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POLICE OFFICIAL OF CHICAGO OUT TO GET LIQUOR LAW BREAKER

Progress Toward Solution of St. Valentine's Day Massacre, Attributed to 'Booze Vendors' Ring Slowly; Not New Theory

(By The Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Feb. 21—A systematic search of all Chicago, including the entering of both private and public records for liquor law violators, was ordered today by William F. Russell, commissioner of police in his fight to enforce prohibition here.
 The commissioner, who charged the St. Valentine's day massacre of seven members of the Moran gang was a result of liquor running and prohibition ordered a survey made of the entire city with particular attention paid to all buildings fronting on alleys, such as garages, barns and sheds.
 No progress was made however, in solving the massacre, not even a new theory as to how the slaughter was evolved.
 Orders were ordered to supply addresses, owners and lessees of all suspected places after which the commissioner said that the places were to be searched either with the permission of the owner or by obtaining search warrants, policemen to be posted at the suspected places until the warrants have been obtained.
 Will Not Enter Homes
 The entering of homes is not contemplated, the commissioner explained, because it has been shown that the places that were flats or other liquor law violations occur there.
 The order is the most drastic issued here since prohibition became effective, was described by the commissioner as a furtherance of his plan to "clean up" the city and keep it "down to earth" and "keep it down." He asked citizens not to be unduly alarmed over the Moran gang killings, explaining them as "the killing off of one bunch of hoodlums by another" and said that crime had recently been greatly reduced here. He added "the town is lighter today than it has ever been but was nothing to what it is going to be."
 A group of city officials meeting in Commissioner Russell's office today said his order was issued, agreed to increase the total award of apprehension and conviction of the Moran gang killers to \$50,000 by making the city to donate the \$20,000 and raising \$30,000 by public subscription in addition to the funds already promised.

 A bill aimed at minimizing fire hazards in forests as well as in other places was introduced. The bill would make it a misdemeanor to throw out of automobiles any cigarettes or other things which might cause fires. The same would apply to leaving cigarettes lying about in such a way as to cause fires.

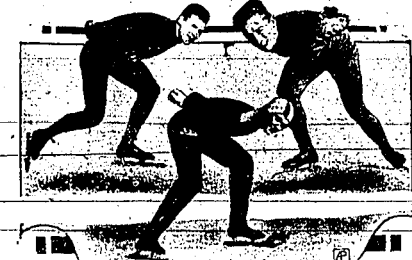

Sharkey Confident Of Victory in Bout With Georgia Boxer

Boston Sailor Tells Manager He Can't Promise to Put Opponent Out With Kayo Blow But Declares He Will Fight

(By The Associated Press) MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 21.—Naked, but for a pair of tight, a smiling Jack Sharkey perched on the edge of a pine-bench in his dressing room at the hotel here last night, confident of his manager, Johnny Buckley, Johnny grinned back at the Boston sailor, gathered together handkerchiefs and tape and put on his boxing gloves as Sharkey wrapped his hands.

"John," said the happy fighter, "I have just hit my shot with Dempsey. I've got another chance and you can bet all the Irish in South Boston that there'll be no fooling next Wednesday night. I can't promise to knock out young Stribling. I'm through with that kind of talk—but I'll win and if I feel like it I'll knock out Stribling."

Manager Arthur Chestnut said that he had had a long talk with Stribling and that he had promised to put on a new arrangement seemed to make both happy.

Sharkey today believes he is in the best condition of his career, he really looks it—burned a brick red by the semi-tropical sun, little, fast, and lean as a number greyhound at 187 pounds, the lowest weight of his career.

THAT TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL for Twin Falls News.

Have read your editorial 'Reducing Taxes' with interest and desire to call your attention to several matters referred to in the article.

In the first place, no bond issue is proposed for from the city of Salmon City. An appropriation is asked from the general fund of \$141,000 to build, equip, and operate for one year a hospital for tuberculosis.

A modern tuberculosis pavilion approved by the American Sanatorium Association can be built for \$31,000. The state owns these plans. The remainder of the money will equip and run the institution for one year.

After the unit is built the state will only be asked to pay \$100 per day subsidy toward the care of patients in the sanatorium.

BABSON DISCUSSES WEATHER'S EFFECTS ON TREND OF SALES

Market Statistician Indicates Importance of Part Played by Climatic Condition Over Every Section of Country

(Special to The News)
BABSON FARE, Pa. Feb. 16.—In his statement today, Roger W. Babson points out that the influence of the weather on business and how weather reports can be used to increase sales and to decrease selling costs.

"A wealth of weather records have been gathered by the United States weather bureau that may be invaluable to business management, but many executives do not even know they exist. The practical application of weather statistics is as undeveloped as the application of business statistics was 23 years ago. Weather is almost the determining factor in the sale of many lines of goods. To the retailer who is confined to one location the problem is to push seasonable goods when the weather is favorable; the manufacturer or other national distributor should push his goods where the weather is favorable. To illustrate: One blankets manufacturer has found that the best localities in which to get replenishing orders for blankets are where there has been a week or more of unseasonably cold weather. This may be in Minneapolis or Tampa. People buy according to relative, rather than actual temperatures.

