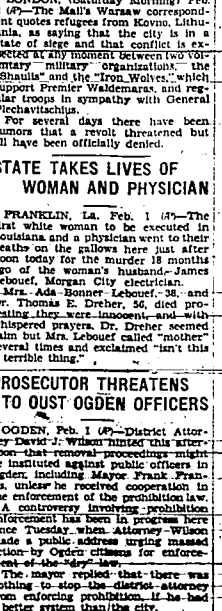

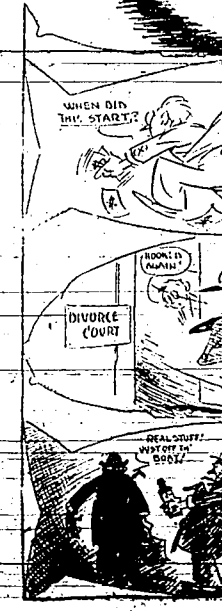

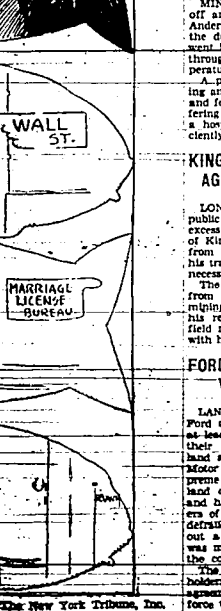

The secretary and speaker Mr. Coolidge regarded as "another example of this rapidly developing movement."

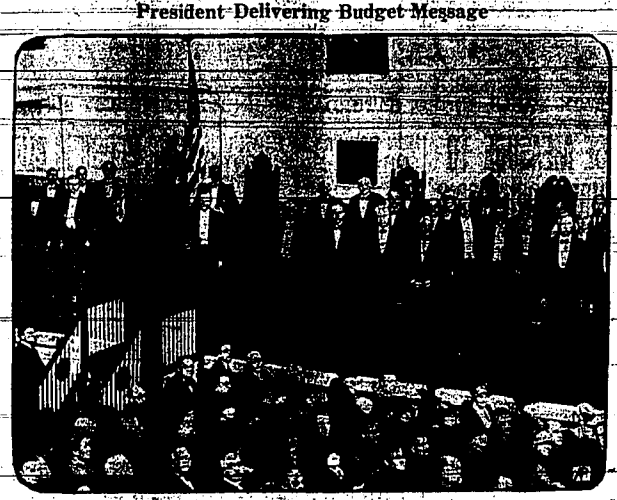

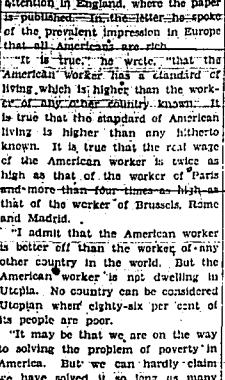

BURGLARY SUSPECT HAS CRIME RECORD

Ted Marvin Twice Convicted in Washington On Charges of Burglary in Second Degree

Ted Marvin alias Fred Dennis who was delivered here Thursday to a deputy sheriff from Missoula, Montana, where he is wanted on charges of attempting to smother and kill a policeman while evading arrest, was convicted twice in the state of Washington on charges of second degree burglary according to a document received by R. E. Leighton, Twin Falls police chief, from the Portland police department yesterday.

Use Finger-Prints Identification was made by means of finger-print records furnished by the Twin Falls chief to the Portland police.

Marvin under the name of Theodore Brown according to the document was convicted in the state of Washington in 1924 on a burglary charge and sentenced to Yakima county to serve a month in the state reformatory.

Marvin was taken up here in a roundup of suspects on the day following the dynamite explosion in the Oregon Short Line passenger depot here Thursday of last week.

He sold the officers here a copy of the Washington state papers previously looking for work as a camp cook. He had no baggage and he declined to make any statements under questioning.

Convicted Second Time He was convicted in the second time of burglary in November, 1924, and sentenced from Whitman county to serve one to two years in the Washington state prison.

