JAPANESE INCREASE TARIFF ON AMERICAN LUMBER FOR ORIENT

Serious Consideration Being Given at Capitol to Retaliatory Duty on Raw Silk and Tea Importation

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 29—Complaints of United States lumber interests against the proposed increase by Japan in the tariff on American lumber have been formally referred to the attention of Japan by the state department.

The Japanese tariff situation is being closely studied and serious consideration is given at the capitol to suggestions for a retaliatory tariff on raw silk and tea imports from that country in the event of the new Japanese tariff act is put into effect.

Study Situation State department officials have been carefully studying the situation and feel that at the present juncture they are not warranted in going beyond expressing the hope to the Japanese government that any tariff increase which would be placed in an unfavorable position.

GOVERNOR TO MAKE LAST APPOINTMENTS

Statehouse Circles Expect Little Change in Present Family of Chief Executive

BOISE, March 29 (AP)—Fifteen major appointments and a list of lesser ones will complete the governor's official family.

Little change in the present lineup is anticipated though some discussion has hinged about the purchasing department, an office now held by R. G. Archibald. Discussion has been along the line of whether the job would be abolished and taken over by the budget officer, or whether a successor to Archibald would be appointed.

Officers already appointed include C. J. Hugo, named yesterday as state budget officer to succeed the late George W. Lewis; R. V. Thomas to succeed himself as game warden; J. D. Henley, public utility commissioner to succeed W. H. Gibson; and Mrs. J. C. H. Gravelly to succeed herself on the state board of education.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 29—Strengthening of the powers of the federal reserve board to insure its control over funds likely to get into the speculative market will be proposed at the approaching extra session of congress, Senator Glass, Democrat, Virginia, and Senator King, Democrat, Utah, are preparing bills designed to give the board any authority it may find necessary to curb loans for speculative purposes.

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MEXICAN INSURGENT GENERAL CRITICIZES MORROW'S ATTITUDE

Commander-in-Chief of Revolutionary Force Brands American Minister "Propaganda Agent" of Calles

(By The Associated Press) JUAREZ, Mexico, March 29—In a message to the diplomatic commission of the Mexican revolutionaries received here in Washington, General Jose Guadalupe Escobar, commander-in-chief of the revolutionists, tonight charged that Dwight W. Morrow, United States ambassador to Mexico, is "prejudging American interests, not only in Mexico but in all Latin countries, by converting himself into a 'propaganda agent' for the Calles regime.

Test of Message General Escobar's message, sent to Germaine Ugarte, head of the diplomatic mission, follows: "Please communicate to the state department of the United States government, and to the American people, through the press, the following declaration from me:

"Ambassador Morrow has obvious business connections with General Calles which prevent him from realizing the regularity of his duties, involving the exclusive jurisdiction of the Mexican people, thereby prejudging American interests, not only in Mexico, but in all Latin-American. The ambassador, by converting himself into a propaganda agent by sanctioning in his official capacity the false versions of imaginary federal victories and absurd defeats and flights of the revolutionary army, has directed information works of the Calles faction, which assassinate prisoners of war, bombard civilian population, confound to persecuting the people, and by using his authority to give the Calles version of the Mexican people, thereby prejudging American interests, not only in Mexico, but in all Latin-American.

"Most respectfully I would suggest that an investigation be made of mediation efforts, but I am not authorized by my government or the American people.

Delegates from the association will attend the interstate commerce commission hearing in Phoenix, May 1, when the application for rate reduction on shipments over Southern Pacific lines from New York to the Pacific coast will be considered.

Considerable interest was shown here today in the declaration of Senator Glass, a former secretary of the treasury, against the plan of Charles E. Mitchell, president of the National City bank, in making available funds from that institution for the market at the time the interest rate on call loans was boosted this week.

Senator King is drafting a bill to authorize the reserve board to "suspend" member banks' use of loans for "special trading operations in the stock market." He also would give the member banks authority to increase the rates on loans which they believe to be used for speculative purposes.

Last session when the senate asked the federal reserve board whether any legislation was needed to assist in its determination to curb the loans to brokers and dealers in stocks and bonds, the board replied that none was desired.

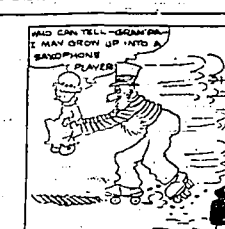

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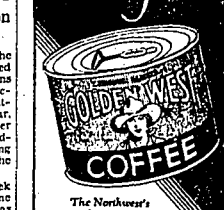

IDAHO FARMERS SEEK BIG YIELDS OF CORN

Yellow Cereal Production Fails to Meet Demand of State Livestock Growers

MOSCOW, March 29 (Special to The News)—With spring planting season at hand southern Idaho farmers are concerned with the annual problem of getting good corn yields. With Idaho a deficiency state in corn and with livestock feeding one of the state's major agricultural enterprises there is much interest in growing more corn at home. Considerable corn is shipped into the state each year, most of it coming from the corn belt.

Producers in Idaho are thinking principally of corn for livestock feeding. Most of their crops, therefore, will be produced on a consumers' basis and marketed as beef and pork. Hence Idaho will not be in competition with the corn belt until such time as the state commences to export corn, which is considerably remote.

Recommend Local Seed
Recommendations of the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station, are to use locally grown and acclimated seed if it is possible to obtain it. It has been found that corn sutable for one section of Idaho not always will prove satisfactory in another. The majority of successful corn growers in the state attribute their success chiefly to use of seed of known origin which has been grown in their locality for a number of years.

Opinion of T. W. Hulbert, agronomist with the Idaho experiment station, is that most farmers needlessly lose a week to 10 days in the spring. Early planting gives the corn more age, which is a determining factor in high yields. Another important factor is irrigation. Late irrigation should not be practiced. This keeps the corn growing when it should be maturing. When the corn is well filled there is no need for further irrigating.

Mature Corn Essential
One of southern Idaho's most successful corn growers, the late F. W. Mitchell, Nampa, recently said, "We often hear about livestock feeders preferring Middle Western corn to Idaho corn because they say the Idaho product is inferior in feeding value. I have checked a number of these complaints and in all cases have found them feeding Idaho corn which was not mature. In cases where mature Idaho corn was being fed in competition with that produced in the Middle West no difference in results was obtained." Mr. Mitchell's death deprived southern Idaho of one of its pioneer corn breeders.

The fact that Idaho now ranks first in yield per acre in corn and that some of her leading growers have consistently won awards at the national grain and hay show indicates that corn has interesting possibilities in Idaho.

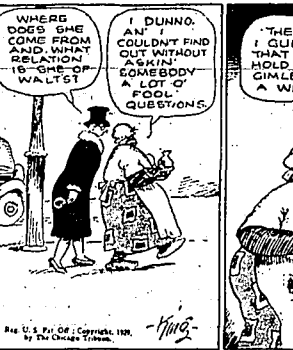

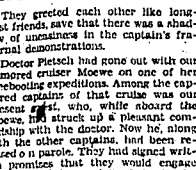

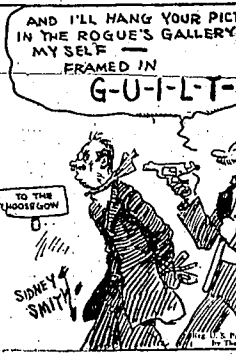
