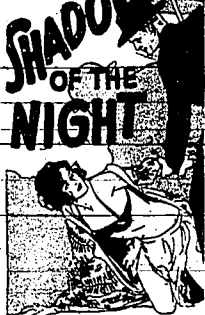

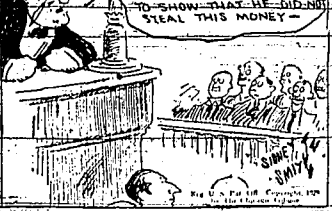
