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COUNCIL WILL COUNT RETURNS OF VOTING AT SPECIAL SESSION

Mayor Calls Members of City Commission to Make Canvass and Arrange for Next "Run-Off" Election

Under call issued yesterday by Mayor R. E. Bobber, members of Twin Falls city council will meet in special session this evening to canvass the returns of the municipal election of last Tuesday and make arrangements for a run-off election, which has been set tentatively to be held next April 23.

On the basis of unofficial returns, R. E. Bobber, mayor, and T. J. Douglas, councilman, were re-elected last Tuesday, receiving 54 and 52 majority votes, respectively, out of a total of 586 votes cast. No minority was recorded at Tuesday's election for a second member of the council, unofficial returns showed, and Mrs. H. W. Clouche and Thomas Sanderson will be candidates at the second or "run-off" election for that office.

Registration Books Open

Citizens who failed to register for the election last Tuesday, have an opportunity to register and vote in the second election, G. M. Hall, city clerk, stated last evening. Registration books are now open at the city clerk's office for that purpose.

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MOTHER'S CLAIM TO INSURANCE DEFEATED

Supreme Court Holds Delivery After Death Causes Contract to Be Invalid

On account of a provision of the contract under which Fred Laidon Haverscroft applied for a \$2000 insurance policy from the Kansas City Life Insurance company 19 days before his death on March 31, 1919, from injuries received the preceding day in an automobile accident, Idaho's supreme court yesterday held that his mother, Mrs. Lulu Haverscroft, is not entitled to receive benefit of the policy.

The supreme court opinion, which has just been handed down, terms judgment entered in the district court here in favor of the insurance company from which Mrs. Haverscroft's appeal was taken. The contract provision on which the suit turned was the requirement that the policy should be delivered to the applicant or beneficiary during the lifetime of the insured, or while he was in good health.

Policy On Road

Evidence showed that the policy had been taken to Kansas City on March 19, 1920, and was surrendered to the road-between-Kansas-City-and-Twin-Falls when Haverscroft died.

committee was hopeful that the last witness could be heard by tomorrow evening and a similar objective was set by Chairman Hanger of the House committee. With the hearings over, the committees will start to work Monday on the actual writing of the new bill. Most of the administration leaders already have committed themselves that the statement of Secretary Hyde has sufficiently cleared up most of the features of the bill and they consider it certain that it will be passed very shortly after the measure introduced last fall by Senator McNary.

No Dispute Apparent

While there appears no dispute that the measure will be introduced by a federal farm board with broad powers, commodity councils to give production and marketing advice to the producers of the various crops and stabilization concerns to handle the surplus, there is considerable preparation as to what attempts will be made in controlling the surplus situation.

In this connection, the debenture plan advocated for years by the National Grange has received a good deal of attention but some administration leaders are of the opinion that this plan of paying for surplus control is objectionable to President Hoover.

Friends of the debenture plan, however, have not relinquished their intentions to try for approval of this plan which they consider would be a substitute for the equalization fee—strongly opposed by Mr. Hoover as well as the Coolidge administration.

FOUR MEN INVOLVED IN THEFT OF WOOL FROM CORNER RANCH

Two of Accused Quartet Enter Pleas of Guilty to Grand Larceny Charge; Associates Being Held

Four men were involved in theft of two bales of wool valued at \$100 from the Walter Corner farm, eight miles east of Twin Falls, on the night of last March 26, was stated at the sheriff's office yesterday.

Two of the accused men, Winfred Carroll, 19, and Earl Gardner, 20, have pleaded guilty to charge of grand larceny in connection with the alleged theft, and two others, Guy Tibbets, 23, and Alfred E. Larry, 43, who pleaded guilty, were held to answer to a similar charge following a preliminary hearing before Judge C. A. Bailey in probate court here yesterday. Bond in the sum of \$500 was required of each of the accused men, but none had furnished bond last evening, and all were held in custody until the sheriff's office this morning.

In Motor Truck

Tibbets, Larry and Carroll, the officers stated, were in another truck carrying the stolen wool when they were intercepted by Pocatello officers on the highway between Raft River and Pocatello last evening.

