Major Leagues' Teams Ready for Opening of 1929 Season

Feeling Prevalent That Anything May Happen During Year

World Champion Yankees Start Quest For Fourth Straight Circuit Flag Carrying "Wise Money"

By BRIAN DELL (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, April 13.—With a feeling that anything can happen, the two major leagues will start the baseball season Tuesday. Not in years have the 16 teams been sent away on their stretch of nearly six months with such a prevailing feeling of uncertainty.

Although the world champion New York Yankees start their quest for their fourth straight American league championship carrying the "wise money" and majority votes of the experts, three or four clubs may be able to prove that money lies the head that wears a crown.

In the senior circuit, the New York Giants and Chicago Cubs have been installed early favorites, the Giants leading by a narrow margin in the expert vote, but this calculation may have to be revised when the regulars are next autumn with the St. Louis Cardinals and Pittsburgh Pirates carrying added threats. The Cards and Pirates have divided the last four championships between them and cannot be counted out in advance.

Higgins May Find Fees Miller Higgins, looking down from the plumage of a world championship, may find the Athletics, Browns, Senators or Tigers adopting his first piece, Bucky Harris, a leader of the national type, has plenty of material to inspire at Detroit, and his old teammate, Walter Johnson, according to the Washington manager, has his Senators hustling for the love of Banneker, the affectionate name of the former pitching ace. Washington seems the favorite "long shot."

The Athletics, runner-up in the American league race in 1928, and practically unchanged from the closing front, have had a rough passage through the spring training, but Mack's team is still handicapped by sickness and injuries.

The opening will carry the same flare of triumph, President Herbert Hoover is being counted on to pitch the first ball at Washington, and a dozen mayors will be given a chance to show just how good are their arms.

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House Committee Turns Thumbs Down on Two Relief Proposals

Debenture Export Plan and Twice Vetoed Equalization Fee Failures

Chairman Haugen Expects to Introduce Bill as Soon as House Convenes in Order to Get Precedence Over Tariff Legislation to Come Before Extraordinary Congressional Gathering

WASHINGTON, April 13.—With congress ready to convene in extraordinary session for the primary purpose of carrying out campaign promises for farm relief, the house agriculture committee late today turned its thumbs down on two farm aid proposals long advocated at the capitol—the debenture export plan and the twice vetoed equalization fee principle.

The committee voted 17 to 4 against incorporation in the new farm measure of the debenture plan supported by the National Grange and then a few minutes later expressed its disapproval of an attempt to revive the equalization fee so objectionable to Calvin Coolidge. The vote against the fee was 17 to 3. This action was regarded on the house side as clearing the situation and it was the opinion of members of the committee that the decision of the committee would be sustained if an attempt were made later to revive these proposals in the house. At the senate side of the capitol little sentiment has been manifest for reviving the controversy over the fee principle but tonight some doubt exists as to what position might be taken on the debenture plan which has found favor there in the eyes of many.

Complex Work
The battling by the house committee virtually completed work on the new farm measure. It is the plan of Chairman Haugen of the committee, to introduce the bill as soon as the house convenes. It is expected to take precedence over tariff legislation.

The agriculture committee is expected to report it out in time for work to be started in the house on Wednesday. Tuesday will be occupied with the reception of President Hoover's message.

In the senate the agriculture measure will not be introduced until Wednesday. After this has been done the senate plans to adjourn until the next day.

Although the text of the farm bill has not yet been made public, it follows the program outlined in the republican platform and by Mr. Hoover during the presidential campaign.

Calls for Farm Board
This program called for a federal farm board that would have at its disposal a revolving fund to use in making loans to cooperative marketing agencies and stabilization corporations that would be set up if requested by the producers. These corporations would seek to eliminate violent price depressions by taking surplus products off the market and feeding them back gradually as the needs of the market might demand.

