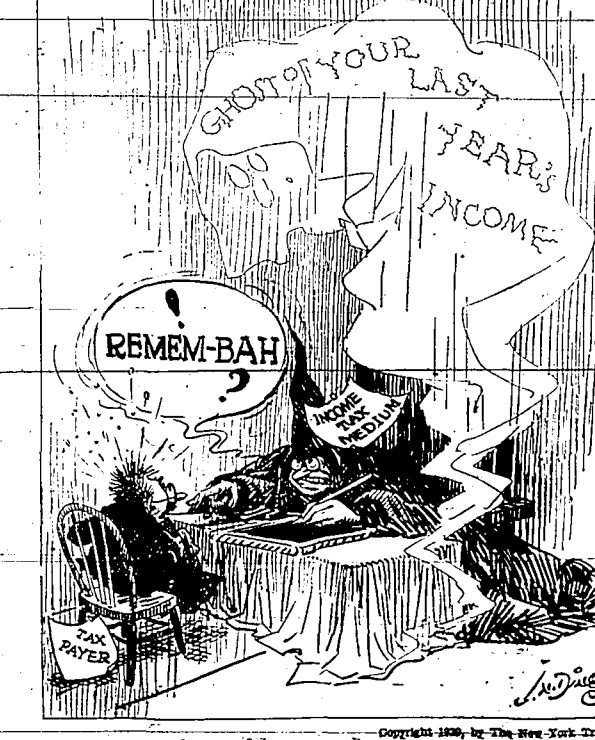

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FLOOD DANGERS IN WYOMING PASSING

Waters Cause of Over \$150,000 Damage at Grey Bull; Residents Return Home

GREY BULL, Wyo., March 11 (AP)—The flood stage of the Big Horn river, which reached a high water mark over the week-end and equaled in several years, inundating the banks in World, Manderson and Lovell and in the lowlands near Basin, was believed to have passed temporarily at least tonight.

The Big Horn river reached flood stage in Manderson, 18 miles north of World, this morning, but the town was not damaged and the danger of a flood there was considered slight, as the water was going down rapidly.

Only a few hours after the backwater of the river had receded from Grey Bull after flooding the entire town late Saturday night and the town homes Saturday night and Sunday, fled again today as they were menaced by the river.

While the situation at Basin was regarded as serious, another damaging flood was not expected soon, and in the meantime measures will be taken to control the water.

Property damage to Grey Bull was estimated at between \$150,000 and \$200,000.

The wind reached a flood stage over the week-end and took out the main dam between Shoshone, Lander, and Thermopolis.

RANGE LAMBLING WILL BE IN PROGRESS BY APRIL

BOISE, March 11 (AP)—Most of the "shed" lambing in Idaho is complete and the range lambing will be well underway shortly after the first of April, Dr. J. S. Dade, chief inspector of the state sheep commission, announced today.

Lambing began very early in January in some sections along the Snake river, notably at Mountain Home. The lambing dates were later at the stations advanced farther up-stream along the river.

Lambing at Grand View was well underway early in January, but further up the river around Twin Falls it got underway about February 5.

Lambing is now under way in the Sugar City, Aberdeen and Rexburg districts on the upper Snake river. In this section the proportion of range-lambing to range lambing is just about opposite to what it is on the lower river near Mountain Home and Grand View. On the upper Snake river the proportion of range lambing to shed lambing is about five to one while on the lower river it is about three to one in favor of the shed lambing.

Shipments of Potatoes Increase in February

BOISE, March 11 (AP)—Shipment of potatoes marked a heavy increase in February over January, the reports of the Pacific Fruit express revealed today. In January 2038 carloads were shipped out of the state while in February 2,712 carloads were shipped.

A marked decrease was shown in onion shipments, 37 carloads going out in February compared with 129 in January. Other February shipments of produce were: Butter, 40 carloads; apples 244 carloads; cheese 23; eggs six; dressed poultry six; canned goods fifteen; honey three.

declared that "the reclamation and settlement of the arid lands will enrich every portion of our country, just as the valleys of the Ohio and Mississippi Settlements brought prosperity to the Atlantic States." Congress followed his address and passed the reclamation act, which has resulted in bringing approximately 3,000,000 acres of arid land under cultivation.

The problem was brought before Congress last week by Representative Addison T. Smith, who pointed out that the reclamation program should be halted until consumption has again caught up with reclamation output. Such a view is a hasty conclusion that is in no way based on the facts.

The three great crops which suffer from overproduction are wheat, corn and cotton. In the United States there are many farm products which the United States does not import. It is estimated that \$800,000,000 is spent in foreign countries each year for crops that could be produced on United States soil.