Carroll, testifying as a witness for the prosecution at preliminary hearing of Tibbets and Larry yesterday, stated that he and Carroll had taken the wool from the Corner farm and cached it for three days until last Sunday night on a ranch and land near Marysville, about a mile and a half northeast of Twin Falls.

Tibbets and Larry, the witness testified, had advised sale of the stolen wool and had volunteered their services as salesmen.

Tibbets and Larry were represented at the hearing yesterday by E. L. Rayburn, the case for the state being presented by E. V. Larson, prosecuting attorney.

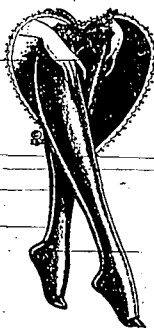

JURY GIVES EGBERT \$120 FOR DAMAGES

Twelve Acres of Land Affected and Verdict For \$10 Per Acre Ends Trial

A verdict awarding \$120 damages to David K. Egbert, Murtaugh, from the Twin Falls Canal company was returned by a jury in district court last evening at the conclusion of four days' trial. The jury reached an agreement after four hours' deliberations and returned its verdict at 7:45 P. M.

Egbert sued for \$20,000 permanent damages and \$12,000 crop damages from 1917 to 1923 for inundation of lands by a canal company reservoir. Judge W. A. Babcock, in his instructions to the jury, advised that the canal company was entitled to the land within the meander line of its original survey, and that Egbert could recover damages, if any, only for land outside the meander line that had been affected by the building of the reservoir.

The jury found that 12 acres of land claimed by Egbert were so situated and awarded him damages on the lands to the amount of \$120 per acre.

Members of the jury viewed the territory involved in the dispute before returning to the court room Thursday morning to hear attorneys' arguments and the court's instructions in the case. All members of the jury for the event have been excused and will not be required to serve further during the term.

Judge Babcock has arranged to open a district court term of two weeks in Murley next Monday, and will therefore hold a week's court term in Twin Falls in the absence of Judge Hugh A. Baker, junior district judge, who is in Boise serving as a supreme court commissioner.

JOES BASKETBALLERS WIN BY OTTO L. ROBERSON

(Associated Press Sports Writer) CHICAGO, April 4.—How a novice can win games was the basketball lesson taught to the following of the University of Chicago's National basketball tournament today by five gangling farmer boys from Joes, Colorado. Less than two years ago basketball was unknown to the boys of the little village of 45 population on the fringe of the Rocky mountains. Yet today a team from the Northeastern Colorado hamlet thrashed ancient Yankton, South Dakota, champions of six National tournaments, with the efficient manner of hardened warriors. 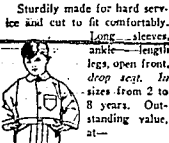

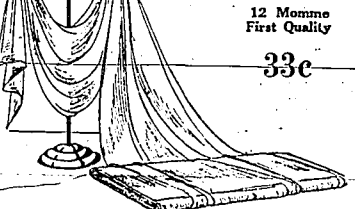

"Sky is the Limit" on Italians' Paved, Toll Super-Highways

HIGHWAY PATROLMEN ABSENT FROM ROAD IN SOUTHERN EUROPE

Machines Thunder By Like Rubber-tired Cannon Projectiles; 90 to 100 Miles Per Hour Not Uncommon

(By The Associated Press) MILAN, April 4.—Highway patrolmen, nemesis of American motorists in their own country, are absent from Italy's new super-highways or "autostrade."

Signs tell the drivers that the "sky is the limit" on speed, but the uninitiated American, who may not be up on his Italian, often takes the placard as a warning to hold down his pace. But soon learns that the fine ribbon of wide concrete highway which unfolds, beginning at the top of the hill, is a speed limit.

Big Italian, German or French cars thunder past him like rubber-tired cannon balls. Ninety or 100 miles an hour is not an uncommon speed for the bigger cars capable of holding that pace.

Modern Cousins. The "autostrade" are the modern cousin of the famous route of the Roman empire. But these new triumphs of highway engineering are even more remarkable than those Romans built before the Christian era.

