(Continued From Page One) he remained with the body while Duncan returned to his own residence to summon the officers.

Lewis, according to Lewis, left the Duncan residence at about 7 P. M., and it is believed that he stopped in the lot to feed the hogs in accordance with Duncan's request. The animals were fed potatoes that were cooked in a kettle near where the body was found. The kettle was under the Deep Creek Land and Water company, and it had been about one-fourth full earlier in the day.

Close to the kettle was an axe that had been used in cutting fuel for cooking the potatoes. There was no indication that it had been moved. The body was found with the head horribly mutilated and almost completely severed from the body in an iron trough. The clothing had been pulled down half way to the waist, and seven buttons of the mackinaw and underwear worn by Lewis were picked up by the officers under and about the body.

DIRECTORATE MEETS TO CONSIDER LEASE

Board of Directors of Salmon Company Agrees With Deep Creek Men on Terms

Salmon River canal company may terminate at any time after one year, the lease and option to purchase the water, water rights, canal system and property, and a certain 640 acres of land which it may select on the Deep Creek reservation, according to a statement from the officers of the Deep Creek Land and Water company, received by the Salmon River Canal company directors at an adjourned meeting last night and accepted by them as a correct construction of the lease and option.

The statement of the Deep Creek Land and Water company is signed by A. F. Craven as secretary of the company. It states that certain stockholders of the Salmon River Canal company are contending that the same may be so terminated. A resolution of the Deep Creek Land and Water company, covering this point accompanied the statement.

The Salmon River Canal company board accepted the interpretation of the Deep Creek Land and Water company, saying that the terms and provisions of the lease and option have been mutually construed to mean that it has the power to terminate the lease and option to purchase at any time after one year's use. The Salmon company directors added the following resolution:

"That it is the sense of the board of directors of the Salmon River Canal company, that a resolution in writing be submitted to the stockholders

ROTARIANS HEAR OF IRRIGATION PROJECT

D. H. Sutphen, Gooding, Explains Importance of Second Reservoir District

The magnitude of Reservoir district No. 2, which is a gravity extension of the Mindoka unit, and its importance to Twin Falls as a southern Idaho trading center, were described yesterday at a luncheon of the Twin Falls Rotary club by D. H. Sutphen, Gooding, attorney, who is secretary of the district.

Mr. Sutphen traced the early irrigation movement in the territory embraced in the project, which culminated in a reclamation movement by the Idaho Irrigation company under the Carey act on which 90,000 acres were sold. This was finally reduced to 75,000 acres, he said. Water, however, has always been short, ranging from 15 per cent in 1924 to 70 per cent on years when the supply in Wood River and Magic reservoir was unusually good, it was stated.

The plan is to take 400,000 acre feet of Snake River water from the American upper part. This will not only irrigate the lower part of the project and use the Wood River and Magic Reservoir, the upper part. This will not only irrigate the original acreage, but will, when fully developed, permit the addition of 30,000 acres more of which 20,000 will be in Jerome county near Eden and the rest in Lincoln county near Ebbshone, he declared. The sales price for this will be about \$75 an acre payable in 40 years without interest. Soldiers preference will extend to the new lands added.

The government has already appropriated \$1,500,000 for this project. Three and a half miles of the canal which will be completed by 1930, have been completed. One of the largest dragline machines in the world is in operation making up the canal. It is expected to complete the canal to Little Wood River in 1930 and to Big Wood River a couple of years later. The additional 30,000 acres will be opened in about five years.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. Feb. 27.—The fistie hopes of W. L. (Young) Stribling, heavyweight pride of Georgia and the South, skyrocketed tonight in the bulky tropical air.—Having high, then falling, were extinguished in a sparkling blaze by the raining flists of the big Boston sailor, Jack Sharkey. 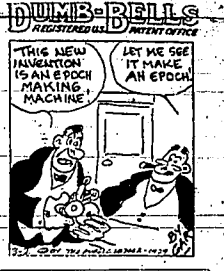
There were more warnings for the fighters from the referee before the game opened the last round. They came out jabbing carefully again, the Southerner and pinned him to the ropes with his right hand.

