SCHOOL BOY OF DULUTH, HONORED BY STUDENTS RAISES FLAG AND DIES

DULUTH, Minn., Feb. 12 (AP) - Little Vernon Rasmussen, a fourteen year old boy, the youngest of hundreds of children, had been given the privilege of raising the American flag during Lincoln day exercises at his school.
Proudly Vernon, hailed on the cord that raised the banner to the top of the flagpole, was suddenly struck by a gust of wind, which whipped in the wind, he gazed upward for a moment and then suddenly slumped to the ground. When fellow students reached his side his body was lifeless.
He died, physicians said, from heart disease.

WINTER STILL BRIPS EUROPEAN COUNTRIES

Steel Bridges and Railroad Rails Crack; Packs of Hungry Wolves Attack Villages

LONDON, Feb. 12 (AP) - Except in Turkey, where it sudden rise in temperature tonight brought welcome relief to the suffering population there, the winter grip continues to yield of an iron grip of extreme cold which holds all Europe with the exception of Spain, Portugal and Italy.
Heart shudders have resulted from Arctic temperatures of a severity hardly equalled by any records that the modern world has kept.
Cold is intense, as to crack steel bridges and railroad rails and to bring packs of hungry wolves and wild hounds to attack villages through the rugged ranges in the Balkans and in Belgium.
Already many human activities have been brought to a standstill.
In Washington, Feb. 12 (AP) - The one hundred twentieth anniversary of the birth of Lincoln was observed in Washington today both at the capitol and with memorial overtures in the Potomac river.
In the house the Gettysburg address was read by Representative Moore, Ohio, and in the senate tribute was paid by Senator Smoot, Utah. At the memorial building numerous patriotic orations were made.
Senator Shortridge, California, dedicated the memorial.
The address was correlated with American flags while Pennsylvania avenue, a long stretch of mud and water, was torn, also, and was bedecked with the national emblem.
The day, however, was not a holiday in Washington and all government departments were at work as usual and neither senate nor house interrupted its program except for a brief commemorative speeches.
"Lincoln," Senator Smoot said, "was a pacifist, and would not be a pacifist if alive today. Modern and national defense were the keynotes of his whole life. The birthplace of Lincoln is dedicated to preserve yet Lincoln was not for peace at any price. He was ready to fight for human freedom and a united nation."

NEZPERCE INDIAN DRAWS JAIL TERM FOR LARCENY

SPOKANE, Feb. 12 (AP) - After a three month term, Judge had sentenced three Nezperce Indians to jail for larceny in the case of Willie Smith, Nez Perce Indian, charged with grand larceny, the defendant, sentenced to three months and was sentenced to serve 1 to 14 years in the state prison today.

POCATELLO REGION PIONEERS IN CLAIRVOYANT'S CASE, RECOUNT HOLDUP STORY

POCATELLO, Feb. 12 (AP) - A lurid tale of one of the West's most sensational stage coach robberies figured in the trial here today of A. B. Meyer, alleged pseudo-clairvoyant and former resident of Milwaukee, charged with robbing a Pocatello woman out of \$400 by promises to uncover treasures buried in 1850.
Mrs. Agnes Schwabe, McCammon, Idaho, testified that Meyer, posed as a fortune teller, during a seance told her of a stage coach robbery at Robbers' Bend, Creek, near this city, and claimed to know where the bandits buried the loot. He offered to go to the mining place and recover the plunder, if she would advance the money to carry on excavations. She said she provided money for the treasure hunt.

REAPPORTMENT DEMAND

When the jury returned to the courtroom for a final instruction to the court, the judge announced he decided to plead guilty. He had been in jail six months prior to the opening of his trial.

"Orgy of Competition Between Idaho-Cities-Must-Be-Curbed," Declares Senator Callahan in Senate Address

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Feb. 12 (AP) - A declaration that "this orgy of competition in airport building" carried on between cities in Idaho must be curbed was made by Senator Callahan, Shoshone county, in the senate this afternoon when an aeronautical measure was being amended in committee of the whole.
His statement followed a series of arguments over who should vote in bond elections. House bill 3 was up for amendment to provide that only property holders should vote on their provisions allowing highway districts, counties and towns to bond themselves for airport facilities. It was finally held over pending report and then amended at a late hour.

