Fields won handily, coming close to stopping the negro in the first two rounds.

Fields broke out in the Coliseum during the eighth round when the lights suddenly went out and a rush for exits began.

Johnny Sherrard, Fort Worth, Texas, weighing 158 pounds, outlasted King Levinsky, Chicago, in five rounds.

Al Greenfield, Chicago, won the verdict over Louie Avery, heavy handed slugger of Tulsa, in five rounds at 130 pounds.

NEW YORK, March 25—The solution of the big Cornell football mystery may turn out to be the selection of Harry Stuhldreher, head man of Notre Dame's famous "Four Horsemen," to succeed Glenn Dobson as head coach and chase away the gridiron gloom above Cayuga's waters.

It has all been a dark secret so far that, despite, after five disastrous seasons and under some pressure, was prepared to resign—a secret, that is, to everyone but those who not only seem to accept the door Scoot's retirement at Cornell as a fact but who also appear to know the exact date on which official announcement will be made. If, as they expect, such announcement is made this Wednesday, it will no more than confirm their previous understanding.

Stuhldreher's entrance as the probable successor of Dobie indicates, principally, the desire to rebuild the big red gridiron fortunes with one of the younger and most successful members of the modern coaching school in charge.

There is no question of the high place Stuhldreher has gained as a teacher of the game since he left Notre Dame with All-American honors. Stuhldreher, now 27, made the "Four Horsemen" famous from 1922 to 1924. He was a favorite with Rockne, and they said of him, that it was like having another coach on the field.

The final drama of the professional hockey world's series this spring seems likely to involve two clubs of the same division, with the New York Rangers meeting the Boston Bruins, who already have disposed of the Canadians, winners in the rival division.

This is like having two American league clubs fight it out in baseball's world's series.

CHICAGO, March 25 (AP)—In the face of the weakness of the stock market, grain values today scored upturns. Much of the buying of wheat was based on the fact that prices had shown a decline of 10c a bushel in the last week, and that predictions of a rally were current.

Official announcement of 82 per cent intended larger plantings of spring wheat other than Durum and of 19.5 per cent decrease of Durum was made after today's trading had ended.

Chicago quotations on wheat were nervous, 4c to 1c to 1 1/2c higher. Corn finished 1/2c to 3/4c up, oats varying from 1/2c decline to 1/2c advance, and provisions at 25c setback to a rise of 2c.

Ready Absorption Although the stock market weakened counted at times as a noticeable bearish influence regarding wheat, an outstanding feature was the absorption of wheat offerings were absorbed. DRASTIC BREAK ON MARKET FOR STOCK

Supply of Call Money Virtually Cut Off, Forcing Rate Up to 14 Per Cent

NEW YORK, March 25 (AP)—The stock market experienced the most dramatic break since last December today.

The supply of call money was virtually cut off, forcing the rate up to 14 per cent for the first time since July 1928.

Bankers believe the 14 per cent rate will bring in enough funds to alleviate the situation, although only moderate improvement is hoped for.

White business quotations lately have been maintained at record levels as recent developments have caused fears that the credit stringency is gradually undermining the business situation.

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NEW POTATO GRADE RULES PUT TO TEST IN CRIMINAL ACTION

Otto Steinberg and J. H. Kimball Defendants in Prosecution for Alleged Misbranding of Tubers

Idaho's new potato grade regulations, enacted into law by the recent session of the state legislature, will be subjected to their initial test in a criminal prosecution instituted in probate court here yesterday against Otto Steinberg, Twin Falls, and J. H. Kimball, Kimberly.

Steinberg and Kimball are charged in two complaints filed yesterday with having misbranded two cartons of potatoes that they shipped from Murtaugh last Thursday. The shipment was consigned to J. H. Kimball at Denver.

Shipment Branded Potatoes in this shipment, according to the complaint, were branded U. S. No. 2, but it is alleged the potatoes contained so much of bruises and cuts, rot and sunburn that the number of defectives was approximately four times the maximum of tolerance under the new regulations.

The complaints were filed by E. V. Larson, prosecuting attorney, after conference here yesterday with Leon Fink, assistant state attorney general, and W. H. Wicks, chief field inspector of the state department of agriculture.

Inspection of Potatoes L. O. Hawley, deputy state inspector, who with E. V. Gipson, deputy state inspector, inspected the potatoes in this shipment, signed the complaints.

Violation of the grade regulations under the new law, constitutes an indictable misdemeanor, so that the accused men, if held to answer following hearing in the probate court, will be tried in the district court.

ENVIRONMENT OF PULLET VITAL ASSERTS EXPERT

"You cannot make all the pullets that you hatch good layers and fine hens, but you can make all the pullets that are hatched runs, through unsanitary environment," Fren Moore, Boise, extension poultry expert of the University of Idaho, told a small audience of poultry raisers, at a meeting held here yesterday in the rooms of the Business and Professional Women's club.

He advised rotation of yards for raising young chickens, and against use of wet feeds, which he said endangered the health of chickens through possible contagion.

This year promises to be an exceedingly good one for poultry raisers, Mr. Moore said. The supply of storage eggs, normally 60,000 cases March 1, this year was shown to be 11,000 cases, and the demand was above the average.

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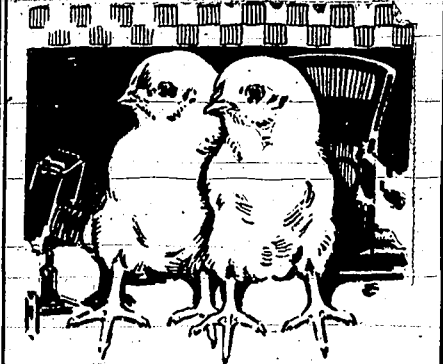
