

Big League Baseball Caravans Trekking North and East

Competition to Be Close in Fight for American Pennant

No Major Development Sufficient to Shake Belief of Majority of Experts That Champs Will Repeat

By ALAN J. GOULD (Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, April 8.—The big league baseball caravans trekking northward and eastward while the nation derby plods to the wide open spaces, cannot be subjected to closer scrutiny.

The grand openings are only a week off now. Most of the lineups for the gateway are fixed with twirling arms are being groomed by major executives or other officials who will figure in the starting ceremonies.

The spring training scramble will be summarized in its general effect on pennant prospects about as follows:

The American league race appears likely to be closer, with more real contenders for the Yankees 16 race, even though no major developments have shaken the belief of the big majority of experts that the world's champions will repeat.

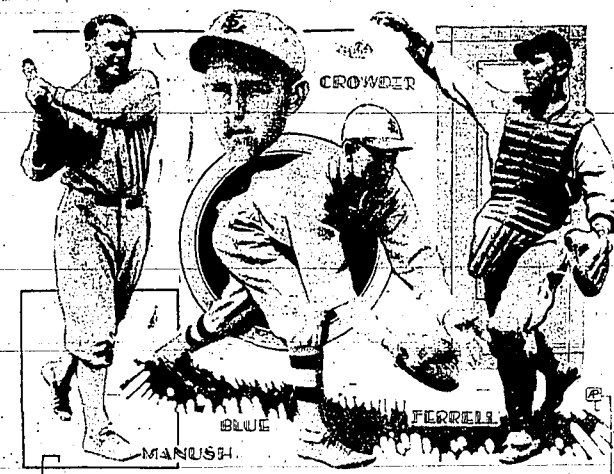
Lon Lott, the expensive Pacific coast recruit, failed to make the infield grade and Babe Ruth hasn't yet struck his level, but his hitting record suggests the Yankees appear as formidable as ever.

Athletes Have Trouble The Athletics have had trouble rounding into condition, with an uncertain infield lineup and ailments among the pitchers, including Rube Bressler.

The National league race looks even closer, but developments have emphasized in bold relief the unusual strength of both the Chicago Cubs and New York Giants, with critics about evenly divided as to which has the better chance to win the pennant.

One of the most interesting of the opening legs of National league strength will find the Pirates invading the Cub stronghold. This will bring together two of the hardest-hitting brigades in baseball.

United States' Defenders To Compete in Germany, Great Britain and France

By TED VOSBURGH (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, April 8.—From a mere private junket against England's picked "pros" and a passing tilt at the British open championship, the forthcoming exhibition of the American Ryder-cup team expanded itself today into a concerted campaign for the principal golfing laurels of three European countries.

Not only the British open but the German open and French professional tournaments as well are to be important objectives of the team of 10 stars sailing Wednesday night and going into action April 26 and 27 at Leeds in defense of the Ryder cup.

After that in rapid succession will follow the British open at Mullfield, May 6 to 11, the Yorkshire Evening News 1000-guinea tournament at Leeds between May 13 and 18, the French "pro" tournament near Paris, May 19 to 24, the German open of 72 holes, May 23 and 26, and finally a match with a French team, probably at Biarritz, May 28 and 29.

EXPERT SEEKS ASSISTANCE OF SMALL GARDEN OWNERS

With a view of propagating seed of beets which have shown marked resistance to the white fly, Eubanks Carner, plant pathologist of the United States department of agriculture, who was here last fall making a collection of the resistant beets, has returned from California and is asking owners of private gardens which may be selected for the purpose to permit him and Dr. Walter Carter of the bureau of entomology, with whom he is cooperating, to plant from one to five beets in their lots.

The resistance of the selected beets to the white fly last year was noticeable, Mr. Carner said, and if the legions average planted and been equally resistant, there would have been some crop raised. The beets were collected during a period of two weeks by a force of 25 men under the direction of Mr. Carner and Dr. Carter.

The selected beets have been kept in a safe over winter and are ready for planting. It is necessary to plant them some distance from other beets to prevent crossing. Mr. Carner will be here several days in connection with the replanting, before returning to California.