Senate leaders believe that the debenture plan might be approved in the senate because it is related to the tariff. Some senate members have suggested that those seeking tariff revision upward for industry might be loath to vote against the debenture plan for fear of a threat from the farming section to retaliate.

NEW UNITED STATES PAPER MONEY HONORS EXECUTIVES

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln, Hamilton, Jackson, Grant, Franklin, McKinley, Cleveland, Madison, and Chase will be honored by having their pictures on the new series of paper currency.

In that order their faces will appear on bills for \$1, \$2, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1000, and \$10,000. The treasury department's computation of outstanding currency in the United States at the latest available date, July, 1927, shows a total of \$5,392,820,000 in gold and silver and \$5,715,031,422 in paper.

This means that every person in the country could have \$48.67 in his pocket, an increase of \$8 in the last 10 years.

RICHMOND, Ind., April 13 (AP)—A judge here barred Mrs. Dora McClain, a divorcee, from marrying in 50 years. Notice of the divorce petition had been given by her husband, Fred McClain, by publication instead of by service, which, under the Indiana law, makes it mandatory for the circuit court judge to prohibit marriage for two years.

"I will have the make an order forbidding you to marry within two years," Judge G. H. Hoelscher explained to Mrs. McClain.

"It's all right with me if you make it 50 years," she answered.

"All right, I will," the court replied.

WESTERNERS POPULAR SAYS MOVIE MANAGER

MISS MONICA T. LAMERE, 18, Successful Business Woman, Comments On Films

LUDLOW, Vt., April 13 (AP)—At the age of 18, Miss Monica T. Lamere is the successful manager of two theatres in Ludlow, the town where President Coolidge attended school.

Despite her youth, Miss Lamere is far from being a novice. Since she can remember, her father was arbiter of Ludlow's stage and screen programs, so she was brought up in an atmosphere of film and lithograph. She has seen every motion picture shown in town since she was five—about 4000 in all.

When her father became ill a year or more ago, she had absorbed so many details of administration that she shouldered the theatre enterprises, which were only a part of his business interests.

"She proved so clearly that the best seats in all the years of my theatre ownership were the weeks of my absence," Mr. Lamere explains, "that I have given her a free hand."

Miss Lamere finds the small town movie fan more arbitrary in his tastes than the city dweller. News reels and educational reels were abandoned because so many patrons walked out.

Mounted police and western pictures, animal stories and clean comedy are best sellers. Some favorites named when family troubles began. Bachelor stars, therefore, and a certain unmarried woman star therefore have held an especial popularity.

"The country movie fan would rather see any of the dog pictures than the highest paid human stars," Miss Lamere says. She excepts one comedian, only.

Children are never a source of disturbance she adds, because they are kept interested in the program. "The picture that thrills the children most invariably will thrill the grownups too, for in the country at least, the elders are still kids at heart."

'Tuber-Unit' Pioneer Builds Big Industry From Only Three Potatoes

MAPLETON, Maine, April 13 (AP)—From three potatoes to 254 carloads of seed in nine years is the story, in brief, of the tuber unit plot worked by H. H. Higgins, Mapleton farmer.

In 1919 Higgins became interested, through his county agricultural agent, in the tuber unit method of planting potatoes in a seed plot. He selected three excellently shaped Rose Spaulding cut them into seed pieces and planted them separately. Careful roguing—the practice of pulling up all defective plants—resulted in a yield of 40 pounds of potatoes that fall.

In the spring of 1920 each unit was planted by itself, rogued, dug by hand, and six barrels of the yield were selected for seed. The next year the six barrels of seed yielded 106 barrels of selected certified seed, of which 12 barrels were sold.

During the fall of 1922 two cars of this stock were shipped to the Hastings, Florida, district. So far as known, these were the first certified Spauldings shipped from Mapleton and the first to go to the Hastings area. It was but the beginning of a large industry. The business has grown in the hands of the Mapleton farmers to such an extent

Moroccan Tribes Vex French Arms In North Africa

COLOMB-BECHIAI, Morocco, April 13 (AP)—Rebellious tribesmen, by guerrilla warfare, still terrify the vast regions south of here despite wear of military occupation by the French.

