IDAHO LEGISLATORS NOT TO GET HIGHER WAGES FOR SERVICE

First Open Clash of Session Between North and South Results in Defeat of Measure by 31 to 27 in Lower Branch

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Jan. 23.—The first open clash of the session between North and South Idaho today resulted in the house of the Idaho legislature voting down a bill to increase the income of legislators.

The vote was 31 to 27, defeat of the bill, hinging on the solid vote cast by the North branch last night and decided to defeat the measure on what was reported to be a desire to have an amendment to the governor.

Defeat of the bill came entirely as a surprise to both the house and the senate. It was the first defeat of a bill by the legislature since the amendment increasing legislators pay to \$10 a day was defeated.

In his contention he was opposed by Representative Andrew C. Crowley, who entered the debate with the bill to increase the pay of legislators but he believed it was the will of the people that he should not put more money in our pockets out of the state fund.

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VATICAN DECRIES DANCES AND TEAS WHEN DELIGHT OVERSHADOWS OBJECTIVE

ROME, Jan. 23 (AP)—Charity teas and dances in which the social delight of the participants overshadows the idea of bounty to the unfortunate, were denounced today by Observatore Romano, the newspaper through which the Vatican makes its public announcements.

Charity is of too high a degree to be mixed up with the languor and audaciousness of the dance, said the editorial. The undue luxury and abandon in dress which so often characterize such functions, do not constitute beneficence but are rather an insult to the recipients.

YOUNG UTAH WOMAN WARGRAFT SPONSOR

Amid Shrieks of Whistles and Cheers of 6000 Persons Big Warship Slips Into Delaware

CAMDEN, N. J., Jan. 23 (AP)—Amid the shrieks of river craft whistles and the cheers of 6000 persons, the 10,000-ton cruiser Salt Lake City was launched today from the New York Ship Building company.

Miss Helen Budge, Salt Lake City, was the sponsor for the ship. She was assisted by Miss Gladys Eicher of Utah, who was the maid of honor.

One of Eight Cruisers The Salt Lake City, one of the eight 10,000-ton cruisers ordered in 1924, is the first vessel of her type launched in this country under the terms of the Washington treaty signed in 1922.

The cruiser is 385 feet 6 inches in length, has a draft of 13 feet 6 inches and will have a normal draft of 15 feet 6 inches. Her heaviest guns will be 8-inch caliber. The ship is to be launched in commission before the end of the present year.

DUDAPEST, Jan. 23 (AP)—A Bucharest dispatch says that it is feared that 40 passengers have died from cold and hunger in a train which has been buried in a snowdrift for more than two days.

COLD WAVE MOVING EAST FROM ROCKIES

CHICAGO, Jan. 23 (AP)—The Midwest slipped into its work today, assured of several more days of near zero weather.

The cold wave, moving eastward from the Rocky mountain region, blanketed the Missouri and middle and upper Mississippi valleys, turning the surface of the earth into a treacherous sheet of ice.

Chicago readings were reported as far south as northern Missouri and in Minnesota and North Dakota the mercury dropped as far as 28 below.

Minnesota, with highways blocked and trains and motor buses delayed, reported one death due to the storm.

Lincoln and southeastern Nebraska experienced the coldest weather of the winter. The temperature dropped to zero shortly after midnight.

The curtain of fog had not raised long over the northern and central Rocky mountain region, Rocker, Montana, heading the list at 50 degrees below zero.

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BIG AMERICAN LINER SAVES 32 ITALIANS FROM DEATH AT SEA

Captain Fricke Again Writes Name Into Epic of Seas, Laticonic Message Visualizes Heroic Fight On Raging Atlantic

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—Captain George Fricke of the United States liner America, wrote his name into an epic of the sea tonight when he rescued 32 members of the crew of the disabled Italian freighter in a stormy, westerly gale 100 miles off the Virginia Capes.

No details of what must have been a thrilling battle with the sea were given in the laconic message which the quinquagenarian little man, who always seems to be around when there is a hard fight to be done, sent to his line office here tonight.

## WINTER BLOCKADES SOUTH IDAHO ROADS

Buhl Reports Near Casualty When Truck Driver Exhausts Self in Fight Against Drifts

Drifting snow with lower temperature caused further blockade of roads and serious interference with all sorts of motor travel throughout this region yesterday, and one near casualty when a truck driver exhausted himself in a fight against the drifts.