Farmers Will Plant Big Acreage of Oats

The acreage planted in oats on the Twin Falls segregation will be larger this year than for several years in the opinion of E. J. Malone, Marus farmer. Mr. Malone says that the increased acreage is due to the greater interest in dairy cows and the increase in the number of dairy stock. Some farmers who have thin fields of old alfalfa will plant oats and let it grow up with alfalfa and then harvest it before it ripens. Others plan to plant it with corn or wheat.

Farmers are now planting wheat, barley and oats, in spite of the late spring, he said.

West End Man Guilty of Charge of Misdemeanor

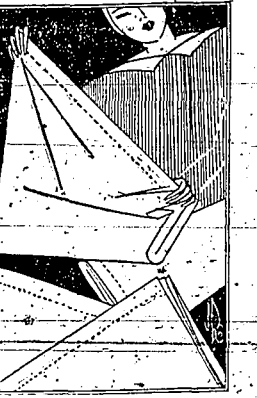

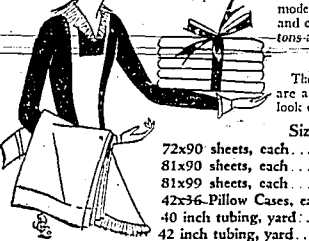

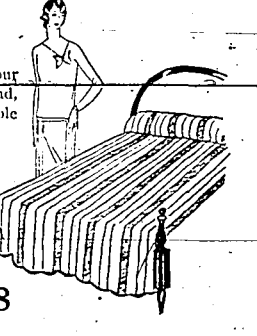

Labor Federation Interprets Workingman's Tariff Needs

PRESIDENT LISTENS TO RECOMMENDATION OF REPRESENTATIVES

Former Governor of Maine Would Delegate Task of Keeping Unemployment Record to Individual State

By The Associated Press
WASHINGTON, April 8.—The tariff needs of the working man as interpreted by the American Federation of Labor were laid before President Hoover today in the form of a specific program sponsored by that organization.

Led by Matthew Wolf, vice president of the federation, a delegation called upon the chief executive, recommending the sending of a representative of organized labor on the tariff commission, changes in the laws to give labor a hearing in valuation cases and consideration of the cost of foreign labor in the determination of duties on imports.

Earlier in the day, former Governor Ralph O. Brewster, Maine, called at the White House to discuss unemployment. He urged that the task of keeping unemployment statistics be delegated to the individual states.

Hoover Deeply Interested
Mr. Wolf said the delegation had been received with sympathy and understanding, Mr. Hoover, he declared, seemed deeply interested.

The group urged adoption of the American valuation plan in determining duty to be levied against foreign-made commodities telling the president it met the requirements of labor much more equitably than the methods now used. At present, duties are fixed upon a basis of cost of material abroad, Wolf said, and do not take into consideration the low wage scale of the foreign laborer.

Enactment of legislation prohibiting importation of labor, such as foreign child labor also was advocated by the group as an extension of the principle barring products of foreign prison labor.

The delegation also urged changes in the trade mark registration laws to protect a manufacturer from recording his mark in America, producing his commodities cheaply abroad and claiming the protection of American laws. Changes were asked, too, in the administrative provisions of the tariff law under which child labor could have a representative on the tariff commission and representation in discussions of valuation cases.

Over the past few days, Mr. Hoover has attended a conference of governors at New Orleans which approved a plan for amending extended government action at times of serious unemployment. Mr. Hoover said the principal problem just now is in keeping an accurate and up to the minute check on the extent of unemployment.

The individual states working in co-operation, he said, were better fitted to gather such statistics than a centralized government agency. Present American methods, he said, are 10 years behind those of other nations.

British Slow Up Railway Service As America Gains

LONDON, April 8 (AP)—Taking speed and frequency together, British train service leads the world, says Sir Ralph Wedgwood, British railway magnate. American train service is, however, challenging British supremacy. Sir Ralph admits, and the next few years may see the leadership pass to the United States. France and Germany are in the rear on these factors of transportation.

In short runs—less than 100 miles—American trains already show a slight superiority over British trains, Sir Ralph told a meeting of officials and employees of the London and Northwestern railways, of which he is chief general manager.