A dozen raiders often defy whole companies of troops, picking off a few men then fleeing to their hidden hill or desert homes. The soldiers, central schavater territory they visit but they merely make islands of peace in a sea of unrest.

Higgins says his tuber unit work for the last two years has consisted of taking about 150 selected potatoes each year, cutting one "eye" from each tuber and shipping them to Florida, where they are planted in January. By April it is apparent whether the plants grown from the eyes are disease-free. If they are not, the potatoes from which the eyes were used are taken as a basis for Higgins' tuber unit plot in Maine.

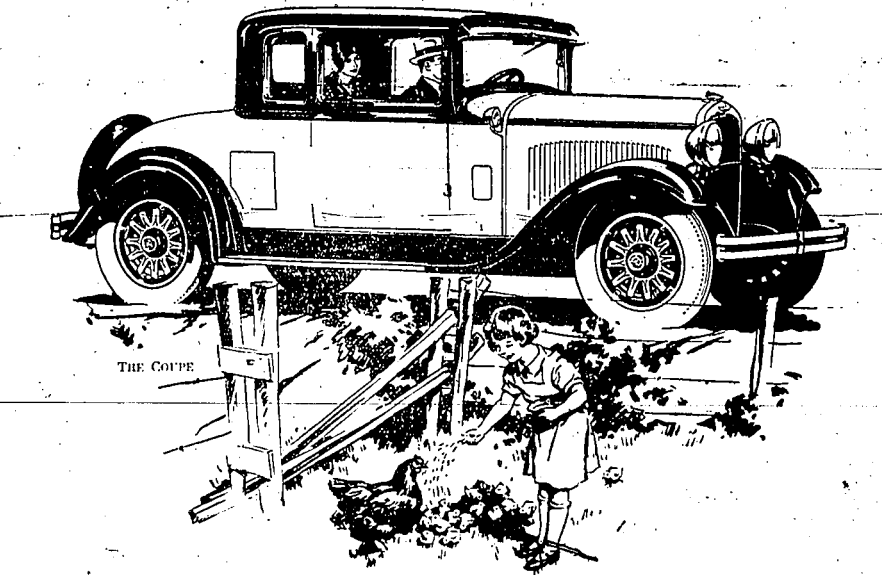
PARISIANS DODGE DOG TAX

WOMEN OF ENGLAND OUT TO GET SEATS IN HOUSE OF LORDS

Peerages for Deserving Untitled Members of Fairer Sex One of Planks Suggested for 1929 Platform

LONDON, April 12.—Peerages for deserving untitled women is one of the planks suggested for British women's platforms, as the time for the general election approaches. The proposition is designed to aid the removal of barriers which keep the sex from seats in the House of Lords.
Regardless of party, women are united on several broad equalization issues, and politicians are quickly waking up to the fact that their parties' attitudes on these questions will more readily sway women's votes than more conventional arguments.

Warning Renewed
Warning of this fact has only recently been renewed by the widespread protest from women's organizations against what they claim is discrimination against women in awarding the higher honors on the New Year's list. Although there is an unprecedented number—several hundred—of distinguished service, none was given a peerage or one of the other high honors.

As one form of protest, the Women's Freedom League, of which this indefatigable veteran feminist, Mrs. P. H. Lee, is president, has passed the following resolution, which has received considerable publicity in the British press:

"While this committee is gratified to see that there are more women's names in the recent honor list, it notes that no peerages have been conferred on women, and urges that all honors, the higher as well as the lower, shall be conferred on women equally with men of distinguished service."