They are straight, flat, unintersected roads, reserved exclusively for passenger automobile traffic. More than 200 miles of these super-highways have already been opened and a half dozen branches from the main arteries are under construction or projected.

The new highways are not characteristic of general road conditions in Italy; they are the exception. Italy's regular system of roads is rapidly improving under government control and supervision, but the super-highways are toll roads built by private enterprise under governmental authorization.

Goets to Government. In 50 years the toll highways will become the property of the government without expense to it. In the meantime the private company organized to build and operate the super-highways will keep them in repair. A toll of 20 cent is charged for use of a stretch 100 miles long.

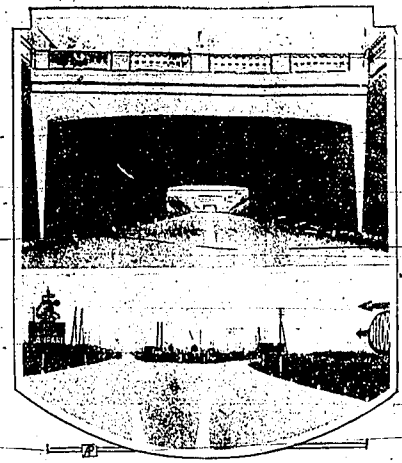
The highway from Milan to Lake Como, the first one opened, has proved itself sufficiently successful to encourage the building of other routes.

On the super-highways crossroads are separated by bridges and viaducts. Strong fences along the right-of-way keep out pedestrian intruders. There are no angular turns. The roads vary from 24 to 40 feet in width. A telephone service at frequent points make it possible for the unfortunate motorist to call for service.

Western Universities Offer Aviation Course

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 4.—Two Western universities, Utah and Southern California, have inaugurated extension courses in commercial phases of aviation.

The courses include lessons on the effect of transportation on civilization, history of aviation, commercial application, types of planes and motors, theory of flight, training of personnel, operations, airports, airports, mail, passenger and express, services, aviation insurance, meteorology, air law, operating costs and rates.

Virginia Geology Students To Visit In Idaho on Trip

BLACKSBURG, Va., April 4.—Geology students of Virginia Technology university will acquire college credit this summer in a tour through 10 states, with short excursions into Canada and Mexico.

Girls as well as boys will be eligible. Dr. R. J. Holden, professor of geology and director of the course, has announced that specially prepared automobiles will be delivered in time to begin the tour June 22. The students will camp at night.

Four term-hour credits will be allowed those who make a satisfactory grade on daily tests. Additional credits will be given advanced students who present geological papers at the conclusion of the trip. Necessary field equipment for study of geological formations will be provided and lectures will be given daily by well-known geologists.

The entire cost is estimated at \$450.

Air Camera Men Trace Missouri River in Film
JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 4.—The muddy face of the Missouri river has been photographed by aerial cameras working 14,000 feet above their subject.

The river was traced in film to provide the war department an accurate map of the river and its banks for use in flood control and navigation projects.

Two Chicago cameramen, J. B. Hornberg and Hugh J. O'Boyle, both former army aviators, spent many days sighting the cameras through an aperture in the bottom of an airplane as they crisscrossed the river between the town point and the mouth at St. Louis.

It was necessary to erect and reerect the stream to obtain accurate prints. If they had followed the twists and turns of the river, the banking of the plane would have distorted the exposures.

AIR SCHOOL FOR AKRON
AKRON, O.—Courses in aeronautics and aviation are being planned here under a cooperative agreement between the University of Akron, Air Services, Inc., and the Goodyear-Aircraft Corporation.

Names of 41 Service Men of Twin Falls County Go on Plaque

(Special to The News) MOSCOW, April 4.—Forty-one names of service men from Twin Falls county who lost their lives during the World War appear on the certified list of Idaho's World War dead recently turned over to the Idaho Memorial Association by Colonel L. V. Patch, Payette, commander, and Lester V. Albert, adjutant of the Idaho department of the American Legion. This list of Idaho war dead will be engraved on a large bronze plaque and installed in the hall of Members of the new memorial building, gymnasium recently completed on the campus of the University of Idaho.