Furthermore, the projects undertaken by the Reclamation Bureau are opening little new land to cultivation. All of the new projects undertaken in recent years have been designed to relieve settlers already on the land, who have built homes and partially developed their farms, but have been seriously handicapped by lack of water.

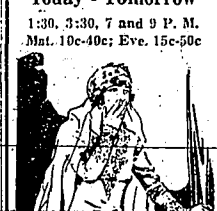

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RAGING SNOWSTORM HALTS TRAFFIC ON TWIN FALLS ROADS

Rapidly Forming Drifts On Highways Prevent Travel; Short Line Brings Rotary to Maintain Service

Whirling, twisting snowfall that set in Sunday afternoon and was continuing late last night, yesterday blocked all roads in and out of Twin Falls, interrupting motor stage service and seriously interfering with operation of school buses.

There were no motor buses in operation on the road between Boise and Shoshone; but the stage from Shoshone pulled in late last evening after battling through wind swept drifts most of the way. Some of the school buses did not arrive with pupils at school houses here until noon yesterday.

The road between Twin Falls and Burley was blocked so that word came here yesterday to halt traffic eastbound from here over the highway. The road between Twin Falls and Kimberly, between miles east, was closed last evening.

Train Service Continues

Train service was not interrupted yesterday, but extra precaution was taken for keeping the Twin Falls-Wells line open, and the southbound train that set out over that line from here at 5 P. M. yesterday traveled the wake of the big rotary plow that had been brought for the purpose from Pocatello yards. The northbound train over the Twin Falls-Wells line was held at Wells yesterday until the arrival of the plow and the southbound train.

The storm yesterday caused postponement of two funeral services, one of which was to have been held here and the other at Hazelton, and a regular meeting of Twin Falls board of education was postponed to next Thursday because of snow blocked roads.

Remove Stalled Cars

The Twin Falls section of the state highway department spent yesterday digging out cars along the state highway. Cars were released to a point eight miles west of Bull. The road between Twin Falls and Bull was still open last night.

The large truck rotary plow which was used here recently in opening up the roads will leave Shoshone for Twin Falls this morning. There is no other machinery available at present. Practically all the machinery that was left here is open last night.

Hereafter the winter has been hard on cattle or sheep, as the protracted cold, while accompanied by a great deal of snow, was dry. The cost of feed was unusually heavy as stock eat more when it is cold, stockmen declared.

Loss of Lambs Not Heavy

Despite the continued hard freezing the loss among lambs has been relatively light. "An average number born with an average loss" was the way one sheepsman put it yesterday. The lambing season is now practically over, but a few will be born during the next few days. Should the present heavy snow be followed by a steady period, the mortality among these may be heavier than the death rate has been among lambs so far.

Many cattle have been deborned and branched in preparation for turning them out on the range. These will probably come through all right but will consume a great deal more feed than heretofore. However, it is generally believed that the feed supply will be ample unless the bad weather should extend over another month.

The storm put a number of telephones out of order Sunday night. These were fixed up as rapidly as possible and the stunts cleared yesterday and last evening in spite of the heavy wind and snow.

The power lines of the Idaho Power company withstood the storm well, and gave little trouble except in a few isolated instances where they were temporarily put out of commission.

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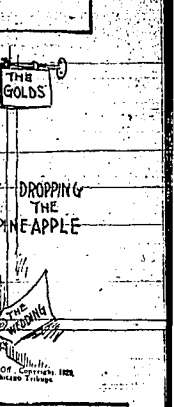

COUNCIL APPROVES MERCHANTS' PLANS FOR MOTOR EXHIBIT

Petition For Closing Two Blocks on Shoshone Street to Afford Space For Outdoor Display Approved

Cooperating with Twin Falls merchants in their plans for a spring opening event, Twin Falls city council in regular session last evening, voted to close a petition for closing two blocks on Shoshone street between Fourth and Sixth avenues to afford space for an outdoor automobile show. The street is to be closed from noon to late evening on Friday, March 22, in accordance with the request which was presented for the merchants by N. W. S. Wright of the chamber of commerce.

The council also approved issuance of five municipal builders' permits for new construction involving total estimated investment of \$2775, and adopted two resolutions, one providing for the holding of a municipal election next April 2 for election of mayor and two councilmen, and the other fixing dates of expiration of terms of members of Twin Falls public library board.

Registration Begins

Under state law, to which the election proclamation conforms, registration of voters will begin today and continue until 9 P. M. Saturday, March 30. It is necessary to be registered in order to vote, but persons whose names were on the city's registration list two years ago and who have not since changed their place of residence are not required to register.