Points to Discrimination
Specific instances of so-called discrimination were pointed out by Miss Florence Underwood, secretary of the league.
"We are delighted to see two women made companions of honor," she said, "but we cannot understand why the ex-mayor of Newcastle should be given a distinguished honor, while the ex-mayor of Liverpool, Miss Margaret Bevan, is ignored."
"An honor was given A. V. Roe—and deservedly so—for services in aviation. Have not Lady Bantley and Lady Heath also deserved honors?"

"There are many examples of peerages for distinguished political services, yet Dame Millicent Fawcett is denied the opportunity of entering the House of Lords, where she should now be a senior statesman."

Interest Keen
Political observers are awake with interest the discussion of Viscount Astor's bill to permit peerages in their own right to enter the House of Lords. This was defeated last year, but may again be debated. It is suggested that the added power given women by the passing of the equal franchise bill, which gives votes to 5,000,000 women of 21 to 30 years of age, may have an important bearing upon the discussion.

ICELAND OUTSTRIPS WORLD IN EXPORTS

Figures Remarkable Considering Population of Island Totals 100,000

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, April 12.—Iceland's total export trade increased amazingly in 1928, being valued at 74,000,000 kroner (about \$12,230,000), as compared with the 1927 figure of 57,000,000 kroner.
These figures become all the more remarkable when it is understood that Iceland's population does not exceed 100,000. In fact the foreign trade of \$122 per capita, is the greatest in the world.

This northern country takes great pride in its exports—both commercial and cultural. While Icelanders point out complacently that they export more economic goods for each inhabitant than any other country, they also are proud of their unusually high production of poets and artists.

Some of the greatest writers of today hail from Iceland. No other nation has a higher or more general taste in literature and art.
But the export figures show that Icelanders also know how to weave their dreams into a wonderful fabric of production and sale. Their commercial leaders say laughingly that "queer fish, such as poets and artists, are not the chief export of the country, but dried cod and salted herrings."

New Facist Party Scheme of Ethics Curbs Lawyers Practicing in Italy

ROME, April 12.—A new philosophy, theory of their profession, and rules of conduct have been laid down for lawyers by Augusto Turati, secretary of the Fascist party, in an order just issued.

By the pronouncement lawyers cease to be agents of anyone who wants to employ them. They may take only cases which will leave them with quiet consciences. They may not defend criminals whom they think guilty of repugnant crimes. They may not try to work on the sympathies of the judge by rhetorical gymnastics and oratorical flights.

Turati declares that the Fascist lawyer must not try to hinder justice, but consider himself an auxiliary of justice. Therefore he should not bring cases to court merely for the sake of litigation and profit and should undertake only those suits in which there is just cause for action.

"The Fascist lawyer is forbidden to undertake the defense of an anti-Fascist charged with political offenses.

Turati says that, for a long time he has been watching the conduct of Italian lawyers, that his present order is his final word, and that he will watch carefully to see how it is observed.
The order recognizes difficulties of

judging when an accused man merits the help of the Fascist lawyer.

"It is certainly necessary to remember that not every accused man is guilty; that, even if guilty, certain extenuating circumstances can mitigate in his favor, which ought to be given their full advantage," says the order.
"Therefore the Fascist lawyer must have recourse to his own conscience. In doubtful cases he can consult the Royal Commission of lawyers for his district, charged by the laws with maintaining the discipline of the court."

Meets World's Need For Horse's Troughs

SYDNEY, Australia, April 12.—If your old home town needs a horse trough, one may be obtained from Australia.

Recently George Bill, a wealthy Australian merchant, left through the Sydney Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, \$250,000 for the establishment of horse troughs wherever they are needed through the world.
Applications have been rolling in by the hundreds, but there are still funds left for more horse troughs.

Artists in England Facing Dire Poverty

Their distress is fully as great as that of the unemployed miners, said Sir William Helyar, president of the Royal Academy, in a report to the Artists' Benevolent Institution.
"Often this state of poverty is found in the homes of artists who have done good work, but who no longer have sales for their productions," he said. "There is no world so susceptible to the changes of fashion as the world of art."

cases of treasures which recently came from Luxor.