In 1900, according to Sir Ralph's research, 20 select English train services, ranging from 30 to 450 miles, showed an average speed of 42.5 miles an hour. Twenty similar American services in that year were operated at an average of 40 miles an hour. But by 1928 the British trains' average rate of travel was down to 41.9 miles an hour, while the select American trains had increased their average to 41.3 miles an hour.

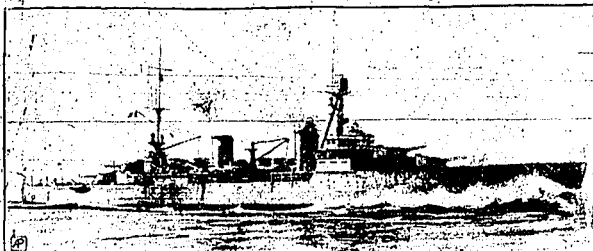
In the same year twenty select French services averaged 40.8 miles an hour while 25 corresponding number of German trains had an hourly average speed of only 36.6 miles.

The failure to increase British train speed in 28 years was explained by Sir Ralph as being due to the tremendous increase in the weight of trains. This factor had overcome the increase in locomotive power. Moreover, the effect of the war was to slow train service.

Since 1900 the frequency of American trains has been about double. In the same period the number of English trains has increased by about 50 per cent.

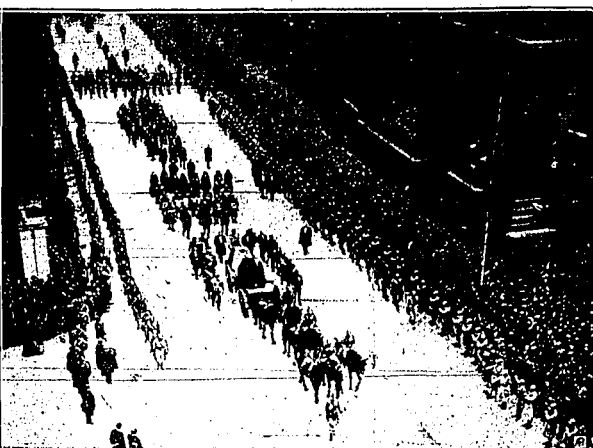

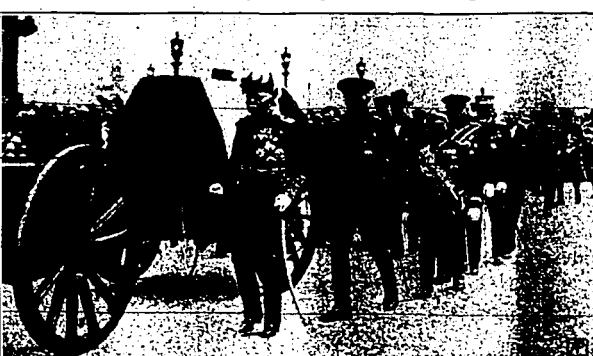

Great and Near Great Pose For Pictures—Pay Price Set By Fame and Power

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The photographic studios of Washington are the meeting grounds of notables from all over the world.

One seldom steps into the softly lighted, luxurious looking "camera castles" without seeing some of the great or near great. Having one's picture taken is looked upon as part of the routine business of social life in Washington.

Men and women occupying high official positions here recognize contact and acquaintance with the country at large as a positive duty. So the way of the photographer is easy. The President and the first lady set the standard by submitting to a battery of camera men several times a day. They must pose for news pictures, movies, portraits and oil paintings. No matter what their personal feelings may be, it is the price they pay for fame and power.

This attitude is reflected down the line from cabinet members and ambassadors to attaches and secretaries.

The big studios have alert, well groomed "hostesses" to receive the patrons who roll up in big limousines, some with spats and canes and high seats, others in evening gowns.

President Coolidge often used to go to a big studio whose pictures are known the country over. He preferred facing the camera in his native habitat to having a photographer fussing around the White House. Mrs. Coolidge, too, without any appointment of her own, often used to drop into the studio just to look at the photographs of others.

When the wife of a new official comes to town she is immediately requested to have her portrait made by perhaps a dozen studios. If the new owner is well versed in customs of the capital she shows no surprise, but makes appointments with several of them. Each studio makes a number of poses of which the patron selects two or three. The big studios never give out a photograph for reproduction without the consent of the sitter and her approval of all particular picture released.