At the request of the Idaho Memorial Association, of which R. D. Levinger, Lewis, is president, the American Legion assumed the responsibility for obtaining an accurate list of Idaho's World War dead. General publication of this list is to eliminate any possible error. Anyone ascertaining an error will contribute to the memorial fund by communicating with Colonel Patch, Legion commander, so that it may be corrected before it is placed on the plaque.

Dedication in June. Formal dedication of the Memorial will take place in June as part of the regular university commencement exercises. UNIVERSITY TO GIVE SEED TEST RESULTS

Information On Certified Potatoes Will Be Available By Planting Time

MOSCOW, April 4 (Special to The News)—Information on the comparative certified seed potato tests conducted each year by the University of Idaho college of agriculture will be available to growers this year before planting time in the sections of the state which grow the bulk of the certified seed potatoes. Virtually to obtain a greenhouse test without a greenhouse of sufficient size to accommodate such a project the university transferred its comparative seed potato tests from the Aberdeen experiment station to the Lewiston district, which, slightly over 700 feet above sea level, has the record of being the earliest section of the state.

Two hundred forty-five samples of seed from about 200 growers who plan to produce certified seed this fall were planted on 1.5 acres of land on the S. D. White farm, about two miles up the Clearwater river from Lewiston on the north and South highway, the last of which originally it was planned to have the seed samples in the ground shortly after the middle of February. But spring was delayed and over here and the Lewiston district was about a month behind.

In spite of this delay C. W. Hunterford, head of the plant pathology department of the university expects the seed potato plots will be sufficiently developed by the middle of May to make comparisons on the comparative vitality of the seed samples. With the prospect now that the bulk of the certified seed potato growers in the Aberdeen, Snake river valley and in northern Idaho, which grow most of the certified seed, will be planted about the first of May, the seed samples made available in the middle of May will be in ample time for this season.

The number of seed samples planted at Lewiston this year represent a decrease from the number planned in comparative tests at Aberdeen in former years. This, however, is in line with the general retrenchment in the potato industry. In their spring intentions to plant reports Idaho farmers indicated a considerable reduction in potato acreage.

With the test plot convenient to the north and south highway a large number of growers are expected to visit it during the growing season. When the comparative tests were conducted at the Aberdeen station hardly a day passed during the growing season without some seed potato growers visiting the station to examine the plants growing from their seed and making comparisons with plants from the seed of other growers.

The Farm Week In Washington

By FRANK I. WHEELER (Associated Press Farm Editor) WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—Explains with the seventieth congress but held for several in the next regular session, the troublesome "Pullman surcharge" bill has caused a perceptible change of opinion among farm interests.

It seeks to remove the surcharge railroads obtain for their Pullman service, a revenue to the roads of about \$40,000,000 a year. The American Farm Bureau federation takes the position that it denies this income from the traveling public the railroads would make it up in additional freight charges. The National Orange, however, does not subscribe to the same view and did not join the federation in its stand against the bill.

Agriculture was brought into the picture in 1928 when the railroads indicated they would not be able to grant reduced freight rates on commodities the farmer bought or sold if the revenue from Pullman surcharges were cut off. "Farmers all over the country," the Orange says, "flooded their congressional delegates and the Washington representatives of their own organizations with telegrams and letters asking that everything possible be done to stop the bill. The same thing occurred when the bill reappeared in the seventieth congress, and due to farm opposition it much as any other measure passed on the senate calendar.

Inasmuch as the bill has been held in almost every congress since the world war, farmers believe there should be a dash in freight rates forthwith. They are eager for an expression from the interstate commerce commission, which is making a study of freight charges under the Hoch-Smith resolution. At the same time the commission is making that investigation with a view to reducing rates, it is studying the railroad's request for a 15 per cent increase on various commodity groups.