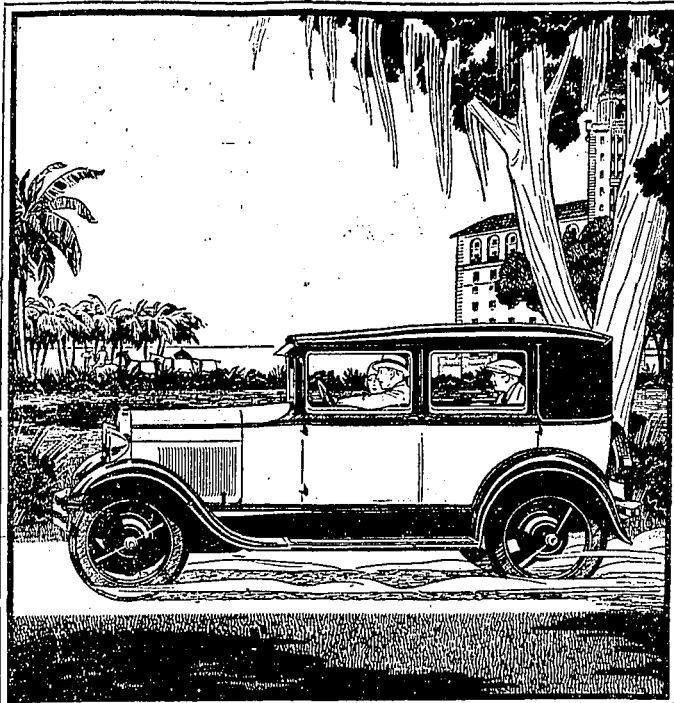

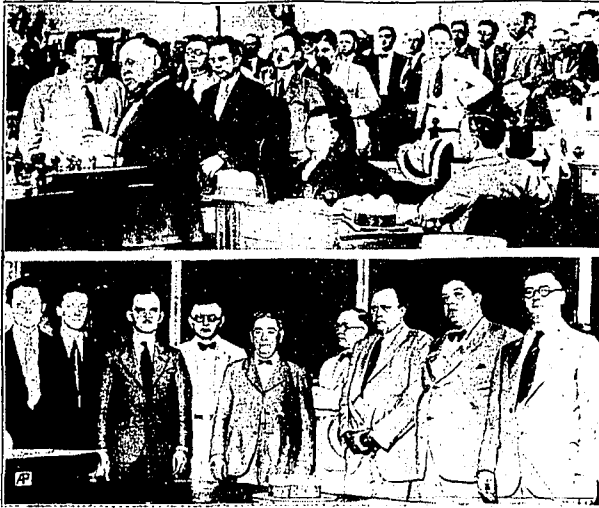

Colorful Figures Missing from Ranks of Coming Congress

HOST OF NEW NAMES WILL GO ON ROSTERS OF LAW-MAKING BODY

Women Will Invade House of Representatives in Greater Numbers; First Negro Will Claim Seat

By RAY A. HENLE
(Associated Press Staff Writer)
WASHINGTON, April 13—A host of new names will go on the rosters of congress at the special session April 15 to take place of many favorites who have been retired either by their own wish or by the fortunes of an election. Women will invade the house of representatives in greater numbers; Democratic states will send additions to the Republican majorities; the first negro to be elected years will claim a seat, and many old and well known faces will be supplanted by younger blood.

In the house two seats will be turned over to daughters of men famous in American history. Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick, daughter of Mark Hanna, will be seated as representative-at-large from Illinois, and Mrs. Bryan Owen, daughter of William Jennings Bryan, will sit with the Florida delegation as representative from the Miami district.

Reed Missing

Visitors to the senate will find the silver-crested Jim Reed, Missouri, but will see a republican, Oscar C. Patterson, who has taken his place. Reed, who retired voluntarily, leaves the scene along with George P. McLean, Connecticut, also a "laid-terminer" who decided not to re-ignite. McLean's seat has gone to Frederic C. Walcott.

