ACCUSER IN JAIL FOR MURDER CHARGED TO MAN IN TWIN FALLS

Indiana Grand Jury Attributes to Former Sheriff Crime He Undertook to Fasten On Art Catlin, Taken For Car Theft

An extraordinary story of crime in which circumstantial evidence alone might have caused a man arrested here last August to pay the extreme penalty for a murder committed in Indiana, was disclosed by press dispatches telling of the arrest of Charles Zimmerman, an Indianapolis attorney, on an indictment charging him with the murder of Thomas Burke, Toledo, Ohio, whose charred body was found in the ruins of a barn near Angola, Ind., last August.

Records at the police station show that Zimmerman advised the Twin Falls officers that Catlin was in Angola to answer to the murder charge, and that officers would be sent from Indiana to take him to state. The Twin Falls officers called for evidence of Zimmerman's warrant for Catlin, and it was not forthcoming, so Catlin was turned over to federal authorities for prosecution on charges of theft of an automobile.

By his own story and by disclosure of investigations made by the officers here, Catlin was involved in the crime at Angola, an event which officers here consider it doubtful that he could have successfully maintained a defense on the murder charge.

He admitted that he had been in Angola on the night of the murder and that he had used a stolen station and stolen automobile plates off another car there that night, but he stoutly denied any knowledge of the killing.

Arrested by Chance His arrest here came through a freak chance. A traveling companion who picked up Catlin on his way through Wyoming was observed removing a blanket out of another car parked just across the street from the machine in which Catlin was traveling. Catlin and his companion were arrested on charges of theft of the blanket.

Angola newspapers, given to Twin Falls by Indiana news men, told of a chance meeting in Twin Falls soon after Catlin was arrested, careful full accounts of the murder and of the service station robbery and theft of the automobile license plates.