"Most women," says the "hostess" of one studio, "prefer to be photographed in evening gowns, although of late many of them are leaning more toward the informal pictures in street attire.

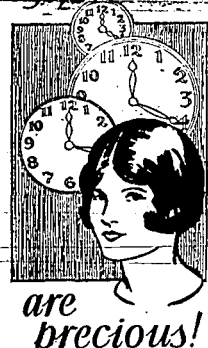

BANK MERGERS REDUCING LIABILITY OF FAILURE

NEW YORK, April 8 (AP)—The number of banks in the United States decreased from 19,202 to 18,522 during the last seven years. At the same time their resources grew from \$41,551,000,000 to \$43,956,000,000.

Based on these figures the average resources for each bank increased by approximately \$1,000,000. Despite the fact that "chain banking" has only recently appeared as a subject of economic discussion, the merger process has been eliminating competition among banks with increasing swiftness.

There were 12 major consolidations in the New York area last year involving 27 banks. Rumors of bigger and bigger mergers are a daily dish in Wall street, and if only half of the rumors prove founded in fact, the year 1929 will be memorable.

Bankers' ties at advantage in consolidation aside from mere strength and size in the decreasing number of failures. It is estimated that bank failures for 1928 will not exceed 500, when the figures are known. This compares with 628 in 1928 and 622 in 1927. Deposits of \$9,000,000,000 are concentrated in that spot on the map designating the New York area. Bank news of 1928 seems likely to include more than one addition to the striking list of "billion-dollar" financial empires.

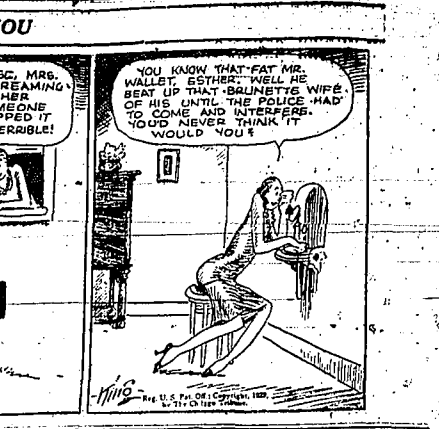
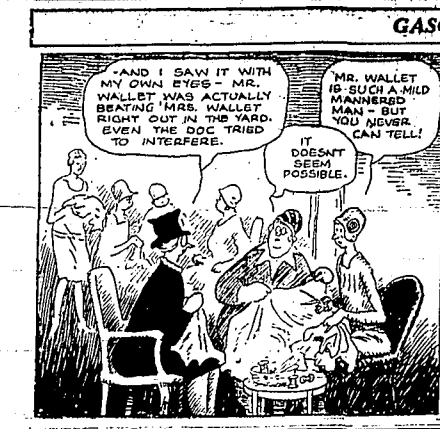

POTATO BUREAU PRESIDENT PREDICTS SMALLER CROP

BURLEY, April 8 (Special to The News)—That Idaho's potato crop this season will not be much smaller than the 1928 crop, is the belief of Fred Grundness, Burley, president of the Idaho Potato Bureau. He also says that no satisfactory plan has yet been worked out to curtail production of dry crop "to a point where there will not be years of disastrous overproduction."

He cites the efforts of southern tobacco growers to limit acreage. "At the time of their most drastic effort to organize, he states, and when the growers were needed to limit production of the weed, they raised the biggest crop in all their history."

He says that a bumper crop Grundness says, for growers to get in and increase their plantings when they think their neighbors are making a general cut. Potato farmers, this year, seem to be acting as though they all thought that the "other fellow" was sick of low prices and intended to lay off. And many of them, including those accustomed to growing big acreages, are intending to increase their plantings, he says. He calls attention to the advice being given by spud growers for the other fellow to plant less. "It would be a good thing," he says, if some advice were given, such advice would follow it through.

Unless Idaho potatoes are kept in the luxury class by limited production, prices this fall will be low. And in order to make Idaho spuds luxuries, last year's production must be cut 25 per cent, says Grundness. He feels that no such cut will be attained. Production will not be curbed as it should be until a cycle of low prices, caused by overproduction, discourages potato growers to a point when the plantings will be materially curtailed, is his warning.