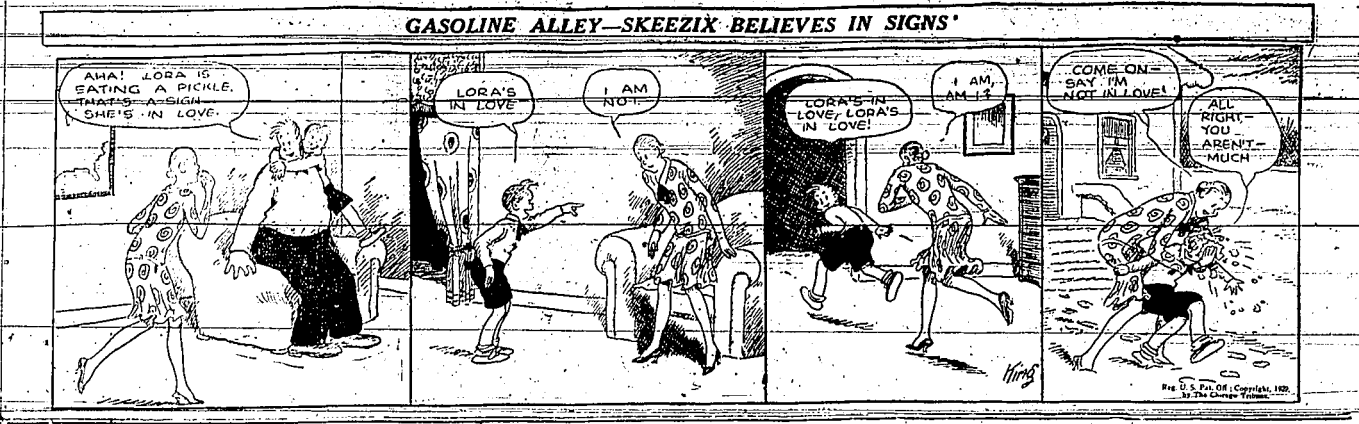

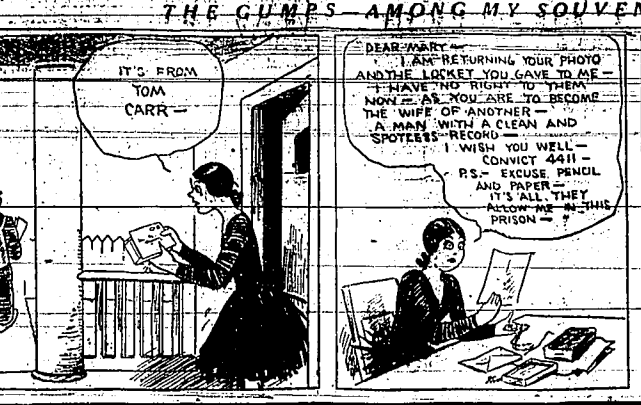

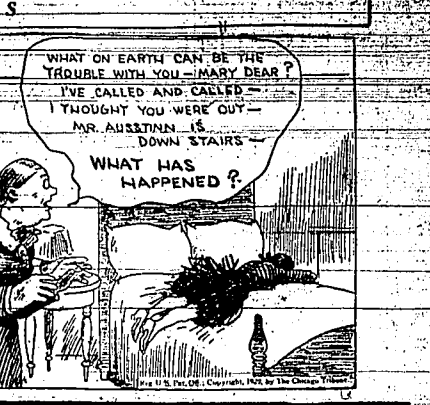

### RIISING TEMPERATURE CAUSES BREAKING UP OF ROAD BLOCKADES

**Wet Snow Retards Activity of Highway Crews; Boise Route Remains Open; Plow Clears Course West From Pocatello**

Temperature that lifted early in the day and held at better than 40 degrees several hours, was the best single factor yesterday making for removal of snow that has clumped on highway through out this region since the first of the week.

Measurements taken at the government weather-observer's station here showed the snow depth to 8 1/2 inches on the level as against the maximum for the week at 11 inches. The decline was caused by higher temperature yesterday.

While the thaw went a long way yesterday in removal of snow over the region as a whole it retarded the work of state and district highway department employes using snowplows to clear roads in this region.

The plows made slow progress against drifts that became increasingly heavier with the rise of water content of the snow.

A 10-ton tractor dragging two plows that had been pressed into the state highway department force here, cleared the road east from Twin Falls to Hansen and opened it three miles beyond before stopping work last evening.

Clears Eastern Road  
Twin Falls highway district's plow propelled by an extemporized tractor cleared nearly three miles of road eastward from the corner where the state highway turns north to Kimberly.

Flow Moves Westward  
A big plow working westward from Pocatello had opened the road to a point five miles west of American Falls, yesterday, according to word received by the commissioner.

The road to Jerome, that was blocked Thursday with drifts covering between two and three miles of the road, was opened again yesterday and the Twin Falls-Jerome-Shoshone stage resumed its schedule.