While the democratic side loses the oratorical powers of Reed, it receives a recruit in Tom Connally, Texas, who has distinguished himself, even under the limited sphere which strict rules circumscribe, during six terms in the house. The new Texas senator takes the place of Earle B. Mayfield.

Five Democratic senators have turned their seats over to Republicans who defeated them in the last election. Gerry of Rhode Island was supplanted by Felix Helbert, Bruce of Maryland by Phillips Lee Goldsborough, who comes from the house, and Bayard of Delaware, a picturesque figure with his inevitable black scarf in place of the usual tie, has given way to John O. Townsend.

Kean Succeeds Edwards

Edwards, New Jersey, has been succeeded by Hamilton F. Kean, and Neely, West Virginia, by Henry D. Hatfield. Bronson Cutting, after a brief absence comes back as a senator from New Mexico elected for a full term. David A. Reed will continue to serve as Pennsylvania's only senator pending the disposition of the senate's case against William S. Vare.

In the house many interesting changes will occur. Two well known leaders, Finis Garrett, Tennessee and Daniel R. Anthony, and Kansas, both veterans, will retire. Garrett, the Democratic leader, was defeated in a race for the senate and now has become a judge of the court of customs appeals. Anthony quit of his own volition.

Along with Mrs. McCormick and Mrs. Owen, another woman will be added to the house roster in Mrs. Ruth Pruitt, New York. These three, serving with representatives Mary T. Norton, New Jersey, Edith Nourse Rogers, Massachusetts, Katherine Langley, Kentucky, Florence P. Kahn, California and Pearl Oldfield, Arkansas, bring the total number of women members to eight.

The election made striking changes in the political makeup of a number of state delegations, notably those of Kentucky, Virginia, and Missouri. The solid Democratic Virginia delegation of ten members in the last congress will be reduced to seven democrats. Six new Republicans were elected as representatives from Kentucky, changing that state's line-up to nine Republicans and two Democrats. One of the

new representatives, C. W. Roark, died April 5. Five new Republicans come in from Missouri, swept in by the Hoover landslide which swamped the veteran, Clement C. Dickason.

COPENHAGEN, April 13 (AP)—The Danish supreme court will not recognize as scientific evidence the so-called blood test for paternity.

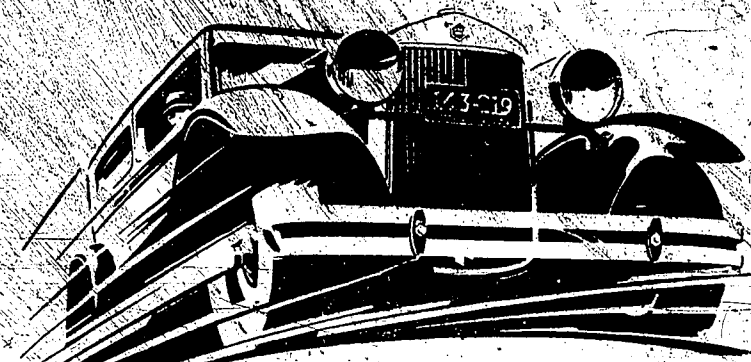

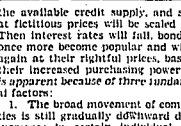

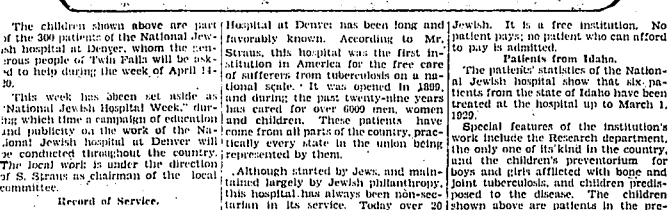

Former Twin Falls Woman Tells of President Herbert Hoover's Visit to Great Metropolis in Argentina

