LIBRARIAN APPROVES SERVICE EXTENSION

Miss Jessie Fraser Advises No Existing Institution Will Be Affected by Proposed Bill

Anticipating possible introduction of a county bill in the Idaho legislature, Miss Jessie Fraser, Twin Falls librarian, yesterday prepared a statement on the subject of the county library.

Before any county can have a county library, there must be on the statute book at that state a law permitting the same commissioners to levy a small tax for its support.

There are two ways in which a county library service may be operated. An existing county library may be established independent of a city library, in places large enough to warrant the expense of two libraries, and the expenditure of the necessary moneys or a county may arrange to buy service of an already existing library.

The advantage of the county library plan is that it brings library service to many places which are not otherwise served—and in a more efficient and economical way than could be required through several smaller libraries.

Thirty-four states now have county library laws. The plan is being worked out satisfactorily in neighboring states of Utah, Montana, Oregon and California.