A truck driver in the employ of the Begg Milk company, Buhl, it was reported, was stalled with his truck in a drift on the road. He began to dig a way out ahead, while the snow drifted in behind the truck so that it was impossible for him to get out in any direction. Although he persisted in his efforts with the shovel, he was nearly exhausted when he was found and it was necessary to carry him to his rescuers' car.

Only one motor stage made the trip over the road between Twin Falls and Pocatello yesterday. Traveling westward, it abandoned the highway at Murtauch and took to the fields to avoid drifts five and six feet deep in the road north of that place. It left Pocatello at 8 A. M. and arrived here at 8 P. M. requiring 12 hours to cover the 125 miles distance. The abandoned motor stage yesterday morning was stalled in the drifts at Murtauch and returned to Twin Falls.

The stage coming from Boise to Twin Falls yesterday was stalled for a time in a drift at the top of the grade at Bliss, but arrived only a half hour late.

To Open Road East W. A. Childers of the state highway maintenance department, at Murtauch last evening stated that efforts would be directed toward opening the road to the Cassia county line today, with reasonable hope of success. The

road east from the county line to Burley was reported to be passable. In Twin Falls the municipal water works department, with the cooperation of householders who are permitting water to run from faucets on their premises at night, continue the fight to prevent freezing of the municipal waterworks system. Reports of ice blocks in meters, service pipes and property numbered 183 yesterday morning, and new reports of trouble of this kind poured in on the water works department throughout the day.

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### BUSH FACES JURY IN FELONY CHARGE TRIAL

#### State's Witnesses Relate Incidents in Connection With Alleged Encounter at Filer

Story of an encounter at Filer on the night of last May 10 in which Cleo (Bill) Bush is alleged to have wielded a knife and drawn a gun was told from a number of viewpoints by witnesses for the prosecution in Bush's trial in district court here yesterday on felony charges of assault with a deadly weapon.

It was indicated that the trial, which is the first of a series of cases to occupy all or part of today, selection of the jury was completed at noon and during the afternoon session nine witnesses were called to the stand by E. V. Larson, prosecuting attorney. Testimony of two additional witnesses for the prosecution is to be introduced this morning before the state rests, and W. L. Dunn will present presentation of the defendant's side of the case.

Larger Relates Story

George Jasper, the complaining witness who is alleged to have been attacked by Bush during the encounter at Filer, and who returned last Saturday from Stockton, California, to take part in the trial, was the first of the day's witnesses. He told the jury that he was driving a car when he was driving through the encounter with Cleo Bush when he objected to Bush's alleged attempt to join forces with his brother, Bill Bush, in a fight with Marvin Cole.

He said that Cleo Bush had struck him on the chest, causing a wound from which he noticed blood flowing, and that Bush afterward drew an automatic pistol, declaring with an oath that he would shoot Bush. Bill Bush, the witness said, intervened to prevent carrying out of the threat.

Alleges Threat With Gun

Marvin Cole also testified to incidents leading to the alleged assault and stated that he had seen a gun in Bush's hand, and F. C. Thompson said that he was judged from the manner in which Bush held his hand and from his words that he was threatening danger with a gun.

The wound in Jasper's chest, according to testimony of Dr. F. A. Dwight, Filer, who attended the injured man, was caused by a sharp instrument that pierced the flesh on the left side encircling the rib with such force as to scratch the pericardium.

Other witnesses who told of having seen more or less of the encounter were Mrs. Ruth Sullivan, Gene Gillen, LaRue Wertz, N. V. Fisher.

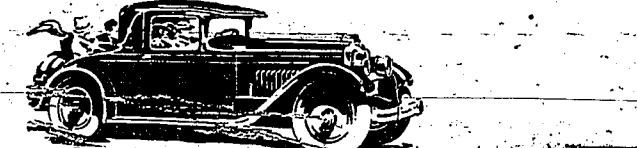

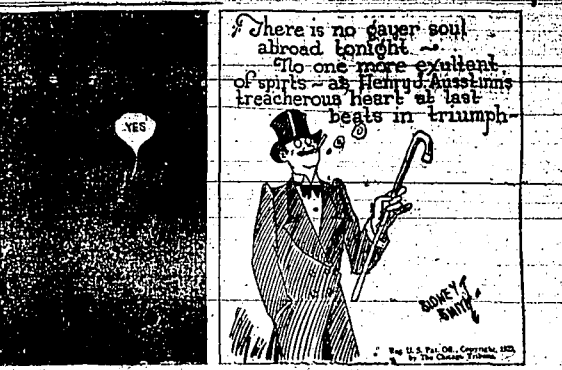