Mrs. Robert J. Haller Receives Letter From Mrs. Nina O. Potter Describing Manifestation of Enthusiasm by Part of Americans and Natives During Chief Executive's South American Tour

The enthusiasm which American residents in Argentina felt over the visit of Herbert Hoover to that nation, and the enthusiasm manifested by the natives of the country is described in a letter received this week by Mrs. Robert J. Haller from Mrs. Nina O. Potter, Rosario, Argentina, formerly of Twin Falls. Mrs. Potter accompanied her husband, W. T. Potter, formerly demonstrator for a hardware company here, to Rosario about a year and a half ago when he was transferred by his company.

The Potters lived in Tuxtla Falls, at 544 Third avenue north, about four years. Mrs. Potter was well known here as a reader, and was active in the Twentieth Century club, acting as fund-raiser for the May breakfast of that organization in 1917.

The parts of the letter relating to the Hoover visit follow:

We went to Buenos Aires to see Hoover. Our home is in Rosario, second city of the Argentine. "Well, you've decided," although we should probably experience the fate of Maria.

Maria is a little Argentine girl of eight who attends the convent where some of us "foreigners" study Spanish. Last October she was tremendously excited over a prospective trip to the capital city at the time of the inauguration of President Hipolito Yrigoyen. When she returned to school the children crowded about her, breathlessly demanding details.

"And did you really shake hands with him, Maria?" There was an expectant hush. "No," admitted a subdued Maria. "I didn't shake hands with him, but—she added laughingly, "I saw his hat!"

On election night had anyone told us we would soon be able to see even Mr. Hoover's hat, there would have been a mighty cheer. Possibly no greater interest was felt in the States than was exhibited by the little band of Americans gathered that night in the office of the Gros Company in Rosario, to hear the cables which were received every few minutes. Both sides were, of course, represented, but the Solid South conceded from the first that their chances were slight. Perhaps the most enthusiasm was aroused when word came that Hoover was carrying the farm boys.

And there—it was all over and he was coming to Buenos Aires on a train down on Tuesday night. Probably because of the discovery of the plot to assassinate Hoover, with the probable arrest of fifty radicals, the newspapers published statements that absolutely no details of his movements were obtainable. But we did know that he was to arrive on Thursday, December thirteenth, at 8:30 P. M., and it was rumored that he would go directly to the "White House."

Retiro Station was hopelessly jammed and when the train pulled in, men were trampled underfoot, women fainted, and the steel guard ropes went down like pack threads. We therefore gave it up and took the subway to our hotel on the Plaza de Mayo.

The Plaza and the entire Avenida were one blaze of colored lights. Double arches of them spanned the latter from the iron lamp posts in the middle of the street to the leafy green trees which are planted in the meadow-walks at either side.

In the Plaza itself beautiful floral designs and terraced green make it ever one of the most attractive spots in the city; and now with its brilliant illuminations and flags of red, white and blue lighted side by side with the Argentine colors of blue and white, it was almost indescribable. I heard a Spanish girl ask her companion what those two words meant at either end of the Plaza and then repeat after him in broken English, "Well—come—"

A large crowd had gathered in the Plaza facing the great structure of beveled colored stone, the Casa Rosada, which means not "White House" but "Pink House." At the front entrance a band in dazzling uniform of blue and scarlet with gold trimmings was pacing back and forth, back and forth. Presently he was joined by a squad of five, one of whom exchanged pluces with him and took up the vigil.

When the thousands of lights which permanently decorate the Casa Rosada flashed on, the crowd pressed forward thinking the guest had come. But they and those who waited elsewhere along the supposed "line of march" were disappointed. The crowd returned to the President's House alone. Mr. Hoover had been taken to the home of the American ambassador, Mr. Woods Bliss. We didn't even see his hat!