Terms of members of the public library board will expire on January 1, 1932. Terms of W. E. Nixon and Mrs. E. M. Sweeney expire January 1, 1931, and term of W. S. Hill expires January 1, 1932. Hereafter members have served for three years from date of their appointment, and the resolution recites, some uncertainty has grown out of this situation.

Valuation Advances

Assessed valuation for 1928 of all taxable property in Twin Falls totals \$5,011,672, showing an increase of \$48,022 over the preceding year's total of \$4,963,650, according to statement received from the county auditor's office. Subject to approval by the building inspector the council has evening granted permits for building as follows: William Clawson; store building, 25 by 50 feet, main avenue east; cost \$500. Anna E. Mrs. Geneva Lewis, 244 Eighth avenue north, garage, 12 by 18 feet; cost \$150. L. A. Maulberg, 1140 Seventh avenue east, two-rooms addition; cost \$300.

Investments Will Be Topic For Discussion at Luncheon of Organization

"Every woman a saver" is the slogan of the Twin Falls Business and Professional Women's club in participating today with 1000 other clubs which are members of the national federation of the organization in the United States.

Voicing the conviction that the business or professional woman will only come into her own when she is financially independent, the national federation urges each of the 52,000 members of affiliated organizations to start some form of saving or investment on Thrift day that will guarantee her financial protection, and to consult banker or investment banker and receive his advice on this subject.

At the noon luncheon in the club rooms today the Twin Falls organization will hear discussions on investments by R. H. Musser, agent for the Oregon Life Insurance company; J. O. Bradley, vice-president of the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company, and H. E. Grant, president of the Mutual Building and Loan association.

PLANS FOR \$600,000 COLD STORAGE PLANT UNDER CONSIDERATION

Los Angeles Firm Submits Outlines of Project For Handling Large Quantity of Twin Falls Products

Tentative plans for the construction of a cold storage plant in Twin Falls at a cost of approximately \$600,000, were laid before a number of business men here yesterday by G. H. A. Dorsey, representing the Producers' Engineering Corporation, Los Angeles. It was explained that the plan suggested was based on figures on production obtained from the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and other organizations here and in nearby towns, and subject to revision on discussion and consideration.

The structure as tentatively outlined by Mr. Dorsey would be 140 by 700 feet in dimensions. It would be one story high with basement underneath and equipped with modern machinery. The material proposed to be used in construction will not be announced until contractors have been consulted in regard to cost and durability. It is stated.

Besides the dimensions mentioned, the plans provide for a 12-foot platform next to the railroad track for loading cars and a 16-foot platform at the town side of the building.

Washington Machinery

Among the advantages which Mr. Dorsey claims for the proposed plant, he is stated, that it will among other things, take care of 300,000 boxes of apples at one time, or one-third of the crop on the project; that it will contain washing and drying machinery for apples and getting rid of the spray residue; that it will have a modern ice plant and refrigerator section; that green vegetables and small fruits can be preserved fresh indefinitely by modern process; that if necessary, olivaceous leaf late rains can be killed dried and saved, and that in all particulars the structure, machinery and equipment will be of the very latest and most approved pattern.

Relative to financing the erection and conduct of the establishment, Mr. Dorsey said that the company would take care of the big part of it, but like to have a number of local people interested. He said that if the size of cost did not suit, changes could be made.

Accompanied by the bereaved husband, the body of Mrs. Josephine Dyer Brizee, wife of Harry A. Brizee, for whom funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the family residence on Lincoln avenue, will be taken today to Oakland, California, for burial. Mr. and Mrs. Brizee were married 23 years ago in California, and that state is the home of Mrs. Brizee's family. The impressive funeral service for the Christian Scientist was read at the services here by Mrs. J. C. Ware.

HEALTH-SITUATION AT LINCOLN SCHOOL CLEAR

Status of the Lincoln school with respect to the meningitis situation has been definitely determined on the basis of bacteriological tests that disclosed two carriers among 500 persons examined, including all of the pupils of the school. Treatment of carriers has been in their homes for treatment to eradicate the bacteria, and the quarantine has been lifted as against all other persons examined. Treatment of carriers has been delayed awaiting arrival of a gas that is used in the treatment, it was explained last evening.

The examination, which has been made under direction of the state bacteriologist and state department of public welfare, in cooperation with the county board of health, is to be extended to the Murtagh district if time and weather conditions permit. C. K. Macey, commissioner of public welfare, is expected here today and he will be requested to authorize the bacteriologist to remain longer in this region for that purpose.

T. J. Lloyd, chairman of the bureau of industries of the chamber of commerce, said last evening that he would call a meeting of fruit and vegetable growers as soon as weather and road conditions would permit, to consider the tentative plans suggested by Mr. Dorsey.
