WILHELM II. GIVES VIEWS ON AFFAIRS CONFRONTING WORLD

BY LOUIS F. TOCHNER (Chief of the Berlin Bureau of The Associated Press) DOORN, Holland, Jan. 25.—On the eve of his seventieth birthday, former Emperor Wilhelm II, speaking through a friend and co-worker, Baron Ulrich von Sell, gave the chief of the Berlin bureau of the Associated Press, who visited Doorn, an interview. The former emperor, who has, however, dictated forward which he signed. 20,000 See Sharkey Smash Out Decision Over Christner

VULCANIZER OF OHIO WOEFULLY GREEN BUT COURAGEOUS PUNCHER

Fistic Accident From Akron All But Happens to Garrulous Gob From Boston; Big Crowd Differs On Decision

(By The Associated Press) MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—That fistic accident from Akron—courageous K. O. Christner, all but happened to Jack Sharkey, the garrulous gob from Boston tonight in a wild-free-swinging 10-round melée that turned the spacious garden—made a madhouse with close to 20,000 roaring inmates.

Christner, woefully green but courageous, came out of the Mid-West with a load of punching dynamite that was a constant threat every minute of the 10 rounds. He won only three of them, in the consensus of newspapermen at the ring-side, but only Sharkey's wild condition and slobber kept him from the canvas in several rounds.

Rubber Worker Outboxes Christner before tackling Striving in the first of the major heavyweight clinches. Christner, the built-chested rubber-worker, and mixing a strange brand of caution with savagery, alleged his way out of several difficulties. He made Christner, 34 years old, a professional boxer for only the last year, seem childlike and rigid hand when he met Sharkey's wild condition and slobber kept him from the canvas in several rounds.

After taking a severe trouncing in the second, third, seventh and ninth rounds, Christner, 34 years old, was some right just before the bell in each session and sent Sharkey back to his corner to rest, with his tongue in his cheek.

Sharkey On Offense Opening up in the sixth round, however, Sharkey took the offense and forced Christner to lead and leave openings that brought both Jack's hands booming to the body in every round thereafter. Sharkey measured his timing for with vicious close to the—non-mid-section—Christner's face with every wop in the fight.

Although newspapermen at the ring-side were almost unanimously in accord with the decision, the crowd boomed the verdict, crowded about the ring, and the referee called the fight back as he left the arena. Officials likewise differed in their decisions. Referee Jack Dempsey and Judge George Kelly voting for Sharkey, while Judge Tom Shortell called the fray a draw.

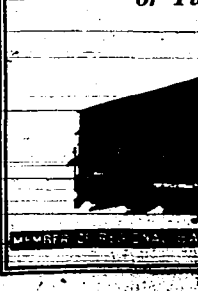

SENATE COMMITTEE APPROVES CREATING PARK IN FAR WEST

Area in Wyoming Known to Tourists as Grand Teton Range May Be Preserved Forever as Playgrounds

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—The area in Wyoming known to tourists and nature lovers as the Grand Teton range, including the area about the most beautiful sight ever had in the field was suggested today to be made a national park.

The range, which would be known as the Grand Teton national park, is a long narrow area lying just south of Yellowstone park and decision to recommend that it be made a national park almost 20 or more years of controversy by citizens of the mountain states, some of whom had wished to include it as a separate park while others desired it be attached to Yellowstone.

At the same time the Teton proposal was approved the senate public lands committee recommended a measure for the appointment of a commission to inquire into the advisability of changing the boundary between northwestern boundaries of Yellowstone park.

The committee already had approved a bill increasing the acreage of northern slopes so that if the complete program is carried out the famous Yellowstone square known to everyone who has perched on a geography will be changed into an irregular area taking in larger sections of lands in Wyoming and Montana.

One of those to appear today before the committee to urge creation of the park was Howard M. Albright, director of the national park service. Two years ago Albright was superintendent of Yellowstone park and it was through his efforts that Mrs. C. Coolidge was induced to make the long motor car trip to the Teton range.

The committee also recommended that changes in the Yellowstone boundary would be composed of five persons appointed by the president. The committee of Idaho but the group decided to allow the president to use his own judgment in the selection.

The bill also includes proposed addition to the park territory of a circle of land lying between the park known as the Thoroughfare hunting grounds and the elimination from the park of an area in the northwest lying in Falls basin.

The land committee also approved a bill which would add 20,000 acres to the national park. The bill was introduced by Representative Smith, Idaho, and has passed the house.

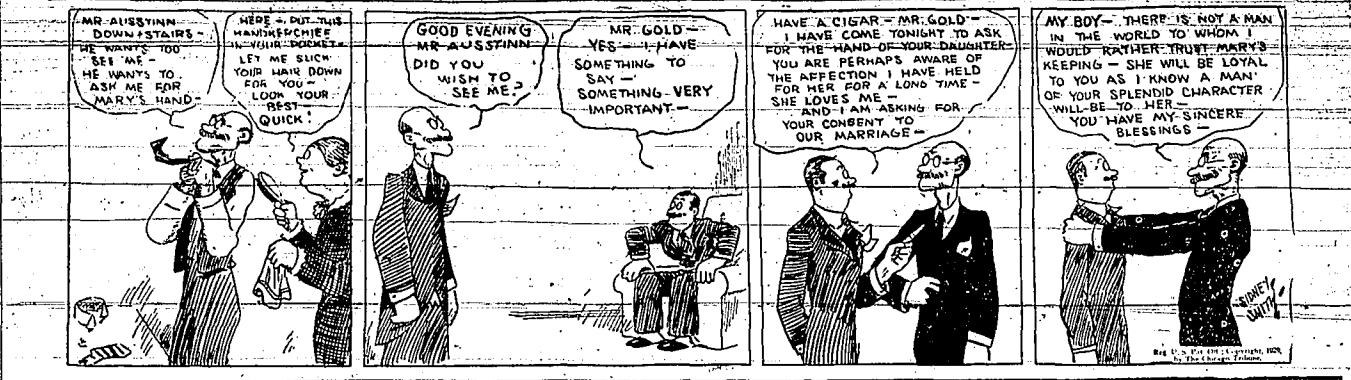