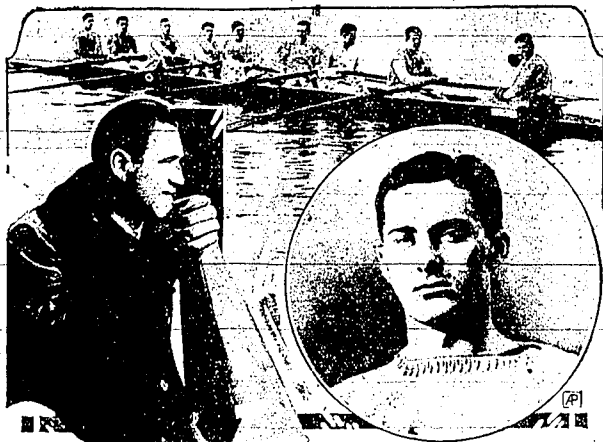
MURTAUGH MEN WOULD ADD 40,000 ACRES TO PROJECT

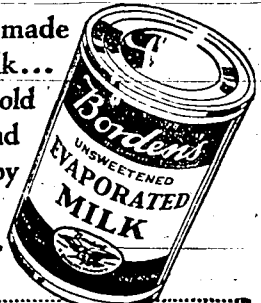

A USEFUL INSTITUTION. Once they were called cow testing associations. Now they are dairy herd improvement associations.

A glance at the annual report lately issued by the Pioneer Dairy Herd Improvement Association makes it plain that the new name is altogether fitting and proper.

The Pioneer association is composed of dairymen on both North and South Sides of the Twin Falls country—a region which enjoys many natural advantages for dairying.

Pioneer association cows under test last year, the report shows, produced an average of "three hundred, twenty-five and seven-tenths pounds of butterfat."

This is forty-five pounds more than the annual production of the average dairy cow in the United States, and thirty-two pounds more than the average for dairy improvement associations in forty-three states two years ago.

Records of the Pioneer association show that one "high" cow last year produced as much as thirty-four "low" cows.

Information of this kind may be expected to have a definite effect, and it has. Among outstanding facts brought forth by the Pioneer association last year are these: that out of the thirty-four farmers in the association...

With records such as these, dairy herd improvement associations must be accorded a place of outstanding importance in development of the dairy industry and the territory in which it operates.

In view of the hand some dividends they pay to the community, these associations are worthy of encouragement and support generally.

Incidentally, the dairy herd improvement association is one organization that is not dependent upon the public treasury for its maintenance, but is supported entirely by its membership.

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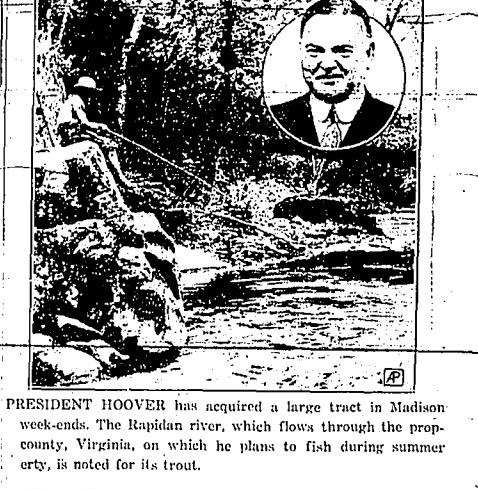
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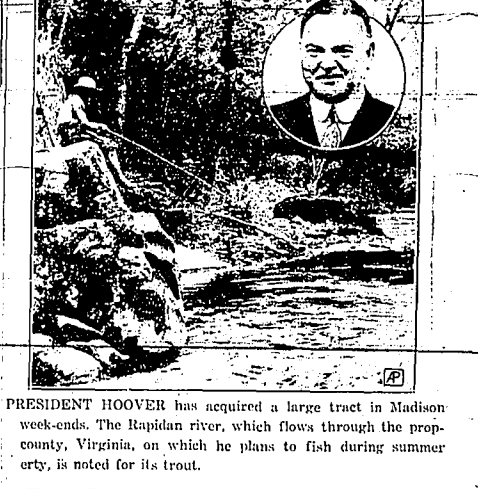
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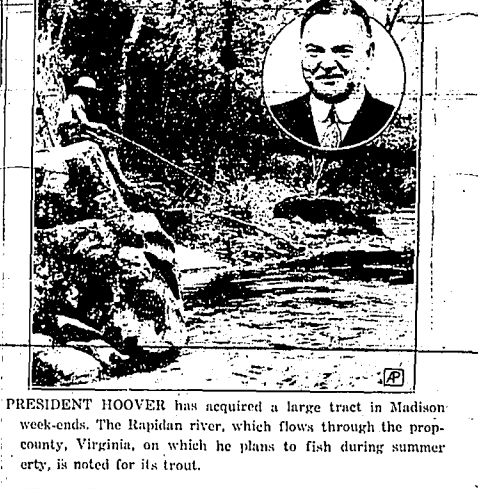
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HIGHWAY EDUCATION BOARD HOLDS ANNUAL ESSAYISTS' CONTEST