"Whichever is there a time when all the country is usually cold or warm, wet or dry. In fact, a cold winter in the Gulf states usually means a mild winter in northern parts of the country. In rainfall, the country sometimes is divided down the middle; the western half may have a dry season and the eastern half a wet season. Certain isolated localities also are found where the weather is different from that in surrounding territory. There is always some section in which to sell raincoats or blankets, electric fans or fur coats. The weather records, cut along, a sales manager where these places are.

Practical Uses Found

"About a year ago a group of retailers in Boston got the idea of timing their advertising and special sales so that the advertisements would appear on days when the weather was suitable. In an effort to secure detailed weather forecasts a week in advance they secured the services of a skillful but independent meteorologist from whom they received private reports. However, even with the regular public forecasts of the day ahead which the government furnishes it is possible often times to regulate advertising in accordance with the weather probabilities. Although these weather forecasts, daily or weekly, are not 100 per cent correct, they are found to be of practical help.

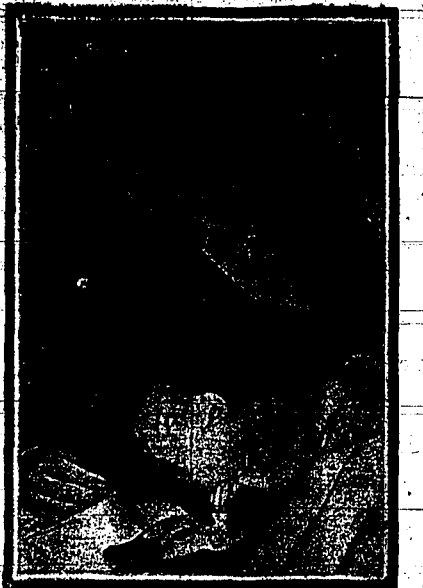
"I also have been much interested in the study of weather forecasting which is based upon solar observations. Anyone who carefully examines the work done in this field by Henry H. Cliney, of the Smithsonian Institution for a long time has been measuring these solar changes and Mr. Cliney has been correlating them to the wave movements in weather.

Effects of Winter Weather

"An interesting phenomenon in weather has been taken place this winter which has had, and will have important effects upon many seasonal lines of business. A slow moving fundamental wave of colder than normal weather started in the northwestern part of the country in the early part of December and has gradually worked eastward. This wave is of fundamental type and should not be confused with the shorter and more rapid waves that follow each other at intervals of a few days. Up to the first part of December practically all the northern half of the United States had averaged warmer than normal. Merchants in this whole area certainly had a difficult season for fall and winter goods, such as furs, winter clothing, winter sports goods, fuel, and other things which sell best in cold weather. On the other hand, sales of soft drinks, ice cream, milk, etc., were larger than they usually are at that season.

"During December, however, in the extreme West and Northwestern areas, colder than normal weather appeared. It spread over the states of Washington, Oregon, California, Wyoming, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, and southwestern Montana. This is a long area which is covering a large area which undoubtedly had its origin in heat changes given out by the sun. All the rest of the country remained warmer than normal in December, including even the most northern states of the country, such as Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan and Maine. While merchants in the Northwest had a good December business in winter merchandise, merchants in the Middle-West and East found the weather too warm for rapid movement of winter goods.

"Then during the month of January the fundamental cold wave reached central covering the whole Mississippi valley, lake region, and as far east as Buffalo. In December temperatures had averaged 7 degrees above normal in Minneapolis; 53 degrees in Milwaukee; 3 degrees in Chicago; 4 degrees in Peoria; 3 degrees in Omaha; 2 degrees in Kansas City, and 1 degree in St. Louis. Conditions in January, however, were entirely reversed. Each of these cities experienced a month of severe winter weather. In some of these January was the most severe. In Chicago, for example, the concern selling winter goods in the above sections the same weather in January was a bit of extreme good fortune after it had a little late in

coming. Sales of such goods immediately responded to the seasonal weather. The Atlantic coast states fell some of the colder weather in January that covered the West and Middle Western states, but still averaged slightly warmer than normal January temperatures.

Setting Weather and Business

"The question now arises as to whether the advance of the broad cold area will continue to the Atlantic seaboard, and what is the outlook for prices. The indications, I am told, are that colder weather is in prospect for the Atlantic states and that the spring months this year will average colder than normal throughout most of the northern half of the country.

"It is believed in the present stage of work no weather forecast is absolutely sure, but the indications for the above prediction seem sufficiently convincing so that they may be taken seriously. It is significant that during the last seven months in the Eastern States the forecasts made on the same basis have been right six months out of the seven. Moreover the approach of the fundamental cold wave which has spread across the country was foreseen several months ago.

