# COOLIDGE NOMINATES LEJEUNE SUCCESSOR

## Major General Wendell C. Neville Holds 'Enviably' Record in Service of Nation's Army

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Major General Wendell C. Neville, commander of the marine corps base at Quantico, was nominated today by President Coolidge to succeed Major General John A. Lejeune, as commandant of the marine corps.

The senate must confirm the nomination before General Neville can take over the office which will become vacant March 5 when General Lejeune's term expires.

General Neville served with distinction in the American expeditionary force in France during the World War. He commanded the Fifth regiment of marines in the Verdun and Chateau Thierry sectors, and led the Fourth marine brigade in the subsequent operations about Soissons, the Marbache sector, St. Mihiel, the Champagne and the Meuse-Arzonne. After the war he was promoted to the rank of major general.

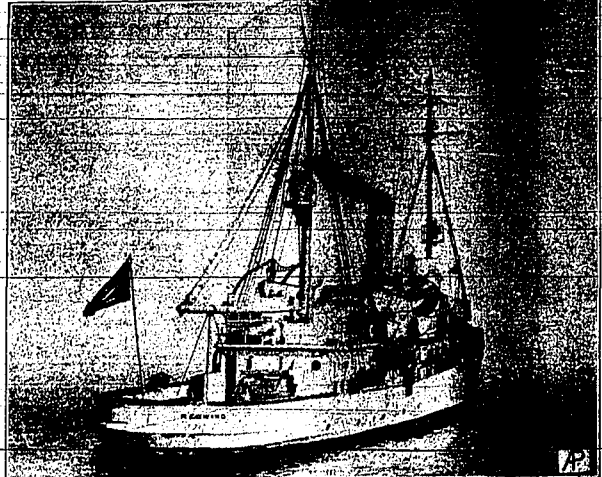

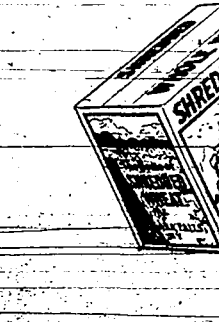

# LIVESTOCK MEN WILL ASSEMBLE IN DENVER

### Association Raises \$5000 Subscription to Educate Retail Merchant in Selling Cuts

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 7 (AP)—With the selection of Denver as the convention city of the American National Livestock Association, and the election of Victor Gulberson, Elvert City, New Mexico, as president, delegates to the thirty-second annual convention of the organization adjourned their final session here late today.

Contending that young housewives and apartment house dwellers are only aware of the existence of l-bone steaks and tenderloins, the association raised \$5000 by subscription to educate the retail meat merchant in the selling of the cheaper cuts.

As one of the last acts of their convention the gentlemen chose Denver as the next convention city over the spirited bidding of Ogden, Utah, which represented intact the membership of the executive committee, and elected officers for the coming year.

Henry Boise, Phoenix, Arizona was elected first vice-president; William Pollman, Baker, Oregon, second vice president and Charles E. Greig, Cheyenne, third vice president.

Progressing in quick succession from a discussion of Mexican labor to the control of predatory animals the delegates voted to oppose the Bow-Harris bill which would reduce immigration by permitting entry of Mexicans on the quota basis and endorsed a 10-year federal program for control of predatory animals.

Terminating the Capper bill regulating control of private stock yards as "aimed at restricting the producer's right to dispose of his livestock as he sees fit" the delegates voted unanimously in opposition of the measure.

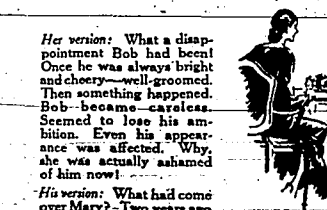

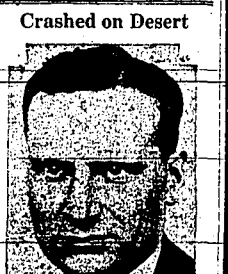