Principal Award in Form of Trip to Washington With All Expenses Paid For Pupil and Instructor

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Offering as principal award a trip to Washington with all expenses paid to the winning pupil and the successful teacher who submit the best papers in their respective competitions, the highway education board today announced the eighth annual safety essay and lesson contests open to elementary school pupils and elementary school teachers of the nation.

The successful pupil also will receive a gold medal, a check for \$15 and a gold watch, while the teacher, upon her arrival at Washington, will be presented with a check for \$200. Contestants from every state in the union and from Alaska, the Philippines, Hawaii, Porto Rico, and the Canal Zone are expected to enter for the prizes, aggregating \$5500, offered for the best essays and the best lesson written in this annual contest. The contests in each state are conducted with the aid and cooperation of the state departments of education and other educational authorities. The prizes are given by the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce.

442 Medals. In the pupils' contest, 442 medals and a like number of cash prizes are offered as state awards. To the first national winner is given a visit to the Nation's Capital and a valuable gold watch, while pupils whose papers rank second and third in the national winner also receive gold watches, appropriately engraved, of slightly less intrinsic value than that given the winner. National winners are chosen by a process of elimination from those whose essays have ranked first in their respective states.

Awards to teachers, according to the rules, are less numerous but more substantial. For the best lesson, the Board offers the visit to Washington, of four or five days duration, and a check for \$200. Second and third national awards in the lesson contest are \$100 and \$500 respectively, making \$1000 in cash awards to teachers.

These contests, perhaps both the oldest and the largest consecutive educational competitions in the United States, annually attract the interest of from 500,000 to 750,000 elementary school pupils, and approximately 100,000 teachers who write lessons, teach them in their classrooms, and enter them in the contests.

Definite subjects are assigned in each instance, and the rules, while clear and simple, allow little leeway for varied interpretation in the classroom.

The subject of the essays by pupils is "My Duty as a Junior Citizen to Observe Traffic Rules." Essays by teachers are not to exceed 500 words in length and the participants are limited to pupils of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades who are not more than 14 years of age. In the selection of ten best essays, preference is given to those of comparable ability.

All elementary school teachers in the eighth and lower grades are eligible to take part in the lesson contest. The lessons are to be not more than 3000 nor less than 1000 words in length, and are to be written on the subject, "Training Future Citizens in Street and Highway Safety," a corollary to the pupils' subject.

No state prizes are offered to teachers, only the three national awards being given. Pupils may compete for a large number of state prizes, the first prize in each state being a check for \$15 and a gold medal. The second state award is a check for \$10 and a silver medal, while third prizes, consisting of checks for \$5 and bronze medals, vary with the several states according to the population of the elementary school enrollment. Alabama, the first on the list, is entitled to one first prize, one second prize and seven third prizes. Michigan, for instance, may compete for 13 third prizes in addition to the first and second awards, while other states, Wisconsin, Vermont, Nevada and Rhode Island are entitled to only one-third award in addition to the first and second prizes. New York state may seek 25 third awards, the largest offered to pupils of any commonwealth, while Pennsylvania is next with 23 third prizes. Illinois has 18, Texas 17, Indiana and California 11, and others in proportion.

All essays and all lessons must be in the hands of teachers and principals not later than May 10, the closing date for the contest. The papers themselves will be graded and the awards made as promptly as possible.

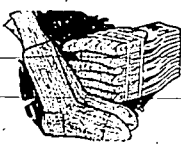
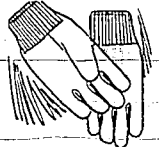