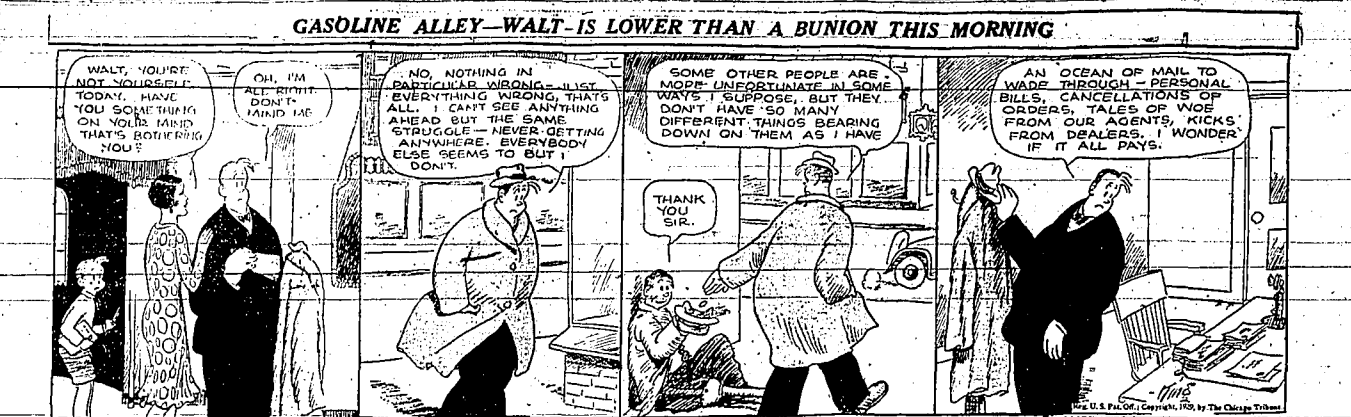

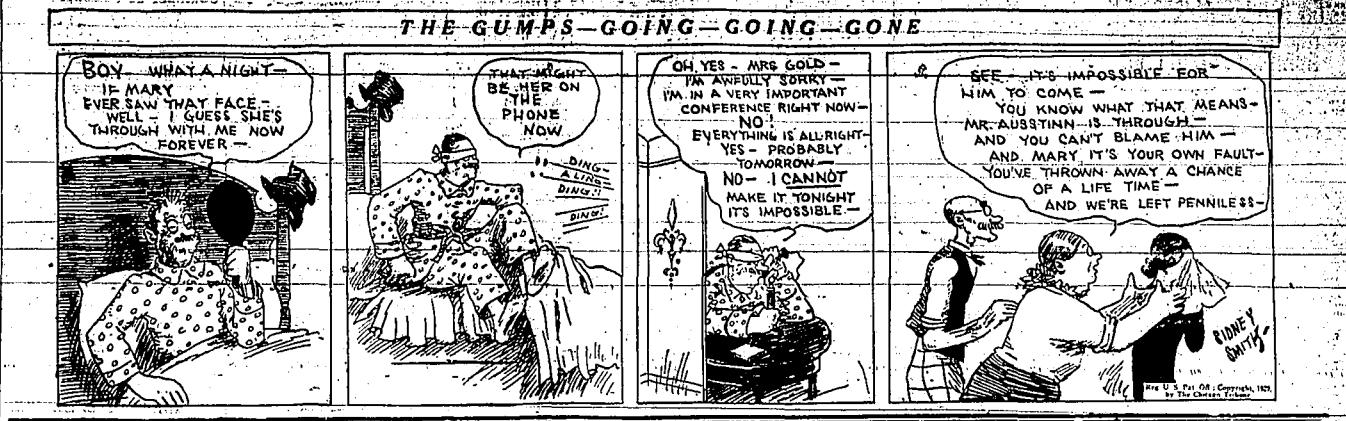