But Friday brought recompense. For we not only saw him face to face but we shook his hand and that of Mrs. Hoover. Here again, however, many of the one thousand Americans in the dining room of the Hotel Plaza were disappointed for our distinguished visitor was obliged to leave before meeting them all.

The reception was given by the Argentine Society of the River Plate and was strictly for Americans. So strictly that one member could not even bring his wife and son, as being born in this country, they were Argentines. How odd it seemed and how GOOD it seemed to be in a public gathering and hear— for the first time in over a year—everybody around us speaking English.

Many of us after the introduction, fell to watching the rather small, dark man who stood by Hoover's left, the man who was personally responsible for his safety in Buenos Aires. As the crowd passed up the steps into the Winter

PARIS, April 13 (AP)—If the insect-eating birds were protected France would grow more breadstuffs than she could use, is the contention of the eminent naturalist, Florent Prevost.

Inspired by this saying, Deputy Henri Chevrier, has asked the chamber to take up wild birds protection bill, voted by the senate in 1903, but which has been since then in the pigeon holes of the agricultural committee.

In certain regions of France, says Mr. Chevrier, swallows, nightingales, tom-tits, goldfinches, wagtails, chaffinches and blackbirds have become extinct. He proposes to prohibit the hunting of all small birds except larks, ortolans and baccaraes.

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BERLIN WELCOMING MANY FOREIGNERS

Rush for German Citizenship Developing at Immigration Headquarters

BERLIN, April 13 (AP)—A rush for German citizenship is developing at the immigration office of the Berlin police headquarters. The first quarter of 1920 saw almost as many applications for papers as the whole of the 1928 and nearly 2000 foreigners became "Germans" that year.

Most of the applications come from men and women who were Germans before the world war but who, by the Treaty of Versailles, became citizens of Poland, Czechoslovakia, France or some other countries. The way is made easy for these people, only 50 applications in all having been rejected last year.

Of the 1920 applications 615 came from citizens of Poland, 353 from

Czechoslovakia, 272 from Russians and 258 from persons without a country. Most of these latter were of Russian nationality and many of them refused to recognize the validity of the soviet regime. All cases in which the applicant was a former German citizen were granted immediately.

The lists have included a fair sprinkling of non-Germans among whom Greeks and Turks are conspicuous by numbers. There were, however, applications for citizenship from Albanians, Chinese, Bolivians and Australians in the record.

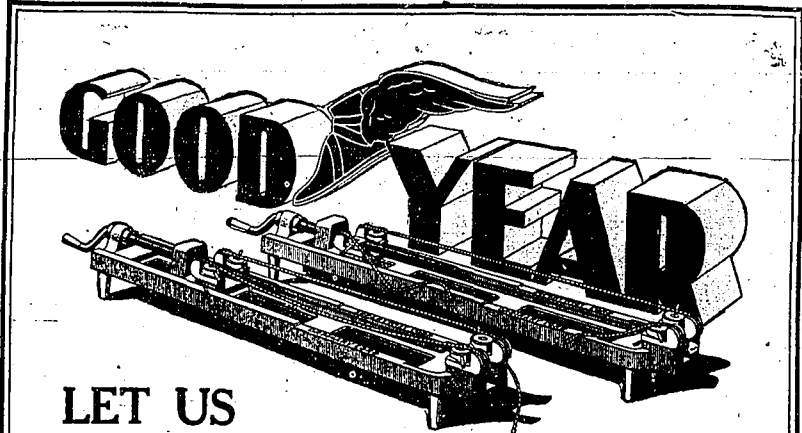

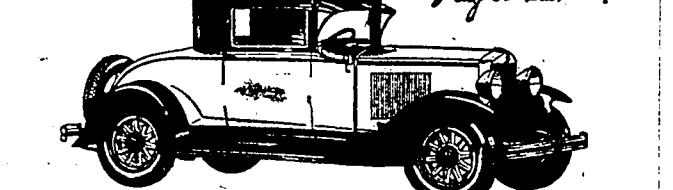
