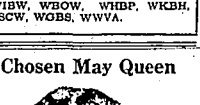

WHO MUST FILE RETURNS Every single person or married person not living with husband or wife receiving a net income of \$1500 or more, or a gross income of \$2000 or more, during the year must file an income tax return, and every married person, living with husband or wife during the entire year, must file a return if the combined net income was \$3500 or more, or if the combined gross income was \$5000 or more.

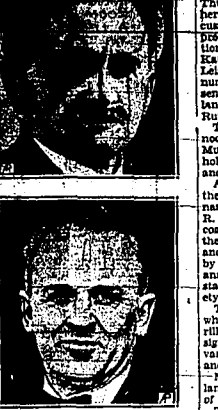

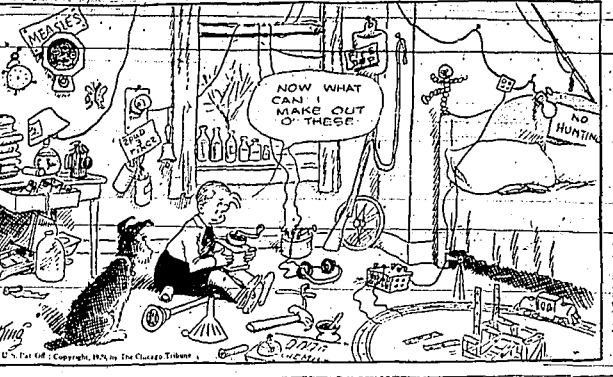

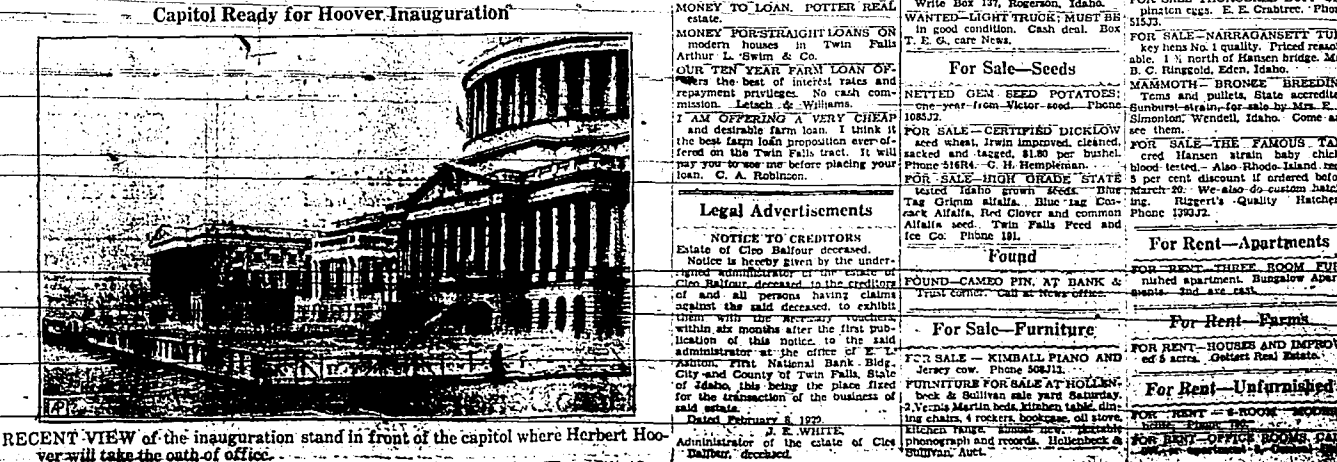