Annual Meeting of Cooperative Creamery Brings 600 Stockholders Together; Sales of Year Pass \$1,000,000 Mark

(Special to The News) JEROME, Feb. 12 - Total sales made by the Jerome Cooperative creamery for the year ending December 31, 1919, were \$1,030,460 against \$930,465 for 1917, showing a gain of \$128,387.24, or 13.7 per cent. It was shown in the report of Roy Smith, secretary, that 600 stockholders in the creamery and affiliated cooperative organizations held here today. Six counties were represented at the meeting.

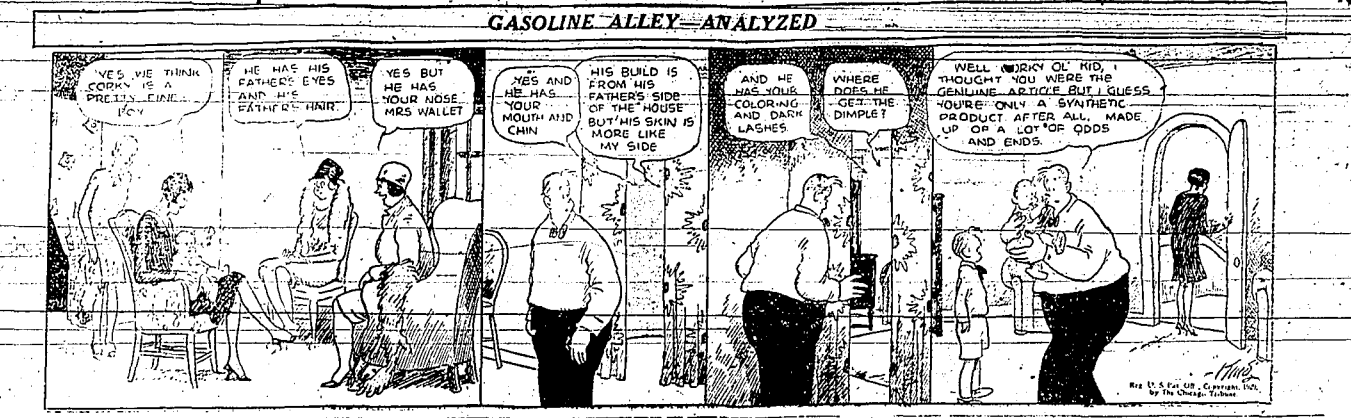

WELCH AND TUCKER TALK AT TRIAL IN TWIN FALLS COURT

State Commissioner of Agriculture and Dairy Inspector Sued by DeLong for Damages, Ask Change of Venue

John S. Welch, Idaho commissioner of agriculture, and George Tucker, state dairy inspector, were the defendants in a suit for \$28,000 damages filed yesterday in district court here by Carl L. DeLong, Twin Falls potato dealer, who has asked trial in Boise. Hearing on their application for change of venue which were filed here yesterday by W. D. Gillis, Idaho attorney general, has been fixed to be held here February 15.

In affidavits supporting motion for change of venue both Welch and Tucker assert that they cannot expect to receive fair trial in Twin Falls county; they assert, "groves and ships many hundreds of carloads of potatoes each year and the controversy over the affidavits multiplied by the state department of agriculture in reference to same has become very antagonistic and bitter to such an extent as to bias many residents of this county and to endanger the possibility of a fair trial of the issues in this case."

Welch and Tucker also filed their demurrers to DeLong's complaint. DeLong, together with the Idaho Falls Potato Growers, a corporation, and Fred Gustafson, with conspiracy to injure his reputation as a potato dealer, file charges that Tucker told growers and others here last summer that DeLong could not ship potatoes in 1928, and the commissioner of agriculture, he alleges, conspired with the Idaho potato growers to obtain a restraining order from the court in Idaho Falls to prevent him shipping potatoes this year. The suit was withdrawn, DeLong alleges, before he had opportunity to answer.