"If we are to have a cold, late spring over the northern half of this country it means many things to business and especially to retail trade. Easter, which really opens the spring season, comes early this year. This means that both merchants and manufacturers should plan energetic and aggressive advertising and sales campaigns to overcome increased sales resistance that is likely to be encountered. Unseasonable weather of course is always a handicap, but is disastrous only when it is unexpected and unprepared for. If there is to be a late spring, sales of spring goods will require more than the usual amount of advertising and sales effort.

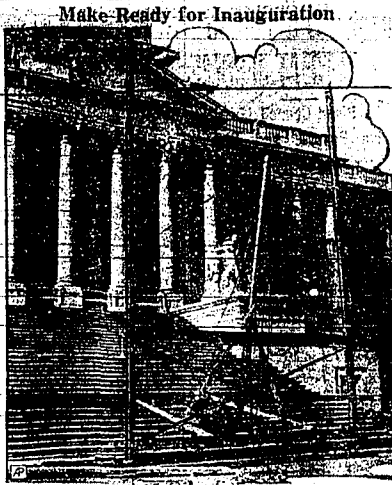

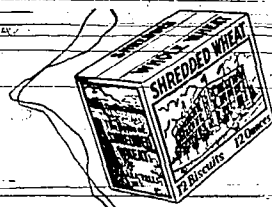

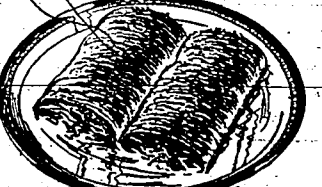

WURMI DECLINES TO RACE AGAINST WIDE

Flying Finn Passes Up Chance to Stage Two Mile Classic With His Old Time Opponent

NEW YORK, Feb. 21 (Special to The News)—Passing up a chance to meet his old rival, Nils Wile, Sweden in a classic duel of two miles, Paavo Nurmi has definitely decided to compete only in the "tepee" race at the national indoor track and field championships at Madison Square Garden Saturday night, the American Athletic union announced today.

Wile, who holds the world's outdoor two-mile record while the indoor mark belongs to Paavo, issued what amounted to a challenge to the Finn two weeks ago by announcing he intended to enter the two-mile flat race and would welcome a meeting with Nurmi.

Beaten 10 Times Although Paavo has beaten the Swede 10 times out of the 19 they have had, the Finns have decided in view of his defeat at the hands of Ray Conner at a mile in the Illinois game he is not ready to race with so formidable a twister as the running schoolmaster from Sweden. He had filed his entry for the contest.

In the tepee race no particularly keen opposition is in sight unless Ville Ritola should decide to compete. In his absence Paavo may concentrate on beating the world's mark of 9:35.25 for the two mile tepee race which is held by Ritola, an old Finnish rival who lives in New York.

UNIVERSITY TO GIVE OVER 300 DIPLOMAS

Idaho Institution Prepares For Graduation of Largest Class in School's History

MOSCOW, Feb. 21—With more than 290 applications for bachelors' degrees already filed, the University of Idaho expects to graduate the largest class in its history this commencement in June, says Miss E. L. Olson, registrar. The number of applications filed exceeds by about 10 per cent the number of bachelors' degrees granted at commencement last year.

An increase in the number of masters' degrees also is forecast by the registrar. Applications for this advanced degree, however, are not to be filed until March 15. Practically all of the bachelors' degree applications were filed before February 20.

Record-Breaking Class
The prospect of a record-breaking graduating class this spring—constitutes another chapter in the steady growth of the University of Idaho. In 1922 the university bestowed 54 bachelors' degrees. The following commencement saw 88 degrees awarded. In 1923 the same number of degrees were granted, but in 1924 the fourth-year class showed a healthy growth and degrees totaled 154. The following commencement the number numbered 172, and in 1925 totaled 194. In 1926 bachelors' degrees numbered 255, the largest number on record. The next spring the decline was slight, but last spring almost exceeded the high mark of 1925, totalling 233.

Inclusion of advanced degrees is expected to make the university's 1929 graduating class well over the 300 mark.

STATE PASSES ANCIENT CLAIM UNDER MORTGAGE

Suit instituted by the state of Idaho in 1922 to foreclose a mortgage on 1029 in Cassia county owned at one time by Charles O. Workman, was brought to trial yesterday before Judge J. B. Moore in district court here yesterday. The case was taken under advisement at the conclusion of the trial.

As grounds for defense it was urged that the mortgage conditions had run against the obligation, showing being made for the defendant, W. O. Chapman of counsel for D. B. Moorhead and Mrs. Myrtle M. Lilly, the only two defendants who were represented. Moorhead purchased the land in question from Workman and Mrs. Lilly holds a mortgage claim against it.

The suit has been instituted through Sweely and Sweely, Twin Falls.

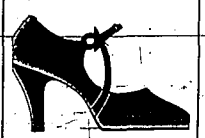

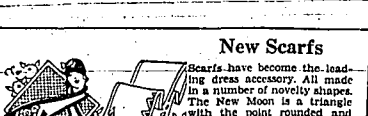
